SAD DEATH OF J. LARDON ON THURSDAY AFTERNOON.

Mr. James Lardon, as employee of the Canada Power Co., for about a year past, met death on Thursday afternoon last, falling from a pole at the Vipond mine and breaking his neck. The unfortunate man dropped some 30 or 40 feet to the ground. The power was turned off while the men were working on the line, but there were evidences that Mr. Vardon received an electric shock that caused him to fall from the pole. The coroner's jury returned a verdict of death through accident, the cause of death being a broken neck, caused by a fall, and the fall being due to an electric shock.

The late James Lardon had many friends here and there is general sorrow at his untimely death. He was only 23 years of age and leaves a widow and infant child. To these the deepest sympathy goes out.

The remains were shipped to West Bathurst, N.B., his old home, for interment.
