**WOMAN BUMPED INTO CORPSE HANGING UP IN STORE SHED.**

In a front page article last week The Northern News of Cobalt had the following:—

"The story of how a woman bumped into the body of a man suspended in a shed at a store in Rouyn City proved to be the foundation of a widely current report about town yesterday that a serious crime had been committed in that latest mining camp. Mrs. Al. Cook, wife of the well-known prospector, who was in Cobalt this week on her way from Rouyn to Toronto, brought out the information. She had gone into a shed to get coal oil and had struck against the body, which was that of a young man who had been drowned some time before and was subsequently recovered. The body, wrapped in a blanket, had been tied up in the shed to keep the remains from animal's while relatives in Nova Scotia were notified of the man's death. Mrs. Cook did not know of its presence and did not see it in the darkness. She drove out from Rouyn to Larder, making forty miles of the trip with a dog team she drove herself."
