LESS THAN A DOZEN CASES AT POLICE COURT FRIDAY

On account of the marriage on Wednesday at Haileybury of the Magistrate's daughter, police court was not held here last week until Friday. Instead of the large number of cases common for some recent weeks, there were only a few charges to be held and none of them held very special interest for any but those concerned. Indeed, many who usually follow police court proceedings and attend the sessions, acted and spoke this week as if there were no court at all. But there were about a dozen cases at that.

There were three drunks, the rate charged in each case being \$10.00 and costs.

Two men were fined \$10.00 and costs each for indecent exposure. These men were bathing or swimming in the river near the bridge without being clothed in anything more than a smile. In view of the fact that so many people pass over the bridge and use the river banks for strolling upon, the naked bathers can not be permitted. Last year there were several complaints in regard to this matter and the police this year intend to stop the practice right at the start. Before the river can be used for bathing purposes, the bather must have more clothes on than usually worn by Mack Sennett girls.

Annie Panquette was sentenced to not less than three months nor more than two years, the nominal charge against her being vagrancy. She was taken from the train at Timmins the same day that thirteen other women were put on the train and shipped to North Bay. She was sent to North Bay last week.

A charge of the possession of stolen goods was remanded to this week.

Formal remand was made in the cases of Mr. and Mrs. L. Maki, of Moneta, these cases to come up this week. For these cases the four operators from Toronto will be present again to give evidence. In case of a conviction, the accused will have to bear the cost of bringing back the operators to town. The remand in this case was made to allow the accused to have the services of Mr. W. A. Gordon, of Haileybury, as counsel.

There were a couple of wage cases in which the employer was ordered to pay stated amounts and costs. Another wage case was remanded to this week.

SCHUMACHER ORGANIZES CALEDONIAN SOCIETY

Largely Attended and Enthusiastic Meeting in McIntyre Hall Last Friday Evening.

On Friday evening last in the McIntyre Hall, Schumacher, another Caledonian Society was organized and the Schumacher Caledonians are away to a very auspicious and promising start.

Many of the Scottish people in Schumacher have belonged to the Caledonian Society of Timmins, but since the Timmins Society changed its meeting place to the Hollinger Recreation Hall it has been difficult for the Schumacher people to attend meetings on account of the impracticability of connecting with the bus service. This fact, and the general growth of Schumacher, together with the particular increase in the number of Scots and Scotswomen, led to plans for the organization of a Schumacher Caledonian Society. Accordingly, on Friday evening last a meeting was called at the McIntyre Hall, the Timmins Caledonians being invited to this meeting to assist in the organization of the new society and to enjoy a pleasant social evening.

There were over a hundred Scots folk present, including a large representation from Timmins. After a few dances, for which Mrs. Parker kindly provided the best of music at the piano, Mr. Donald K. MacDonald, of Schumacher, called the meeting to order and explained the purposes of the gathering. Mr. G. A. Macdonald, Past President of the Caledonian Society of Timmins, was asked to outline the aims and objects and organization of a Caledonian Society. He reviewed the organization of the Timmins Society, quoting from the constitution of that organization to show the purposes of the Caledonian Society. "The objects," he quoted, "shall be the encouragement of the National Games of Scotland; the wearing of the National Dress at Gatherings, Processions and Festivals of the Society; the cultivation of a taste and love for Scottish Music, History, Literature and Poetry; and the uniting more closely together of Scotsmen and those of Scottish descent."

It was suggested that while many of the Timmins Scots wish to join the Schumacher Society, it would be best for the evening if only Schumacher people were to vote, and this was agreed to. By unanimous vote it was decided to form a Schumacher Caledonian Society and the election of officers was then proceeded with as follows, all being elected by acclamation:—

With this list of officers and executive the Caledonian Society of Schumacher is all ready for an early start in the way of regular meetings for the fall and winter. There were 26 members joined up Friday night, starting the new Society off with a swing, and the enthusiasm and interest shown promises the greatest of success for the new Society.

After the election of officers the President, Mr. Donald K. MacDonald, took charge of the gathering and a delightful evening was spent. There was a round of happy dances, including old land and modern dances. A very enjoyable feature of the evening was the excellent luncheon served. Mrs. J. R. Todd's sweet-voiced rendition of gaid auld Scottish songs delighted all. Master Willie Shewan rendered a pleasing solo in very effective way and was given a very insistent encore. In response, Master Shewan and Mr. E. R. Street again brought down the house with a catchy popular duet.

The visitors from Timmins were delighted with the pleasant evening enjoyed, and were emphatic in their expressions of appreciation.

Excellent music for the dancing was provided at the piano by Mrs. Parker and by Mr. W. H. Wilson.

An interesting feature of the evening was the amount of the collection taken up. The President Mr. Donald K. MacDonald, suggested that as expenses for hall rent, etc., had been incurred before any organization had been made or membership secured, a collection be given to defray these expenses.
