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GIRL FROM KAPUSKASING IN JAIL ESCAPE TRAGEDY

Matron Waylaid and Bound by Girls, and Later Found Dead in Lavatory.

As a result of the desperate bid for liberty made by three inmates of the Girls' Jail Farm near Toronto, the matron, Mrs. Margaret A. Micks, aged 55, is dead; Jeanette McMinn, aged 16, whose mother is understood to live at Kapuskasing, is under arrest on a charge of murder; and two other young women, Isabel Prouse, 21 years, and Bessie Carroll, 16 years, have also been placed under arrest. Three Toronto men have also been arrested on charges of aiding the girls in escaping from the jail farm. The escape of the three girls took place on Sunday night of last week, the body of the matron being found on Monday morning tied to the pipes in the lavatory. The McMinn girl is said to have been the ringleader and to have enticed the matron to her cell, where the other girls, who had been assisted to get out of their cells, helped to choke Mrs. Micks into insensibility. The McMinn girl managed to wriggle her slim and wiry body through the food chute in the door of her cell. Then she managed to open the doors of the cells of the two other girls. The three girls then waylaid the matron, choking her into insensibility, tying her up, and then taking her keys to allow the trio to get out of the jail building. The McMinn girl was arrested at Oshawa.

MATHESON SYNDICATE STARTS DEVELOPMENT

ANTI-UNIONISTS FILE DISSENT AT PRESBYTERY

"A dissent, signed by Rev. J. A. MacInnis, minister of St. Andrew's Presbyterian Church, New Liskeard, and by James Paterson, elder, Englehart, against the merging of Presbytery in a new body and proclaiming their intention (with as many as will adhere to them) to continue the Presbytery of Temiskaming as a court of the Presbyterian Church, was presented by Mr. MacInnis at the final meeting of the Presbytery before the consummation of union. The session was held in New Liskeard on Tuesday of this week.

"Mr. MacInnis, as Moderator, occupied the chair, but he resigned his office during the day, and this will take effect on June 10, when Church Union will become an accomplished fact. His successor in the chair will be Rev. J. D. Parks, minister of Byrnes' Presbyterian Church, Timmins. Mr. MacInnis was appointed Interim Moderator for St. Paul's Presbyterian Church, Englehart (which is not entering the union), in room of Rev. J. O. Watts, Haileybury, United Church, who resigned. Rev. C. T. Sylvester, former pastor of the Englehart church, resigned his charge some time ago as the result of difference of opinion over the burning question, and his resignation was accepted by Presbytery.

"Matheson congregation again asked that it be provided with a minister of its own, instead of being merged with Monteith. Presbytery gave the request a sympathetic hearing and Mr. Sylvester goes to that field. His successor in the United Church at Englehart is Rev. Archie Gillies, who was welcomed to the Presbytery. Mr. Watts reported that in consultation with the Methodist districts, boundaries for the Presbyteries to function as courts of the United Church of Canada in the territory covered by the Presbytery of Temiskaming, has been agreed upon. Presbytery recommended the same to the General Assembly and the General Council."

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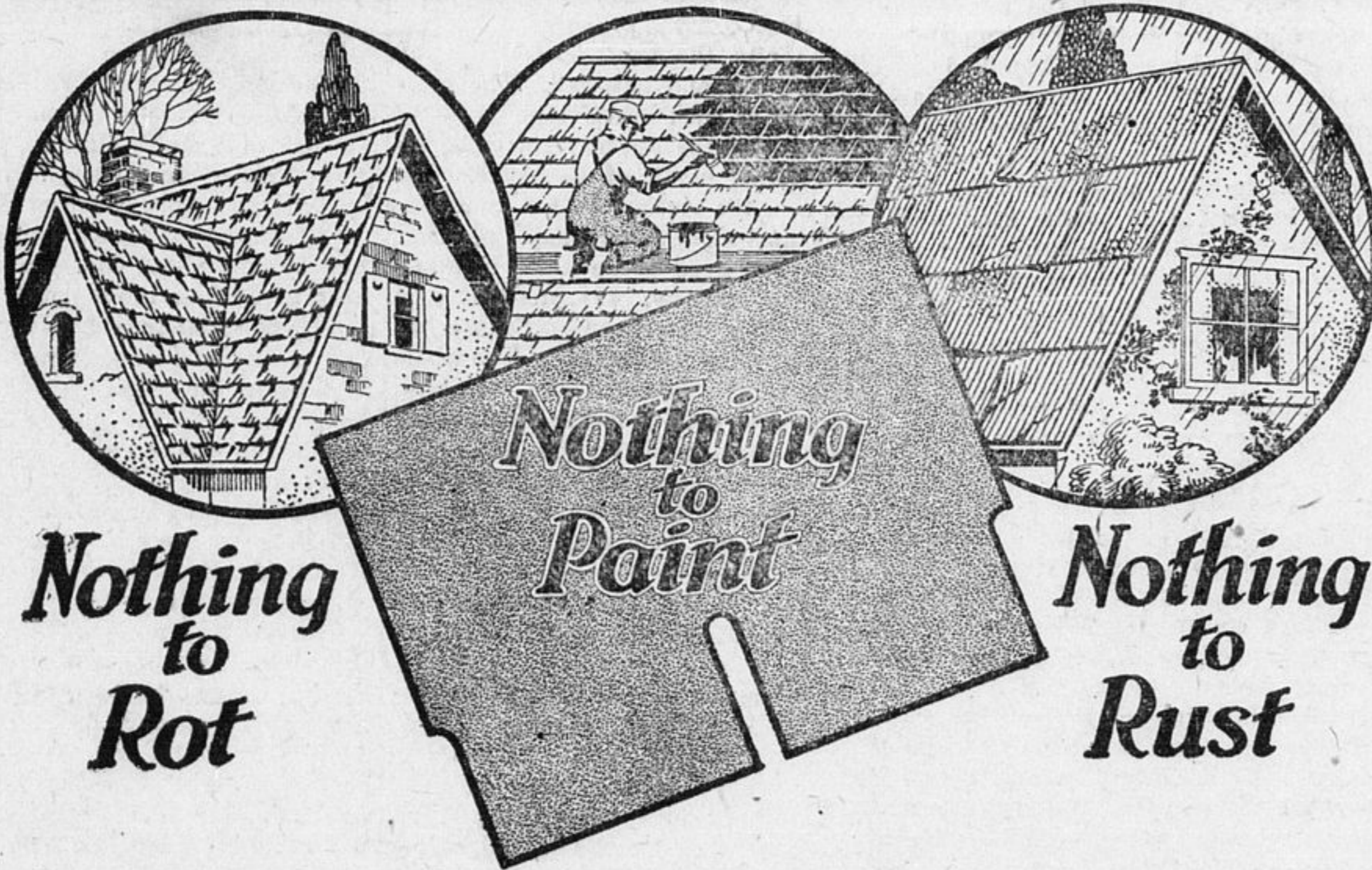
