New Liskeard Makes Another Win Here on Monday Night. Local Lads Did Not Match the Combination of the Visitors. Good Crowd at the Match. Score on Application.

Well, boys, the jinx is not yet broken. The ardent fans who braved the below zero weather on Monday night, with high hopes that Porcupine were going to register their first win in the Northern Section of the N.O.H.A., saw their hopes dashed to the ground at the end of the first period and it was only the very optimistic who still looked for a victory, and all for the lack of an eleven letter word meaning to coalesce. Playing combination against a team that relied to win on individual play, New Liskeard, fresh from their 4-3 victory of Saturday night at Iroquois Falls, defeated the Porcupine sextette, at the Timmins rink by a score of 6-2 on Monday evening, in three periods of play, in every one of which they had the edge on their Miners opponents. There was a good crowd out for the game, and the Timmins Citizens' Band were on hand to render selections during the intervals between periods. Jim Scully once more occupied his old position as guardian of the Porcupine citadel, and though he did not stop them all, his work during the evening was creditable. Roach and Boland were on the defences. This was Boland's first appearance on the ice this season, and beyond a failure to pass the puck, he satisfied the fans with the game he turned in, being hard to beat at stick-handling and checking. Roach also displayed a tendency to 'hog' the puck, but otherwise played a good game. Duval at centre worked hard all evening, and it was not his fault that he did not get his traditional goal. McGillies and Kelly were on the forward line, and showed up well. Kelly worked hard all evening, and at passing the puck, and checking tried hard to beat the Liskeard goalie. Portelance played a good game, though he roams too much. Davidson played the best game he has turned in this season. During the last period he took McGillies' place on the forward line, and tallied one of the Timmins goals.

McCann, the Liskeard netminder, had lots to do, and as the score indicates he performed very creditably. Smith and Carmichael on the defence proved a hard pair to pass. Hogg at centre worked hard all evening. Thompson and Spence on the wings were perhaps the most outstanding men on the Liskeard line-up. Both kept Burgoyne busy with his bell, for both are notorious for trying to get away with off-side 'stuff', but for speed and shooting, these two are hard to beat. Jones and Austin, the two subs, were used often, and played a hard close game. Stan Burgoyne, ex-Eskimo coach, and now coach of the North Bay Trappers, handled the bell, and was pretty fair. The play was not a quarter of a minute old when the first of the numerous tinkles of the referee's bell checked up Thompson and Spence on a nice two-man rush. Porcupine transferred the play to the Liskeard end, but McCann was able to stop whatever shots came his way. Kelly tried the first shot on goal, but failed to register. Duval duplicated his effort but once more the Liskeard goalie was able to clear nicely. The Farmers then transferred the play to the Timmins end, and Smith registered the first for New Liskeard in five and a half minutes, on a pass from Spence. Boland was sent to the penalty box for interference, but this looked like good work on his part. The Farmers were all set for another tally. Thompson was showing up well, and calling on Scully to make several saves. Roach went to the box on a suspicion of butt-ending Thompson. While he was off, Thompson scored the second Liskeard counter on what looked like an off-side pass from Smith. The Farmers were checking close, and the individual play of the Miners was stopped at mid-ice. Spence was sent to the box for hooking, and signaled his return to the ice, when the period was sixteen minutes old, by passing to Thompson who drove in the third counter of the game. Spence again went to the box when he tripped Boland. The Porcupine sextette took the offensive, but here the lack of combination was very noticeable, Kelly and Duval being the only two, who were trying to score on this form of play. Smith went in during the last minute of the period and made it four for New Liskeard. Porcupine 0, Liskeard 4. Duval passed the puck back to Roach, who went in for a shot, Kelly trying the rebound, but McCann made a nice save. Thompson came in

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
