6. Umpires shall be arranged for between managers.
7. Ground rules for the various grounds shall be arranged between managers and umpires before each game.

THREE SMALL FIRES IN LESS THAN 24 HOURS.

Inside 20 hours the fire brigade had no less than three alarms, all of which were very promptly responded to. In only one of the cases was there any particular damage done, and that case was not a fire in the ordinary sense, but simply a motor burning out.

There was an alarm at 4 p.m. on Wednesday, from Box 14. The fire, if such it might be termed, was at the Timmins Provision Co. store, in the basement of the building. It was the motor in connection with the refrigerator plant that had burned out. It made a desperate amount of smoke, but there was little, if any, fire. The damage will be about \$200.00, there being also a small loss from smoke. This fire was attended to by the use of the chemical tanks only. The water lines were placed in readiness but it was not necessary to use them, the chemical doing the trick.

At 10.50 a.m. Thursday, there was an alarm from Box 61. Stovepipes in the home of Mr. Philbert, corner Pine and Kirby caught fire. Again, the chemical was all that was needed. No damage was done.

Again, at 1.30 p.m., there was a still alarm—(a telephone call) from A. Brazeau & Sons, 16 Cedar Street, South. A torch under a bench had set fire to some woodwork. The chemical once more proved its value and this fire also was soon settled. There was little damage done.

Since the beginning of the year there have been 51 calls for the fire brigade. This is one more than for the same period last year, when there were just exactly half a hundred alarms from Jan. 1st, to June 6th. Most people think there have been more calls this year than last, but the excess is not material. Last year's calls were "bunched," there being about 18 or 19 in the month of March alone. This year they have been spread more evenly. To date, as noted there is one more fire call recorded than for the same period last year.

ONE MAN KILLED ANOTHER BLINDED BY LIGHTNING

Last week at Spanish, on the line from Sudbury to the Sault, one man was killed and another blinded for life by lightning. In addition several head of cattle were destroyed during the severe electrical storm. A man named Laforce and a companion were employed near the R. C. Boys' Industrial school, and were driving their teams to shelter when the lightning struck. Laforce was killed and his companion rendered totally and permanently blind, according to the doctors. A man nearby escaped injury. Four horses were killed in the storm, as well as a number of cattle.

PORCUPINE-DAVIDSON ACTION SETTLED LAST WEEK

Under order of the Master in Chambers, \$200,000 was paid out of court last week on the settlement of the action brought by the Porcupine Davidson Gold Mines, Ltd., against H. H. Sutherland and R. E. Evans. Under the settlement the action is dismissed, and \$25,000 goes to Mr. Sutherland while the balance goes to the company.

The action arose following a change of officers of the company at a special meeting held last September. Mr. Sutherland was formerly managing director and Mr. Evans was secretary-treasurer. After the change in officers the new officers called upon Sutherland and Evans to deliver the books and property of the company. This was refused.

The sum of \$200,000 in Dominion of Canada Victory bonds was in possession of the former officers, and was deposited in the Standard Bank. The bank was originally named as a defendant to the action, but the action against it was dismissed upon the payment into court of the \$200,000.

There will be general sympathy with Rev. G. N. Simmons, pastor of the New Liskeard Baptist church, who is well known in Timmins, in the recent death of his mother at Courtland Ont. His mother had reached the great age of 92 years and 7 months. Rev. Mr. Simmons' father died two years ago, after a happy married life of sixty-five years.
