**CROWDS WELL PLEASED
WITH "THE HOTTENTOT"**

Spring and Summer Fashion Review
by Living Models Interesting
Feature of the Evenings.

Good crowds attended at the Goldfields Theatre Monday and Tuesday evenings of this week for the presentations of the three-act comedy, "The Hottentot," given by local talent under the direction of Mr. and Mrs. A. R. Barrett, and under the auspices of the Cochrane District Children's Aid Shelter Fund.

Prior to each show there was a Spring and Summer Fashion Display by living models from the establishment of Rinn Bros. There was a very attractive showing of coats, suits and dresses and the young ladies making the display filled their parts in very pleasing and effective way. The music by the special orchestra added to the effectiveness of this feature, just as it contributed to the pleasure of the evening generally.

The comedy, "The Hottentot," is an amusing comedy with many entertaining situations and a plenitude of good lines. The audiences appreciated its presentation very much. It is the story of Sam Harrington, a young man who has a horror of horses, following a mishap that came near having serious consequences. Harrington is mistaken for a famous horseman by a young lady (Peggy Fairfax), and for fear that he will forfeit her good will he does not correct the mistake. The usual line of complications ensue and there are many humorous twists and turns. The wild man-killing horse, "The Hottentot," is eventually ridden by Harrington and wins the race, under the colors of Peggy, who is won by the same token.

Mr. J. R. Walker, as Harrington, gave a very clever characterization of the part. His representation of the thrown rider would be difficult to improve upon, and the way he made the very most of his lines would have done credit to an experienced professional. Mr. Walker took his part indeed in the most effective way, and he deserves a few bouquets. Mrs. Ed. Loney as "Mrs. Chadwick," the merry widow, took her part in exceptionally effective way. Swift was a character supplying much of the comedy, and this coloured butler was well presented by Mr. Frank Rodger. Mrs. Keene, as "Mrs. Ollie Gilford," Mrs. Rosalind Barrett, as Peggy Fairfax; Mr. Joe Jackson as "Larry Crawford"; Mr. Ernie Fortin, as "Alex Fairfax"; Mr. Joe Weston, as "Ollie Gilford"; Mr. Maurice Belanger, as "Perkins"; and Mr. Jack Kennedy, as "Reggie Townsend," all carried their parts through with cleverness and skill.

The specialties between the acts were particularly enjoyed. The first chorus, "In the Little Red Schoolhouse," was a number that brought heartiest applause. Miss Gwendolyn Smith, soloist, was assisted by Misses Esther Robertson, Jessie Watt, Gene Sutherland, Romaine Acton, Ethel Brown, Beverly Stewart, Shirley Harris, Winnifred Wilson, May Moore, Marjorie Booken, "Hong Kong" was a very pretty number, costumes, dancing and singing all being very effective. Those cleverly taking part in this number were Misses Annabell Taylor, Mildred Slater, Crissie Robertson, Ione Cutbertson, Lucy Morin, Marianne Colborne and Delia Blow. The audience was delighted with the dancing and singing specialty by the Barrett Baby Duo, the smaller tot being particularly cute, and clever.
