SIoux LOOKOUT WANTS THE GOVERNMENT TO ACT.

Sioux Lookout recently organized a Board of Trade and now it seems to be a case not only of Sioux Lookout, but also of Everybody Lookout! The Sioux Lookout Board is not afraid to explain its honest outlook. In witness whereof the following paragraph may be considered from The Lookout, the newspaper of Sioux Lookout, in its report of the first executive meeting of the Sioux Lookout Board of Trade. The Lookout says:—"The intolerable state of affairs brought on by a continuance of the O.T.A., by which a considerable number of men from this district pass by Sioux Lookout and spend their money in Winnipeg, owing to its superior refreshment facilities and by which much local money is lost to business here, next came under discussion. It was pointed out that an overwhelming majority of voters here declared for government sale of wines and liquors, that a similar condition existed in all the north of Ontario and in the more enlightened centres of Old Ontario. In view of the fact that some action by the government must take place to meet this body of opinion, the Board is communicating with the proper authorities to demand the establishing of sale of alcoholic beverages under government control at this point."

SIX WOLVES SHOT NEAR COCHRANE BY TRAPPERS.

The Northland Post, of Cochrane, last week had the following "wolf" story:—"Two trappers north of Cochrane, K. Massere and W. McDonald, who have a 35 miles trapping line from the end of steel to Smokey Falls, had a brush with wolves the other day which made them possessors of 6 fine skins of timber wolves measuring not less than six feet six, all of them. It was at the hour of dusk that the trappers came upon a pack of 12 wolves feasting on a moose which they had cut off of a herd, and so intent were the fierce animals on their task of feasting that the trappers were able to approach close enough to bring down six of them, which at \$15.00 each for the bounty, is not a bad day's work."
