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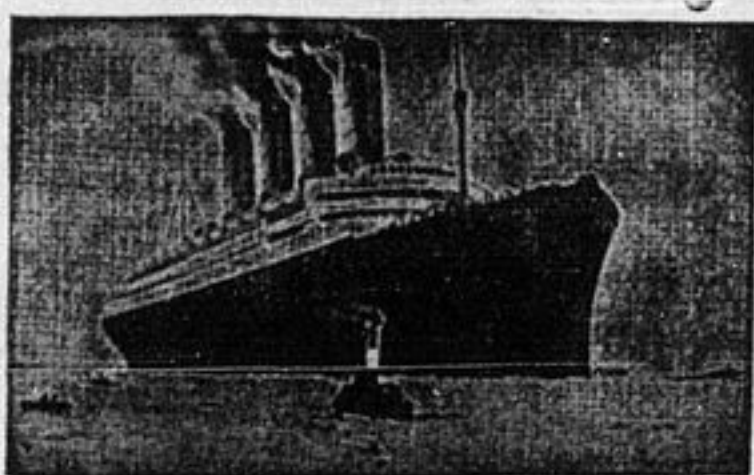

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**RAILROAD MAN'S PRAYER IN MR. J. PRICE'S POCKET**

Interesting and Touching Fact Referred to at Memorial Service.

There will be very general interest in the following from the last issue of The New Liskeard Speaker. The interest will be two-fold; the prayer referred to has interest on account of its clever following of railroad terms, and in addition it will be of special interest because the late Mr. Price was formerly at Porcupine and was well known and popular in this Camp. The following is the article from The Speaker last week under the heading of Englehart News:—

"A very impressive memorial service was delivered in the United Church, of which Mr. Price was Treasurer, by the Pastor-Rev. A. Gillies, last Sunday evening to a large congregation, L. O. L. 2003, of which deceased was an active member, attended in a body and occupied the entire centre pews. The text chosen was the second verse of the first chapter of Joshua, being part of the scripture lesson and laid great stress on "who is going to be Joshua," now a great leader is gone. The church was beautifully draped, vases of lilies and white silk ribbon with the words "In Loving Memory" in gold letter. During the sermon the pastor read the following prayer which was found in the pocket of the deceased's every day coat, showing distinctly the caliber of his high ideals.

"O Lord, we meet as a body of railroad men, with our wives and daughters to consult for our interest. We are reminded that life itself is a train and the road to heaven a railroad, God's truth the rail, God's love the fire and His promises the signal lights. Oh, we recognize Thee as the General Manager of our road, the Superintendent of our train and Chief Dispatcher. Thou didst survey the right-of-way and Thy Son didst purchase it with his blood. Thou didst lay the track and ballast the road; Thou hast furnished the rolling stock; Thou art the owner and controller of all. We look to Thee for all our orders and Thou must sign the checks for our daily bread. Be merciful in handling our human mistakes and blunders and do not discharge Thy unworthy servants.

"We are grateful for the Bible, Thy book of rules and instruction; be merciful in our examination and look with charity upon our failures. Thy promises and warnings are our headlights and hand lanterns; help us to use them so as to save our train from wreck. Deliver us from broken rails blind switches, false signals and mistaken orders. Be with us on every high bridge of responsibility, on every sharp curve of emergency and in every dark tunnel of trouble let the light of Thy Promises shine out bright. Grant us passes for our wives and children and let them be with us. When the storms of temptation and trial come, save us from the fatal slides and washouts that have wrecked so many trains on the road of life. Let our way, be kept secure by Thy guardian care, always show the steel rail and rock ballast, and be solid and firm and free from destruction. Deliver us from snares of our enemy. May the headlight of the truth shine bright on a thrown switch, false signal or fatal obstruction placed for the wreckage of our train. May the emergency brake of a strong will save us.

"As we make our last run, headed homeward, if it be Thy will, order our train in on time. Let the light of Thy promises burn bright to light the last dark tunnel of death. As we run through to the Grand Central Station of the skies, may we have the approving smile of the General Manager and Superintendent; sign with joy the payroll, receive our wages, and have an eternal lay-off with God and angels and loved ones at home. And we will praise Thee forever. Amen."

"Quick, quick!" said the first man to the taxi driver. "Get me away quick, or they'll kill me." He took the speedy runner to the address given, figuring that even if the others were after him for as serious a thing as murder, it would be easy to locate the man again at his stopping place. Returning up town the taxi driver encountered a couple of the chasers who were very wrathful because they had not secured the man they had chased. They said he had been in a little Black Jack game in Moneta and had grabbed a \$20.00 bill from the pot and beat it. They had naturally followed the fellow, not the swallow. "Better tell your troubles to a policeman," said the taxi driver. When Deputy Chief Salley was informed of the alleged theft of \$20.00 he was sympathetic enough to arrest the man accused of taking the money and running. This man, Matt Kolman, insisted that the \$20.00 was his own money; that he had lost enough and did not want to play any more, especially not to lose the roll he was carrying and which he had planned to use in building a house for himself. Matt said he just took back his own money and "yumped away quick out." Both stories agreed that a Black Jack game had been in progress, so again the Deputy Chief showed sympathy.
