Friends in this district will extend sympathy to Miss Louise Roney in the death of her mother at Pembroke on Jan. 25th. Miss Roney was a popular member of the Separate School teaching staff for some time, and is now on the staff of the South Porcupine school.

In reference to the death of Mrs. Roney, The Pembroke Standard last week had the following notice:—

"Following a stroke a few days previously the death occurred on Sunday afternoon of Mrs. R. J. Roney, the wife of the esteemed County Clerk. The deceased, whose maiden name was Mary A. Lapollie, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. George Lapollie was born in Eganville, Nov. 21st, 1861, and was consequently over 63 years of age at the time of her death. Thirty nine years ago she, and Mr. R. J. Roney were united in marriage by the Rev. Father Byrnes, at Eganville, and immediately afterwards went to Portage du Fort, where they lived ten years. After this they moved to Eganville, where they resided fifteen years, and upon Mr. Roney being appointed County Clerk

in June 1911, they moved to Pembroke. The deceased is survived by her husband, three sons, James McGill and Basil C., both of Hearst; and Robert J. a student at St. Augustine Seminary, Toronto. The daughters are: Miss Bernadette, Flint, Mich.; Eileen, in religion, Sister Mary St. Cecilia, St. Joseph's Community, Douglas; Miss Margaret, Pembroke; Miss Louise, at South Porcupine, Ont. She is also survived by five sisters, Mrs. J. O'Neill, of Renfrew; Mrs. Aleo Boisvert, Des Joachims; Mrs. S. Sunstrum, Golden Lake; Mrs. P. McMahon, Goudreau and Mrs. W. C. Bardwell of Flint, Mich.; and one brother, George Lapollie, Timmins. Deceased was much beloved and will be missed by a large circle of friends. The funeral was held Wednesday morning, requiem high mass being chanted at St. Columba Cathedral, and interment took place in the R.C. cemetery.
