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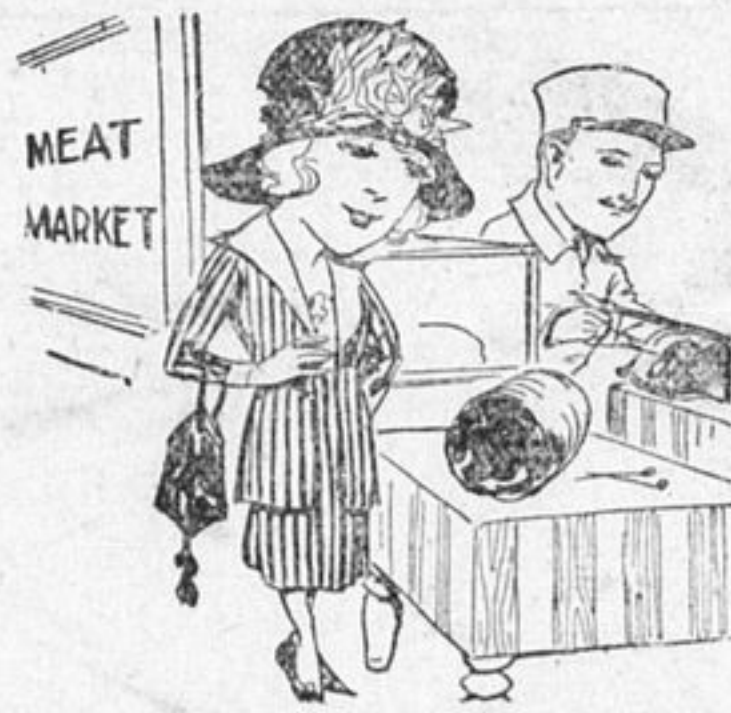

Interesting Double-Header Hockey Thursday Evening

In the Roach Cup Series the Maple Leafs Win Out With a Score of 4 to 1. The Has Been Junior Hockey Team Wins from the 1925 Juniors After a Very Lively Game. Severe Weather Interfered With Big Crowds Attending These Matches.

The citizens of the town who feared to brave the elements last Thursday evening missed some of the classiest hockey seen in town this winter, when a double-header hockey match was staged at the Timmins Rink. The first game was in the Roach Cup series, and consisted of two fifteen-minute periods, the contestant teams being the Maple Leafs and Rovers. The former winning out by four to one. The second game was between the Porcupine Junior Hockey team, and Juniors who have played in the team in previous years. The Has Been Juniors won out by 3 to 1.

The line-up of the teams for the first game was:—
Maple Leafs—Craig, goal; Gallignard and Roy, defence; Hudson, centre; S. Ellies and Laflamme, forwards; Ellies, Slater and La-jambe, subs.

Rovers—Trafford, goal; Latham and Magrath, defence; Latic, centre; M. Forbes and Marshall, forwards; Killigren, Engles, Forbes and Brown, subs.

Referee—Jack Lynch, Timmins.

Gallignard went in from the face-off and scored for the Maple Leafs, but this was only a temporary burst of energy, the Rovers coming back, and though they could not get through for a shot on Craig, they broke up any combination of the Maple Leafs, and kept their own goal from danger. After some minutes of this kind of play, Hudson got the puck on a nice pass, stickhandled his way through the defence, and made it two for the Leafs.

The second period saw some nice hockey both teams turning in fine combination. Hudson again scored this time on a lone effort, when he turned in a classy exhibition of stick-handling. Trafford had no chance on this one. The Rovers came back with a burst of speed, and Ellies passed to Magrath, who scored the first for the Rovers. Right after Gallignard went down, and scored for the Leafs, after displaying a nice brand of stick-handling. Hudson and Gallignard show good promise as coming hockey players, and with some coaching should find their place on a Porcupine Junior line-up. Latic, for the Rovers showed up well, displaying an ability for stick-handling, and back-checking which will come in handy when playing in larger league games. The both goal-tenders turned in fine games, showing good judgment in clearing the shots, and coolness when shots were being sent in on them.

The first period resulted after twenty minutes playing in the score still standing at zero. Levine had to make a nice stop right at the start, and showed that his training this winter with the North Bay Trappers was not wasted. The play continued from end to end, with about half a dozen shots on the nets. Desormeaux lost two good chances by holding the puck too long, with Gervais waiting at centre for his pass. Lawrence and Sterling combined well, but were closely watched. Whissel broke away, but that ex-Paris, ex-Porcupine Junior, "Shorty" Hardy, was able to handle him nicely with his sweep

check.

The second period showed better hockey. Pete Hackett scored for the ex-Juniors, after a scrimmage in front of the Junior nets. Boyd came back right after, and shot, his rebound catching Levine napping, and the period ended with the score a tie. The third spasm was the best of the evening. Levine had lots to do, but turned in a great game. Downey in the Junior net also turned in a nice game. Twice J. N. Levine tried the behind-the-net trick, but he could not fool the guardian of the Junior citadel. The period was half over, when Desormeaux, went down the boards was checked by Proulx, who forced him to pass it out to Gervais, who sent the second tally, the druggist beating Downey with his hard shot. Arundel and Sterling tried a nice combination play, but could not get past Levine. Proulx, Sterling and Lawrence went down in a three-man combination, but were checked by Levine, who passed to Desormeaux, the ex-Junior giving it to Gervais, the little druggist again scoring. The best feature of the game was the back-checking displayed by both teams. Sterling was beaten by Porky Levine, the erstwhile North Bay and Porcupine Junior displaying real class in saving this one.

The game ending after a hard fought struggle by the Has Beens winning from this years snappy Junior team by the score 3-1.

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
