**SURE LOOKS LIKE SMALL
POTATOES AND FEW IN A HILL**

A Timmins firm last week received in one day's mail a letter enclosed in an envelope of rich paper and texture and bearing the embossed seal of the Dominion House of Commons. There was no postage stamp on the envelope, the letter being evidently posted at the House of Commons as on the business of the King and Country.

With income tax and sales tax and all the other taxes duly paid, the Timmins firm naturally wondered why the House of Commons or any member thereof should be writing letters, postage free, to humble business firms in this city of the North. It was pleasing, though, to think that the House of Commons knew of the existence of this City of Timmins. Apart from the keen knowledge and interest displayed in collecting the taxes and impositions of all kinds, it looks often as if the House of Commons is unaware that there is a City of Timmins or a wonderful North Land of promise.

Inside the envelope was the formal letterhead of the House of Commons, coat of arms and all,—the usual letter paper for the use of members in communications about the country's business. "Perhaps, this is a letter to say that Timmins is to get its much-needed Post Office building?" was a thought, as the letter was opened. "Or, perhaps, it is in regard to that needed dock at the Mattagami Landing?" But no! This is the way the letter read:—"Having some potatoes to dispose of we were advised to write you in that regard. Would you be in the market for a carload of good potatoes? And, if so, what would you be prepared to pay per bag?" The letter was signed with a firm name, one of the firm no doubt being a member of the country's parliament—very likely a Progressive.

Selling potatoes by mail will appear to many to be a sign of progress. Selling potatoes by mail, with the Country paying the postage, is a sign of Progressiveness. But the people, overburdened now with taxes and impositions, will feel that this Progressive Government business is being carried too far, just as it was in the Progressive Government of Ontario in which Honourable Peter Smith was a leading light.

Political campaign literature issued by the ton and forwarded postage free, at the country's expense, is bad enough, but when the Members start to use their mail privileges to sell potatoes by mail, it surely looks like small potatoes and few in a hill. Hasn't this Progressive business gone a little too far? Is it not high time for the country to turn Conservative again?

**ANOTHER LETTER FROM
PORCUPINE MINERS' UNION**

The Porcupine Miners' Union has handed The Advance a copy of a second letter written the Mines of the district asking for an increase in wage scales. This letter follows the line of the one sent in February, suggesting that there is an increase in the cost of living and an increase in wages is accordingly in order. Quotations are made from The Labour Gazette to uphold the viewpoint of the Union. Comparison is also made of the increase enjoyed by other occupations since 1914 and those of the mine-workers. As an offset to these arguments, however, is the fact that the Mines here pay the highest scale of wages to similar workers in Canada, and also that there is a decided tendency in the country to reduction in wage scales.
