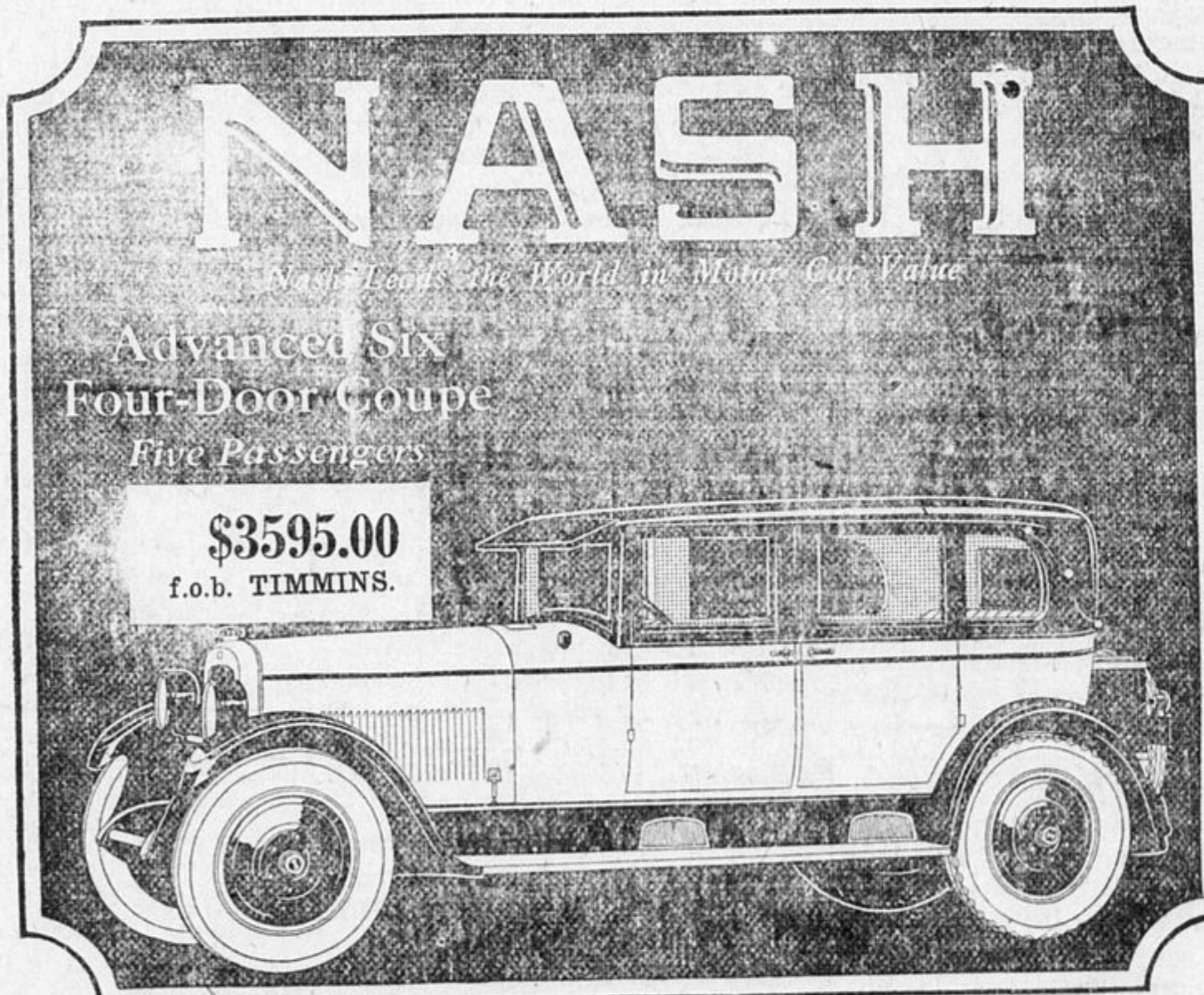
In a recent fire at the home of Mr. Brown,
