Hydroplane Flights Feature at South Porcupine July 1st

Passengers to be Taken Over Whole Porcupine in the Air for \$5.00 per Head. Also Remarkable Aerial Fireworks Display and Many Other Special Features at Annual Tournament and Field Day of Temiskaming Firemen.

South Porcupine has an enviable reputation for thoroughness and efficiency in anything undertaken, and so the Annual Tournament and Field Day of the Temiskaming Firemen, to be held this year at South Porcupine on July 1st, may be confidently expected to even excel the previous days put on by the Firemen. South Porcupine has taken up the big day with a will, and the preliminary announcement of the day's programme is certainly attractive. WORK STARTED THIS WEEK ON WILSON AVENUE ROAD

17-foot Road, 16-foot Top, Asphalt Penetration. Government to Pay Half the Cost.

McNamara Bros. started this week on the work of construction of the roadway to the River—Wilson Avenue. This is part of the highway from South Porcupine, and as such the Government was naturally expected to pay part of the cost. The Government agreed to this, and will pay 50 per cent. of the cost of this strip of roadway, the rest of the expense to be borne by the Town.

At the Council meeting last week a resolution was passed to proceed with the work as soon as the Government officially agreed to the 50-50 plan. Hon. Mr. Lyons had viewed the road while on a visit here last year and had practically agreed to the plan suggested by the Town. Last week the agreement was confirmed by Hon. Mr. Lyons and the work will be proceeded with and rushed to completion.

The total cost of this strip of road is estimated at \$30,000.00, of which amount the Town will pay half and the Government the other half, as part of the highway. The road will be 17-foot, with 16-foot top, asphalt penetration, 8 inches, (5-inch base and 3-inch top).

FINED \$500.00 AND COSTS FOR MUCH TOO MUCH WINE

Another Committed for Trial on High Grade Charges. Other Court Cases Thursday.

At police court on Thursday F. Patchinna was fined \$500.00 and costs for breach of the Ontario Temperance Act. Patchinna's house in the Bartleman Townsite was searched by the Provincial and Township Police and ten barrels of wine found, according to the evidence. There seemed also to be some home-brew kind of alcohol on the premises. According to the evidence given by one of the neighbours the place seemed to be visited frequently by bunches of men. Also, this evidence suggested that men went in sober and out otherwise. Patchinna and some of his friends gave evidence not only contradicting some of the evidence of the prosecution but also contradicting what appeared to the magistrate as the facts of the case. After the evidence was in, Magistrate Atkinson imposed the fine of \$500.00 and costs.

After a preliminary hearing, J. E. Garrett was committed for trial on charges of illegalities connected with gold ore. The case against T. Bodinuk, in connection with the high-grading charges, was remanded for a week. P. Krysholowuk and J. Gregoris, on high-grade charges, were each fined \$200.00 and costs. Mr. W. A. Gordon, of Haileybury, appeared for J. E. Garrett and some of the others charged with high-grading. Crown Attorney Greer, of Cochrane, acted for the prosecution.

On a charge of being found in a disorderly house Tony Jurnto pleaded guilty and was fined \$20.00 and costs. He was one of the men found at the Prince of Wales Hotel last week when the police raided a couple of the rooms there where immoral traffic was alleged to be in progress.

Four drunks paid \$10.00 and costs each. One extra special drunk contributed \$30.00 and costs.

Two merchants for violation of the early closing by-law were assessed \$5.00 and costs each.

Two men on disorderly charges were taxed \$10.00 and costs. A third man was dismissed on a similar charge.

MATCH BETWEEN TOWN A. AND LANCS NOT PLAYED

The match in the P.D.F.L. series scheduled for last Thursday evening between Town A. and Lancastrians was not played owing to the Lancastrians being unable to muster up a team.

Plans are under way to establish a hospital at Kirkland Lake. A board of directors has been elected and these directors were authorized to go ahead with the erection of the building at the earliest possible moment. Mr. Harry Oakes has offered an excellent site, and the Township of Teek will issue debentures for \$15,000.00 for the new hospital.
