The Consumption of Tea

Tea as a beverage is used in nearly every country in the world. It is estimated over 200 billion cups are consumed annually. Australia leads in tea drinking with an annual per capita consumption of about nine pounds, which means that every Australian consumes from six to eight cups of tea every day. The consumption per capita in England is 8½ lbs., and in Canada nearly 5 lbs. In the United States, it is less than 1 lb., but this is largely because Americans have not been able to get fine teas until comparatively recently. MARRIAGES OF 1810 AND 1812 IN NIAGARA DISTRICT

Mr. J. C. Hall, of Porcupine, last week favoured The Advance with a copy of The Welland Tribune and Telegraph containing an interesting reference to marriage ceremonies in the Niagara district around 115 years ago. Mr. Hull is a native of Niagara Falls, his people being U. E. Loyalist stock. Like Mr. Harry Preston, whose story appeared in The Advance last week, Mr. Hull when younger acted as a guide in Niagara district, and has the story of that district at his finger ends in full details. And in passing it may be noted that no section of Canada is richer in historical interest than the Niagara Peninsula.

The two marriages referred to in The Welland Tribune and Telegraph are those of Jacob Gainer and Christeanah Slow, in 1810, and Smith Shotwell and Mary Crawford, in 1812. The former couple were married by a Justice of the Peace, the certificate reading as follows:—

"Whereas Jacob Gainer and Christeanah Slow of Pelham, Niagara District, were desirous of intermarrying with each other, and there being no parson or minister of the Church of England living within eighteen miles of them, they have applied to me for that purpose.

"Now these are to certify that in pursuance of the powers granted by an Act of Legislature of this Province, passed in the thirty-third year of His Majesty's Justices of the Peace, having caused the previous notice by the Statute required to be given, have this day married the said Jacob Gainer and Christeanah Slow together and they are legally contracted to each other in marriage.

The Shotwell-Crawford marriage was without established church clergyman or justice of the peace. It was according to the forms of the Society of Friends otherwise known as the Quakers. Here is the ancient marriage certificate, dated 1812, as given by the Welland newspaper:—

SMITH SHOTWELL, of the Township of Thorold, County of Lincoln and Province of Upper Canada, son of William Shotwell and Elizabeth his wife, and Mary Crawford, daughter of James Crawford and Amy his wife, of the Township of Pelham, and County and Province aforesaid, having laid their intentions of marriage with each other before two Monthly Meetings of the Religious Society of Friends held at Pelham and Black Creek in the Province aforesaid; they having consent of Parents and Nothing appearing to obstruct, their proposals of Marriage was allowed of by the Meeting; These are to Certify, that for the accomplishment of their intentions, this Nineteenth Day of the Second Month in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and twelve. They, the said Smith Shotwell and Mary Crawford appeared in a public meeting of the said Society held at Pelham, and the said Smith Shotwell taking the said Mary Crawford by the hand, Did on this solemn occasion declare that he took her to be his wife, Promising through Divine assistance to be unto her a faithful and loving husband, until separated by death, or words to that effect; and then the said Mary Crawford, did, in like manner declare that she took the said Smith Shotwell to be her husband promising through Divine assistance to be unto him a loving and faithful wife, until separated by death, or words to that import; and they the said Smith Shotwell and Mary Crawford, she according to the custom of marriage assuming the name of her husband as a further confirmation thereof did then and there to these presents set their hands.

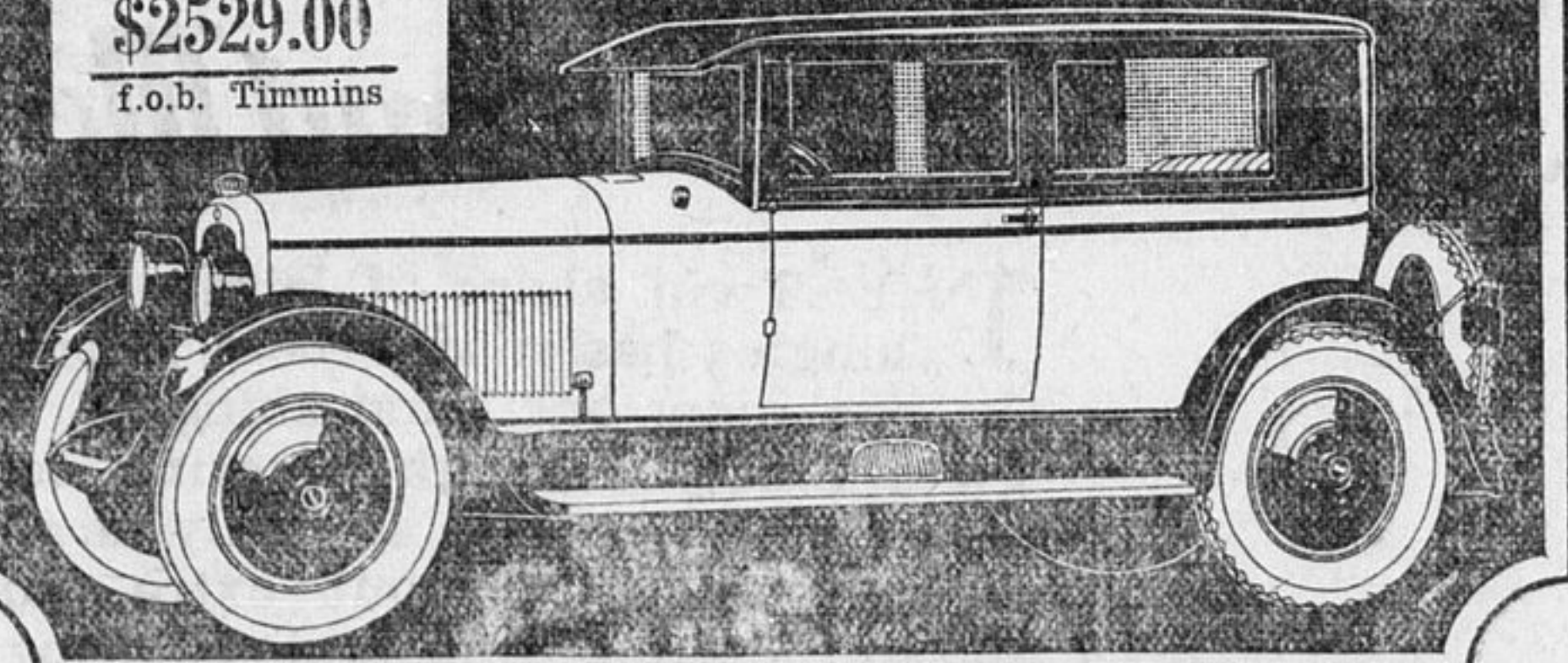
