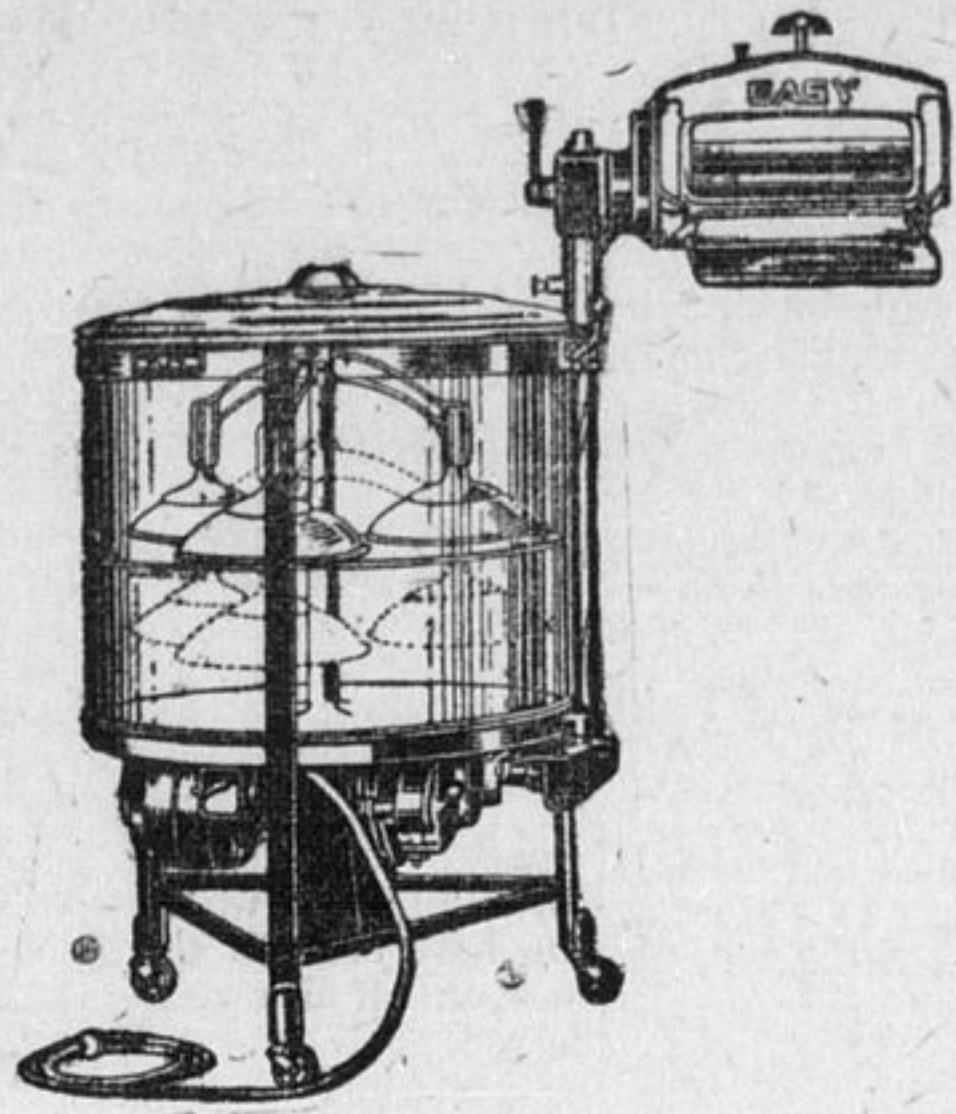


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TIMMINS ONCE MORE THE WINNER OF THE KING CUP

Match With Dome Last Week Decides Possession of Trophy for 1925.

The Timmins Football Club won the King Cup for the second year in succession by defeating the Dome eleven last Wednesday evening by a score of 4 to nothing. Two more matches on the schedule can not affect the result, the two matches being Kirkland at Dome and Dome at Kirkland. If either team were to win both these matches, that team could only have five points, while Timmins has six points, having won two and drawn two of the games played in the series.

There were about 300 spectators present all told on the Timmins grounds for the event, and about 100 more on the back sheds and fences. If the latter want to see the matches for nothing, they might at least let the referee rule the play. Wednesday evening they were shouting remarks to the referee on several occasions, thus showing that they were rude as well as mean. Their attention is directed to the motto, "Pay up or shut up!"

The teams lined up as follows:—
Timmins: Elrick goal; Hetherington and Liddle, backs; Short, F. Cadman and Cooper, half-backs; Dunbar, Dunn, Petersen, Satrang, and Street, forwards.

Dome: Reynolds, goal; Fell and Butts, backs; Houston, Harrower and Ewart, half backs; Dougall, Walker, Robson, Hawkins and Fidick, forwards.

The first half started off well and good football was played. This went along for about fifteen minutes, then it faded as far as the Dome was concerned. During a raid on the Dome goal a penalty was awarded. Satrang took the spot kick and scored. Play went on around the Dome's area and Satrang fooled Reynolds nicely with heady work and nearly scored, the ball being intercepted and kicked out for a corner, which was fruitless Satrang kicking wide.

The Dome got away and gave Elrick two long shots to save. In clearing the ball, the play was in the Dome area again. Dunn made a good try head in a goal; Reynolds punched out. Petterson and Satrang came in for nice play; the latter nearly scored. The pace was hot around the Dome goal; Satrang made a good shot; Reynolds hooked the ball out when it had passed the goal line three feet, the referee didn't see it, so the play went on, and finished with another penalty against the Dome. This caused some dissension among the Dome players, but Satrang shot the ball over the bar when he could have scored if he had wanted to. Play was out of order from this time on to the end of the half, for Timmins had all of it their own way.

Half-time 1-0.
The second half started off with Timmins pressing and all the inside forwards took a shot at Reynolds-right off. They kept up the pressure and Satrang shot. Reynolds saved but Petterson was there for the rebound, and scored. The Dome didn't get far from the kick-off before the ball was sent back and after some nice combination Petterson dribbled his way through and scored. The Dome were not playing football and seemed to be contented with ballooning the ball anywhere. During another tussle the Dome had a third penalty awarded against them. In this Reynolds walked out of his net to let Cooper tap the ball in for the fourth goal. Before the end came Dunbar nearly scored on a rising shot. During this half Elrick was pacing across his citadel wondering if he was going to get a kick at the leather.

The Timmins team played well to the man and their combination was a feature, while Dougall of the Dome worked hard on his wing, but his passes went begging for support.
Mr. B. C. Lambie, refereed the match.

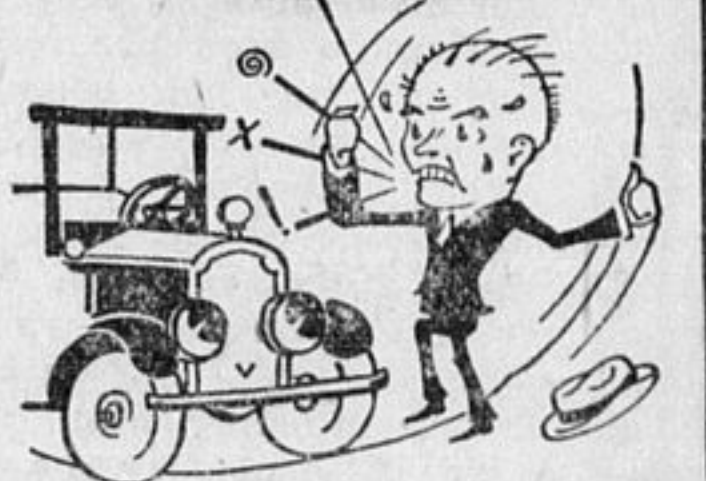
