But in the newer North the question of roads is far beyond mere local interest. On roads depend the success or failure of all plans for the development of the country. The question of needed roads is so broad that to-day it may be said to be the North's biggest problem. In this matter no single section can be helped without the whole North reaping advantage. To help the settlers is to help the North in the surest and most farsighted way.

#### DEATH DUE TO BREAKING OF THE SAFETY RULES

The verdict of the coroner's jury in the inquest into the death of James Harris Roberts was to the effect that the fatal accident occurred through breaking of the safety rule forbidding getting on or off cars in motion. The jury recommended more rigid enforcement of the rule.

James Harris Roberts, 20 years old, and out from Lancashire only about 9 weeks, was crushed by a car underground at the Hollinger on June 10th. His collar bone was broken and penetrated a main artery, causing death by internal hemorrhage. He had stepped from a car in motion and was struck by another car.

The funeral took place Friday afternoon and was largely attended. There was a profusion of flowers, wreaths being sent by the Lancashire Club and many friends. Service was church and interment made in Timmins cemetery. The young man had made many friends during his short stay in town and his death is very deeply regretted, and sincere sympathy extended to his relatives in the Old Land.
