STEPANIUK REMANDED AGAIN ON MURDER CHARGE

On account of Magistrate Atkinson going to Toronto the latter part of this week, police court here was held on Monday eve, and Tuesday morning, the morning court starting at nine o'clock so as not to conflict with the sitting of the Division Court here on Tuesday. Magistrate Atkinson will hold the next police court here on Thursday, May 7th.

At this week's court there were two drunks and two disorderly conduct cases, each paying \$10.00 and costs. A perjury charge against a young man who had married a girl of sixteen last week was withdrawn, the father of the girl giving his consent and the couple being reunited at the home of the bride's parents after the groom had spent some days under arrest as a result of the case. A traffic case resulted in a fine of \$1.00 and costs.

Pete Stepamiuk, charged with the murder of Mrs. Senuik, was given another remand to next week.

Tony Toronto was fined \$50.00 and costs for illegal purchase of liquor. A raid on his place by the police uncovered several bottles of a sort of home-brew booze with a bad taste and a queer kick.

For next week there will be a number of charges against local men for driving trucks without the necessary chauffeur licenses.

GATHERING ON FRIDAY VOTES FOR J. R. O'NEILL.

A meeting of the Conservative Association of Timmins was called for Friday evening last in the basement of the New Empire Theatre. There was a large attendance, with friends of Mr. J. R. O'Neill largely in the ascendant. On the previous evening there had been a meeting of the Executive at which it was unanimously agreed to submit the names of three candidates mentioned here to the Friday meeting, the two candidates receiving the lowest votes to drop out in the interests of unity and harmony. The Executive unanimously agreed to oppose any of the candidates refusing to agree to the plan. At another Executive meeting on Friday the proposal was modified, it being agreed that the vote to be taken should simply be considered as an expression of the opinion of the Town of Timmins, and while the two candidates receiving the lowest votes, should assist the highest candidate so far as Timmins was concerned, the agreement should not affect outside points, the idea being that Timmins should not attempt to influence the rest of the riding.

Dr. A. S. Porter occupied the chair and explained the agreement as modified. Brief addresses were given by Mr. J. R. O'Neill and G. A. Macdonald on their attitude in the election. Dr. Porter explained the attitude of Dr. Haetschel, who was unable to be present. A vote of the members present being then taken resulted:—O'Neill, 106, Macdonald, 36; Haetschel, 5. The meeting concluded with cheers for Mr. O'Neill.
