Nearly 300 Entries at Second Poultry and Pet Stock Show

Striking Exhibits of High-Class Poultry and Pet Stock. Large Crowds Attend Second Annual Show of Porcupine Poultry and Pet Stock Association. List of Prize Winners at Big Event.

The second annual show of the Porcupine Poultry and Pet Stock Association, held in the Miners' Union Hall, Second Avenue, Timmins, on Wednesday and Thursday of last week, Jan. 14th and 15th, exceeded the success of last year, which is high praise, indeed. The Show was a complete success in every way,—in the number and quality of the exhibits, in the large attendance throughout the show, and in the fact that it is now all on a sound financial basis. Perhaps, the only fair criticism that could be made was that the building used was not nearly large enough either for the best display of the large entry list or for the accommodation of the big crowds visiting the show. But such criticism would be unjust in view of the fact that the building was the only suitable one available. The only remedy would appear to be the plan of the Association erecting a building of its own for the purpose. This can not fairly be expected for the immediate present, so the only thing proper now is to extend the thanks of the Association, and of the public also to the management of the Miners' Union Hall for the kindly loan of the hall for show purposes.

There was a remarkably fine showing of poultry and an unusually interesting exhibit of dogs and other pet stock. The show exceeds anything shown in the North Land and would do credit to any big town of the South. There were 284 entries. In addition, Mr. J. N. Levine had some of his beautiful Scotch Collies on exhibition, none of these dogs, however, being entered in competition as Mr. Levine was the Judge in the Dog Classes.

The public gave the event very hearty support, there being large crowds throughout the whole time of the Show. There was a particular "rush" on during the period after four o'clock on Thursday afternoon, the school children then being admitted free. The line-up stretched from the hall down below the corner. The youngsters were taken in groups, shown through and then let out to accommodate another group.

Mr. W. M. Cadman, of London Ont., the Judge of the Poultry classes, was complimentary not only to the individual exhibits of special merit, but also the Show as a whole. He considered it generally as very creditable indeed. This year, as last, Mr. Cadman proved eminently satisfactory as a Judge and gave very general satisfaction. He said that the biggest improvement noted this year was in the Rhode Island Reds

which class this year was a specially creditable one here.

Many were disappointed in the fact that Mr. J. J. McGee's fine showing of White Wyandottes arrived here too late for entry. Mr. McGee made a mistake in the dates and did not reach here until Thursday. The judging had been done then and accordingly the entries could not be taken. Mr. McGee had a particularly fine showing of classy birds.

In the Poultry Classes there were a total of 256 entries, divided as follows:—Barred Rocks, 65; Single Comb Rhode Island Reds, 31; Rose Comb Rhode Island Reds, 22; White Leghorns, 32; White Wyandottes, 29; Black Langshans, 13; Chanticleers, 12; Bantams, 10; Aneonas, 10; Buff Orpingtons, 8; Partridge Rocks, 7; E. L. Sussex, 6; White Rocks, 5; Black Wyandottes, 4; Light Brahmas, 3.

There were 6 Pigeon entries. In the Dog Classes there were 37 entries, divided in the following classes as given:—Police Dogs, 7; Toy Dogs, 6; Sleight Dogs, 6; Collies, 4; Cocker Spaniels, 4; Chesapeake Bays, 3; Newfoundlands, 2; Great Danes, 2; Irish Setters, 1; Hounds, 1; Boston Terriers, 1.

The handsome and valuable entry in the Cat Class, exhibited by Mrs. J. A. McInnis, brought forth many complimentary references.
