**KEY FROM McINTYRE GOLD  
FOR "CANADA" BUILDING**

Silver Key for Keeley and Nickel from  
Sudbury Metal.

The "Canada Building," the  
Dominion's new headquarters in Tra-  
falgar Square, London, England, will  
be formally opened, by His Majesty  
King George V and Her Majesty  
Queen Mary, on June 29th. Three  
keys will be used,—one of gold one of  
silver and one from nickel—all made  
from metal from Canada's mines.  
The three keys are made in the same  
design. The design embodies the  
Crown, the Empire's Flag, the Cana-  
dian Beaver, and the Maple Leaf,  
with an insert design of the "Canada  
Building." On the back of each key  
is an inscription saying that the key  
was made of Canadian gold, sil-  
ver or nickel, from the McIntyre,  
Keeley or Sudbury mine, as the case  
may be.

There are four sets of keys, one  
for the King, one for the Queen, one  
for Canada's Prime Minister, Hon. W.  
L. Mackenzie King, and one for Can-  
ada's High Commissioner, Hon. Peter  
Larkin. Each of the mining compa-  
nies which contributed the metal have  
received a copy of the key to be used.  
The gold key is made from metal  
taken from the McIntyre mines at  
Schumacher, Ont., and the silver key  
from metal taken from the Keeley  
mines in the South Lorrain area. The  
nickel key is made of nickel from the  
Mond Nickel Mines at Sudbury.

**NO LAW WILL TAKE THE  
PLACE OF COMMON SENSE**

A little girl in Montreal was  
brought to death on Empire Day  
through injuries received when a fire-  
cracker placed in a tin can exploded  
and scattered shivers of tin in all  
directions. One piece of tin pierced  
the child's head. On the same day at  
Winnipeg several fires were caused  
through the use of fireworks. Two  
soldiers, who had been victims of  
shell shock, were thrown into convul-  
sions when fire-crackers were explod-  
ed behind them. Several children in  
Winnipeg were injured in the eyes by  
fireworks, some of the youngsters be-  
ing practically certain to lose the  
sight of one or both eyes as a result  
of the use of fire-crackers. In Tim-  
mins there were a few minor acci-  
dents,—nothing serious, but still  
enough to show the danger. Other  
towns throughout Canada had acci-  
dents of one kind or another result-  
ing from the use of fireworks. Every  
year in the United States there is an  
imposing list of fatalities result-  
ing from the celebration of national hol-  
idays by the use of fireworks of one  
kind or another. There is a general  
tendency to suggest that something  
should be done about it. But what?  
The prohibition of the use, or even  
the manufacture, of fireworks would  
not remedy the situation. If there  
were no fireworks of any kind avail-  
able legally, some enterprising boot-  
legger would change from firewater  
to firework peddling. Even if fire-  
works were completely banished from  
the earth, the careless and the foolish  
would still find methods of killing and  
injuring themselves and others. What  
seems to be needed to avoid tragedy  
is a more general spirit of thought-  
fulness and carefulness. All sorts of  
attractive fireworks—some beauti-  
ful, some novel and some noisy—may  
be used with about perfect safety, if  
a little care and a little sense are  
used. Children should remember that  
smouldering fire-crackers should not  
be thrown around carelessly—for these  
may cause fires and heavy losses.  
Youngsters and others should culti-  
vate sense enough to know that while  
it may look smart to hold a fire-crack-  
er in the hand while it explodes, still  
a fellow feels foolish if he is minus a  
hand the next time firecrackers are  
being set off. Grown-ups should re-  
member that throwing things around  
carelessly is nearly always foolish or  
worse, and not an eye specialist or  
doctor will give them a cent, or a good  
word even, for injuring or blinding  
the eyes of any innocent friend or by-  
stander. Also, better sense and good  
sportsmanship would be shown by  
avoiding the supposedly smart tricks  
of startling people by exploding fire-  
works close by them. Surely no one  
would care to be responsible for any  
serious illness or accident through this  
type of senseless—perverted humor.  
This is an age of "nerves," and seri-  
ous consequences not only are possible,  
but are actually happening quite fre-  
quently, through this idiotic type of  
alleged humor. There are nerve-worn  
people, shell shocked soldiers, nerv-  
ous women and children, and har-  
rassed men, to all of whom this type  
of shock is far from funny. It is real  
injury, painful always and in some  
cases permanently serious. New laws  
and prohibitions are not so necessary  
as a wholesome use of common sense,  
common decency and good sportsman-  
ship.

**ANNUAL AGRICULTURE  
STATISTICS OF CANADA.**

It is announced by the Dominion  
Bureau of Statistics at Ottawa that  
the annual census of field crops and  
live stock for 1925 will be made this  
June. These statistics are collected  
jointly by the Dominion and Provin-  
cial Governments by means of ear-  
board schedules issued to farmers  
through the rural school teachers and  
children. In British Columbia they  
are mailed direct to the farmers.  
These schedules call for the acreage  
sown this year to the principal field  
crops and for the numbers of farm  
animals alive on the farm in mid-  
June. The areas thus collected form  
the basis of the annual statistics of  
acreage and yield. It is very impor-  
tant for all classes in Canada that  
correct statistics of agriculture pro-  
duction should be published, but it is  
especially so for farmers themselves  
who through co-operative wheat pools  
are now undertaking to market their  
own wheat and other products; be-  
cause accurate statistics are essential  
to the fixing of fair prices. Any far-  
mer who has not received the blank  
cardboard schedule through the rural  
school of his school district or other-  
wise by the middle of June should  
make immediate application for same,  
either to the teacher of the Public  
School District in which he resides,  
to the Provincial Department of Ag-  
riculture at the capital of his provin-  
ce, or to the Dominion Statistician  
at Ottawa.

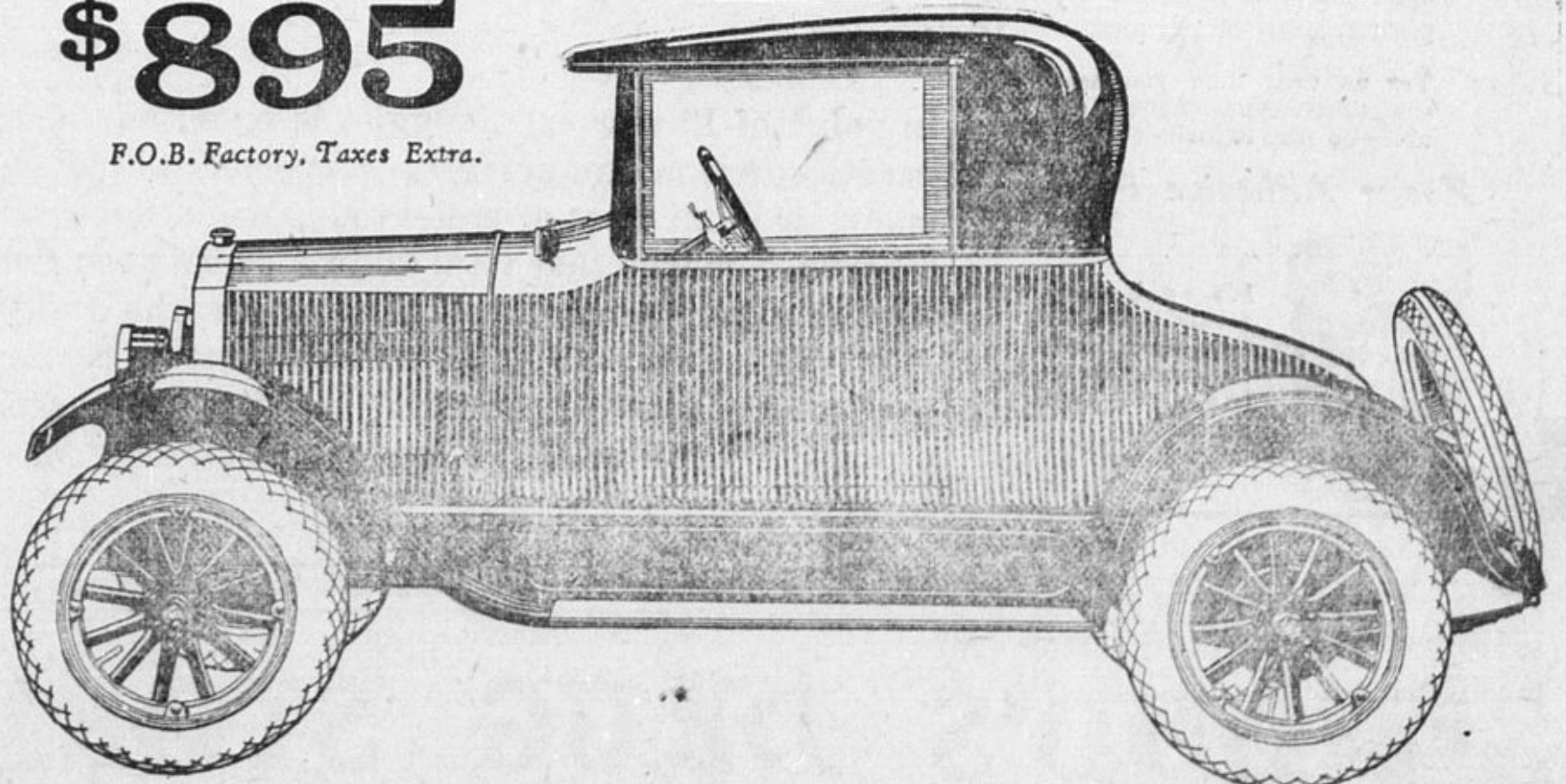
