The march was creditable in its orderliness and in the way the marchers went the full route, despite the disagreeable weather. Just about the time the parade started a snow-storm came along, together with a bitter wind. On the return march there were many of the youngsters crying with the cold and discomfort. The parade went to Schumacher for speech-making there later returning to Timmins to quietly disperse.

A picket was set out for the 3.00 a.m. shift to dissuade men from going to work. In a few cases men were right across to the Rochester track crossing. Some of the men objected to being stopped and the police were sent for. Chief Greer and his staff, assisted by Provincial Officers Finger and Kenny visited the line of pickets and sent them all about their affairs. The police handled the matter with good judgment and efficiency and were complimented on may sides for the general good handling of the day and of this sort of trouble developed, the orderly conduct of events in general reflecting credit not only on the paraders but also on the capable way in which the police looked after the situation throughout.
