

SUNDAY MAY THE 10th WILL BE "MOTHER'S" DAY

Red Flower to be Worn in Honour of Living Mothers, and White Flowers for Those Passed Away.

Sunday, May 10th, is set aside to be observed as Mother's Day. Those who have the privilege of having their mothers still on earth will wear a red flower, while white flowers will be worn in memory of the mothers who have passed away.

Contrary to the opinion of many Mother's Day is not an event of recent establishment or a merely modern fad. It is rather a revival of a very old observance.

In early days in England, Mother's Day was kept in the middle of Lent, but in the 16th century it was generally observed on a Sunday early in May. It was usually called "Mothering Sunday" then, because on that day sons and daughters living away from home went a-mothering, that is, went trooping back to the parental roof.

PULP AND PAPER MILLS MAKE 1925 AGREEMENT

Companies and Unions Reach Satisfactory Basis After Consideration.

Last Friday there were the usual yarns and rumours about the possibility of a strike at Iroquois Falls. Some of the ideal stories even went the length of saying that the Abitibi Co. employees had all quit work on May 1st.

Mr. R. A. McInnis, general manager of the Abitibi Power & Paper Co., Iroquois Falls; Col. Jones, of the Spanish River Pulp & Paper Co., operating mills at Sault Ste. Marie, Espanola and Sturgeon Falls; Mr. Gilkey, general manager of the Minnesota and Ontario Pulp & Paper Co., operating at International Falls, Fort Frances and Kenora; were among the executives present at the Conference.

After a thorough discussion of all the matters at issue, agreement was reached last week and an agreement has been duly signed by the mills and by the local and international delegates as representing the men.

The agreement, which is understood to be much the same as last year's agreement, will hold good until May 1st of next year.

ABOUT 575 IN MAY DAY PARADE HERE ON FRIDAY

March Orderly and Quiet. Picketing Carried on to Some Extent.

The third May Day Parade for Timmins took place last Friday with about 575 men, women and children in the line of March. One man who carefully counted all on the parade gave the actual number as 572, including the women and children.

The parade started from the Miners' Union Hall, and made quite an imposing appearance, being stretched out along the road in impressive way. The Porcupine Miners' Union including many foreigners, was followed by the Ukrainians, Finlanders and other definite foreign labour society men and women, and the I. W. W. followed these in the parade.

A picket was set out for the 3.00 a.m. shift to dissuade men from going to work. In a few cases men were turned back, but the great majority passed the pickets.

There were, however, one or two interesting incidents. One of the workmen at the mine was set upon by a couple of the May Day men, following some heated discussion, and the worker was beaten up. There was another incident, on the other foot, as it were. Two of the pickets stopped a worker on the way to the mine, halting him near the station.
