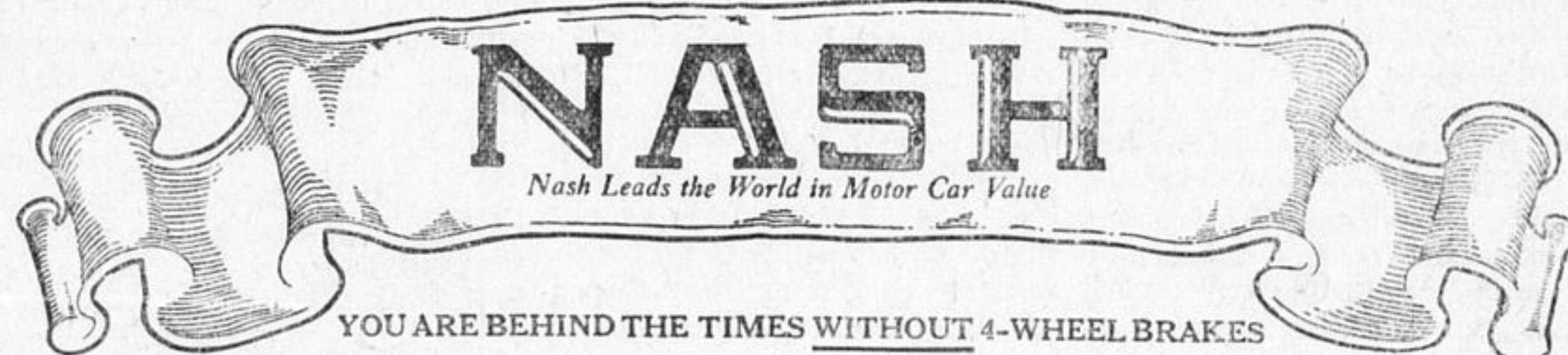
MOOSE THAT WERE TRAINED TO WORK IN HARNESS.

"Most any animal can be trained. There was a moose at Rat Portage in 1898 that regularly drew his owner in a sleigh around town.
