The police have been gathering evidence in the murder case and it is believed that the criminal or criminals responsible for the brutal murder at Smooth Rock Falls will be eventually brought to justice. In the meantime, however, the man wanted has disappeared. He was traced to a couple of places in the district but has since been lost track of. The fact of his disappearance in itself is strange, though he may be able to explain this, as well as give a satisfactory account of his previous movements.

Opening Football Match Won By the Hollinger Team

Winners of Last Season's District League Defeat the Pick of the Rest of the League in Good Game Here on Saturday in Ideal Football Weather and Before a Good Crowd for the First Match of the Season.

The Football season opened up last Saturday, with the Hollinger team, last year's winners of the P.D.F.L., against the Pick of the Rest of the P.D.F.L. teams. It was an ideal Football day. There was a strong wind blowing at the commencement of the match but this died away towards the end of the first half. There was a good crowd out to witness the opener and they were rewarded with a good exhibition of football.

The teams lined up as follows:—
Hollinger:—Larmer, goal, Haly and Hetherington, backs; Stevenson, Anderson and Short, half-backs; Dedrickson, Satrang, Petterson, Landers, and Dunbar, forwards.

P.D.F.L.:—A. Cadman, (Town), goal; Ewart (Dome) and Jackson, (Lancashires), backs; Rice (Cornish), G. Cooper (Town) and A. Cooper, (Schumacher), half-backs; Carroll, (Lancashires), A. Roberts, jr., (Town B.), Robson, (Schumacher), Lucas (Dome) and Tonkin (Cornish), forwards. Liddle, spare goal.

The Pick were the first to press and a nice move on their right enabled Roberts to give Larmer a hot one to save. The Hollinger set the pace, and were working in nicely, only to have Ewart intercept a dangerous pass. The Pick went up again, but the Holly backs had found their stride and kept the ball clear. There was a lot of midfield play at this time, neither team being able to make headway owing to smart intercepting of the passes. The Holly broke away on their right, Satrang got on Dedrickson's pass and shot the ball. Cadman cleared it to Petterson who had an open goal and sent in a hot grass cutter only to have Cadman pick it up and clear again. The Holly were pressing hard now. Satrang came on only to have Rice take the ball off his toe when about to shoot from a couple of yards out. The Pick now swung the ball in long passes, Robson getting the ball and cleverly working his way through, scored with a nice shot.

The first half was drawing to a close and the Holly were determined to be on equal terms at the cross-over and gave Cadman plenty to do. Satrang and Petterson were showing their skill in footwork. Cadman came down to save a low drive and injured his knee in the attempt, but played on and a minute from time Petterson ran right in the goal for a score. Half-time 1-1.

The cross-over started with Jock Liddle in goal for the P.D.F.L. relieving Cadman whose knee would not stand the strain. The Holly started off and were soon testing out Liddle and found him equal to their shots from all quarters. Three quick shots were sent in from close quarters and these he turned aside with ease. There was a merry old tussle in the penalty area for possession but Petterson relieved the strain by sending in a high shot and scored, Liddle being unsuspected and could not make an attempt to save until it was too late.

Satrang went through and shot. Liddle saved but could not get the ball away before Satrang got on to it again and scored after nearly running into the goal with it. The P.D.F.L. took a turn at kicking the ball but had to be contented in midfield with it. They made some nice combination plays but were unable to get in for a good shot. The Holly got the ball away again and combination featured all the way down the pitch, Satrang scoring from the goal line, Liddle having no chance to save. Again they pressed, Liddle running out to save from Petterson who kicked the ball to Satrang who scored from a cork-screw shot from near the corner flag. The P.D.F.L. got some pep now and gave the Holly a lot of work in return for what they gave them and started to press. Both wings worked well and put in some good centres, only to have them turned aside. They missed a couple of good chances to score by being too anxious. They still pressed on and were having all the play now and were rewarded when Robson ran in close with Lucas's pass and shot the ball in between Larmer's legs for a goal. The pace was beginning to tell on the players and the match came to a close with a shot from Satrang scoring the sixth for the Hollinger.

POLICE COURT CASES AT COURT LAST THURSDAY.

At Police Court here last Thursday, before Magistrate Atkinson, Helina Vaisanes was fined \$200.00 and costs for having liquor in a public place. P. Prossi, on a charge of breach of the O.T.A. also contributed in the same way. One young man, arrested while superlatively drunk paid \$50.00 and costs for illegal purchase of liquor.

The woman charged with threatening to shoot her son-in-law was bound over to keep the peace for a year. The charge of assault against the man was dismissed. The gun used by the woman was confiscated.

A fine of \$10.00 and costs was imposed on one man for driving a car without the necessary license.

Further adjournment was made in the case of L. Rubanavitch, of North Bay, charged with taking money for clothing, the money being retained and suits not being delivered.

There was a remand made in the case against a young man of 25, who was accused by the girl's father of perjury in connection with the affidavit for a marriage license. The father says the girl's age is less than 16 years, while 18 years was the age sworn to when application was made for a license. The young couple were married Thursday evening, the young man's arrest following. The man in the case is at present out on bail.
