### HEBREW UNIVERSITY TO BE DEDICATED TODAY

Local Jews Greatly Interested in Event of World Significance.

Among the Jewish people of Timmins and district special interest is being shown in the dedication of the Hebrew University in Jerusalem today (April 1st, 1925). This Hebrew University is situated on Mount Scopus, Jerusalem, and it is believed that it will be the Centre of Culture from which will flow the old Hebraic zeal for social justice and righteousness.

As far back as 1901, at the fifth Zionist Congress, a resolution was

passed calling upon the Executive to examine the possibilities of founding a Jewish University in Palestine. In 1913, at the eleventh Zionist Congress, the Executive was able to announce that steps had been taken to fulfil the desire of the Jewish people to make Palestine the seat of Cultural activity. In 1914 negotiations were commenced for the purchase of land on Mount Scopus, then the progress of the World War deferred matters for the time. In 1918, however, the great work was again well under way, the corner stone of the great world university being laid with impressive ceremony on July 24th, General Allenby and staff and members of the French and Italian Contingents being among those present.

The Hebrew University, being dedicated to-day is conceived, in its initial

stage, as a centre for advanced research in those branches of science which have a special bearing on the public health of Palestine, and on its economic development, as well as in those branches of Oriental studies which are especially connected with the religious traditions of the Land. The first of the Research Institutes opened consists of a department of Microbiology, a school of Tropical Medicine and Hygiene, and an Institute of Biochemistry. The function of the first two institutions will be to carry out research work in the infectious diseases characteristic of Palestine and the adjacent countries. The Biochemical Institute will be engaged in dealing with problems which have a special bearing on the development of agriculture and industry in Palestine, and will in the same way

place the results at the disposal of the practical worker.

On the Arts side, the first department to be opened is a Research Institute for Jewish and Oriental Studies—in particular for the study of the Jewish religion, of Jewish history, literature, law, philosophy, languages, etc.

In close association with the Research Institute it is proposed to establish a People's University for the dissemination of knowledge and the general educational advancement of wider sections of the population.

The University will have at its disposal the considerable resources of the Jewish National Library in Jerusalem, which already possesses over 80,000 volumes, covering a wide range of learned literature and is notably rich in Hebrew and Oriental books and manuscripts.

The board of Governors of the Hebrew University consists provisionally of the following:—Professor Einstein, Achad Haam, Dr. J. L. Magnes, Sir Alford Mond, Mr. J. de Rothschild, Mr. Sokolow, Mr. Felix Warburg, Dr. Weizman.

In referring to the Hebrew University, Dr. Weizman says:—"The Jewish University, though intended primarily for Jews, will, of course, give an affectionate welcome to the members of every race and every creed. 'My house is a house of prayer for all nations.' The University is destined to play an important part in the field of knowledge." The Jewish people have been a nation of scholars throughout the ages. Their great scholars to-day are scattered over the wide world. The Hebrew University in Palestine will give them a central home, as it were, and bring them all together in the broader sense for the advancement of learning and the betterment of the world.

### GIVEN SEVEN-YEAR TERM ON CHARGE OF INCEST

Robert Sherk, of Stock Township, Sentenced for Serious Offence Against 13-Year Old Daughter.

At South Porcupine last week Robert Sherk was charged before Magistrate Atkinson with the crime of incest. Sherk elected to a summary trial before the Magistrate and admitted the offence against his 13-year-old daughter. The Magistrate sentenced him to seven years imprisonment at Kingston. The daughter is under the care of the Children's Aid Society, but was allowed to return home in the care of her mother. Sherk lived with his family, including several small children, on a farm in Stock Township, near Monteith. The work of the farm will be carried on by a brother of Mrs. Sherk who kindly agreed to look after the farm and family.

### BAND SELECTIONS ON SUNDAY WERE MUCH APPRECIATED

The work of the Band, under Band Leader Wolno was specially appreciated Sunday evening. Among the selections by the Band were:—March, "Liberators"; overture, "Tradella," waltz "Eileen Allana," selection "H.M.S. Pinafore"; selection, "Anona."
