

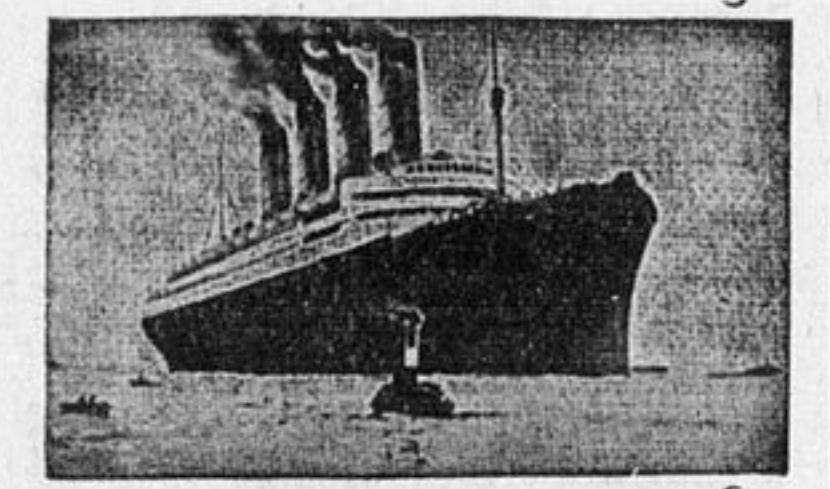

**TEN ARRESTS LAST WEEK ON HIGH-GRADE CHARGES**

Jeweler and Dentist Included in Those Arrested. Two Given Jail Terms. Others Remanded to This Week.

Last week following investigations made covering a period of some months by Special Agent R. Allen and other operatives here, ten men in town were arrested on charges of illegal possession of gold ore, the arrests being made by the town police after warrants had been sworn out by R. Allen. Those arrested were:—E. Kelly, P. Kryholowich, Mike Roski, Chambers, J. Gregoris, Wm. Sargeant, T. Bodnick, J. E. Garrett, Dr. Jackson and W. Sharp. In the searches accompanying the arrests a quantity of gold ore was found in practically every case, and in addition it is understood that there is other evidence of the illegal sale or purchase of gold ore. When the cases were called on Thursday last W. Sharp and W. Sargeant both entered pleas of guilty. Sargeant was sentenced to thirty days and Sharp to three months, by Magistrate Atkinson. The other cases were remanded to this week, some of the accused being out on bail in the meantime.

A sentence of six months was imposed on a woman charged with vagrancy. The charge against a man found in the house when the police raided the place was dismissed.

Fines of \$10.00 and costs were imposed on a couple of men for not having chauffeur's licenses. Two other fines were imposed for other breaches of the Motor Act.

The three charges of gambling arising from an alleged black jack game in Moneta some evenings ago were adjourned to this week.

Four drunks paid the usual \$10.00 and costs each.

P. Stepaniuk was committed for trial on a charge of murder, as noted elsewhere in this issue.

**BIG SMOKE STACK PUT UP ON DOUBLE DIAMOND MILL**

Friday last at 2.55 p.m. the big smoke stack on the big new mill of the Double Diamond Lumber Company was erected without mishap. The stack is 42 inches in diameter and 85 feet high. **CASES AGAINST LOCAL DRUG STORES DISPOSED OF**

The cases against several local drug stores in the Camp, as laid by Inspector Hopkins, of the License Dept., were finally disposed of last week. The Timmings Drug Co., was fined \$300.00; Pillsworth Co., \$100.00 and the charges against Ryan Murray Drug Co., E. R. Riggs, and J. R. Todd, South Porcupine were dismissed. The Inspector suffered in the close cross-examination made by Mr. W. A. Gordon, of Haileybury, who was counsel for some of the drug stores. The case against the New Ontario Drug Store, Moneta, was remanded to this week.

**BAND CONCERT ON MAY 24 IN GOLDFIELDS THEATRE**

**Protest Against One Form of Poor Kind of Sportsmanship**

**Secretary of Football Club Asks Public to Cut Out the Mean and Uncalled-for Personal Remarks Sometimes Heard at Matches Here Recently to the Disgrace of the Fans Who Make Them.**

The following letter was received this week from W. A. Field, Secretary of the Timmings Football Club, and is published at the request of Mr. Field, and explains itself:—  
 Timmings, May 18th, 1925.  
 Editor of The Porcupine Advance.

Dear Sir:—Please give this the most publicity possible in your valuable paper. It is a few words of protest from our Norwegian boys who are playing for the Hollinger Football Team and the Timmings Football Club. There are no cleaner football players than these boys, nor any better bunch of sports in this town than these Norwegian lads. They, every one of them, play the real kind of football from the start to the finish of the match, never once bothering about the man, but with their eyes on the ball all the time. For these men to have to listen to abuse from uncleaned mouths is not right and something the sporting public of this town will not stand for.

The particular case to which I refer was in a match between the Hollinger and Lancastrians, when some of the spectators instead of boosting the team they were supporting, in a good sportsmanlike way, had to—I was going to say "lower themselves," but perhaps it would be more correct in saying that it is all that can be expected from snuff,—call out "Get them G—d—Swedes, or kick their feet from under them," and other such unsportsmanlike remarks.

Of course this kind of stuff only comes from a few, and at least one of these offenders is known to me. As far as the Timmings Football Club is concerned he will be denied the right of admission to the grounds to any of our events. I have been approached by some of the football fans to do something in this matter, so when I was approached by a friend of these Norwegian lads telling me that

they resented this kind of treatment and asking for something to be done about it, I decided to take this course to try and improve the moral effect which the fans have on our players and the game itself.

Football is going ahead by leaps and bounds. Both the N.O.F.A. and the P.D.F.L. are doing everything possible to improve the game, with the co-operation of the affiliated clubs. So, it is up to the general public to do their bit and boost the game in a proper sporting spirit and keep per-

sonal remarks out of it, especially improper language.
