**COMMITTED FOR TRIAL
ON SERIOUS CHARGES.**

Thursday last J. E. Chenette and F. Chenette, of South Porcupine, two brothers, were committed by Magistrate Atkinson for trial before a higher court on charges of being concerned in immoral traffic. The evidence of a seventeen-year-old girl was to the effect that she and another girl had been taken to a place in town by the accused for immoral traffic with Chinamen. The story of the girls was that the men had arranged the affair. Both men pleaded not guilty and elected to be tried by a higher court. F. Chenette is out on \$1000 bail and the other on \$1500 bail. Both are taxi-cab drivers. Another taxi-driver, D. Tierney was charged with keeping a disorderly house, by allowing his car to be used for immoral purposes. One girl gave evidence concerning herself and a man named G. Jeffries. Tierney's case was laid over to this week for decision. Jeffries was given a suspended sentence when his case came before the court for decision. The charge against G. Lamarack, charged with a serious offence against two girls, was withdrawn, the girls being older than at first believed. The two girls were committed to St. Mary's Industrial School. All these cases were more or less linked together and showed unsavoury conditions that the Town Police deserve credit for cleaning up. County Court Attorney, J. M. Greer was down from Cochrane for the cases, while Mr. G. T. Bull, of North Bay and Mr. Wes. Gordon were among the defending counsel from out of town. To the scandal-minded the cases were a great find, but to the ordinary good citizen there will be nothing but regret that these things should be, together with respect for the Police in the determined effort to clean up the situation. The two girls concerned in the Chenette and other cases were turned over to the care of their parents.

A woman charged with stealing some blankets from Mrs. Mary Peterson was given a suspended sentence. A solitary drunk paid the usual.

**MR. & MRS. HORACE JOHNS
KILLED IN AUTO ACCIDENT**

Former Residents of Timmins Meet Death in Minnesota, U.S.A.

Friends and acquaintances in town were shocked and grieved last week to hear of the death of Mr. and Mrs. Horace Johns, former esteemed residents of Timmins. According to the information reaching here by wire, Mr. and Mrs. Johns were the victims of a motor car accident at Virginia, Minnesota. Mr. Johns was instantly killed and Mrs. Johns passed away a few hours after the accident. The accident occurred on Monday, Jan. 26th.

The late Mr. and Mrs. Horace Johns were residents of Timmins for some years and had many friends here, all of whom will deeply regret the untimely death of this young couple. Mr. and Mrs. Johns were also well known and popular in Cobalt, Mr. Johns being on the staff of the Kerr Lake Mine both before and after his service as a soldier overseas. From Cobalt Mr. and Mrs. Johns moved to Timmins, Mr. Johns being employed at the Hollinger Mine. In October, 1923, they moved to Detroit, where they resided for about six months, later going to Virginia, Minnesota. Mrs. Johns' old home. While in Timmins Mr. Horace Johns was prominent in football and other circles, and both he and Mrs. Johns were highly regarded. Evidence of this was given last week by the number of anxious inquiries made regarding the accident, and also by the number of floral tributes sent from Timmins and Cobalt. The late Mr. Johns was a valued member of the I.O.O.F., and Mrs. Johns of the Rebekahs. The late Mr. Johns is survived by two brothers in Timmins, Messrs Stan and Norman Johns and one brother in Kirkland Lake. Mrs. Stan Johns is a sister of the late Mrs. Horace Johns. To all the relatives and friends the deepest sympathy of all will be extended.
