AID TO SETTLERS IN THE PURCHASE OF DAIRY COWS

In response to numerous requests
from Northern Ontario settlers, the
government's Department of Agri-
culture has decided to give financial
assistance to settlers in purchasing
dairy cows.
Through the Northern Develop-
ment Branch, according to Hon.
John S. Martin, Minister of Agri-
culture, the government proposes to
advance 75 percent. of the cost
price of the animals, the purchaser
to pay the balance in cash and give
his note and a lien on the animals
as security for the balance, with
interest at 5 percent, to be deducted
from the cream cheques at the
creameries from time to time, in ac-
cordance with arrangements to be
made with the purchasers.
The settlers will name a repre-
sentative to assist the government
officer in the selection of the ani-
mals. The terms are to be available
in any section of Northern Ontario
where the settlers are prepared to
make the purchase in carload lots.

North Bay's tax rate this year
will be 47½ mills. The rate for
1926 may be 50 mills, according to
one prediction made at the North
Bay Council meeting to strike the
rate.

Mr. Leslie McFarlane writes to
deny the authorship of a poem on
women credited to him in a recent
issue of The Advance. Leslie sug-
gests that he knows more about poe-
try than women, and so would not
write the poem credited to him. His

ESTIMATES ARE CUT FOR COLONIZATION ROADS

Estimates for the administration of
justice in Northern Ontario, for the
fiscal year ending October 31st, are
practically unchanged from those of
the present fiscal year, according to
a Legislative blue book just issued.
The costs, by districts, are as follows:
Algoma, \$43,800; Cochrane, \$25,150;
Kenora, \$17,270; Manitoulin, \$11,915;
Nipissing, \$24,100; Parry Sound,
\$18,650; Rainy River, \$20,180; Sud-
bury, \$29,495; Temiskaming, \$23,950;
Thunder Bay, \$32,451; Muskoka, \$14,-
900. The total cost of administration
in the North as shown by the estimates,
is \$261,310, as compared with
\$262,261, in the fiscal year 1925, the
decrease being in slight appropri-
ations not required in Parry Sound,
Thunder Bay and Kenora. These
estimates are made up chiefly in
salaries, fuel, light and water for
jails, court houses, and registries
offices, and general administration.

In the estimates of the Department
of Education, \$113,050 is provided for
the North Bay Normal School, \$77,300
for the English French training
school at Sturgeon Falls and \$88,490
for Monteith Northern Academy,
these figures being unchanged from
last year's estimates.
In the Lands and Forests Depart-
ment, general estimates are reduced
from \$3,056,675 to \$2,639,825, a con-
siderable quantity of this reduction
being in the amount set aside for col-
onization roads, which is this year
\$557,300, as against \$857,300 formerly.
Construction, maintenance and repair
estimates are down from \$490,000 to
\$250,000.

Reductions are noticed in the esti-
mates of the Public Works Dept. for
repairs and alterations to judicial
buildings in the North. In Algoma

the estimates are cut from \$1,800 to
\$800, in Manitoulin from \$1,400 to
\$500, in Muskoka from \$1,000 to \$500,
in Nipissing from \$1,500 to \$1,000, in
Thunder Bay from \$800 to \$500 and
in Sudbury from \$1,000 to \$500.

The sum of \$6,000 for construction
of works and buildings, purchase of
livestock, farm machinery etc., is
noted for Burwash Industrial farm,
and \$25,000 is to be voted for a new
jail for Nipissing. The Burwash esti-
mates are reduced from \$241,200 to
\$240,550. This reduction is on salaries
the superintendent's salary being re-
duced from \$3,300 to \$2,800, and the
farm manager from \$2,200 to \$2,050.
