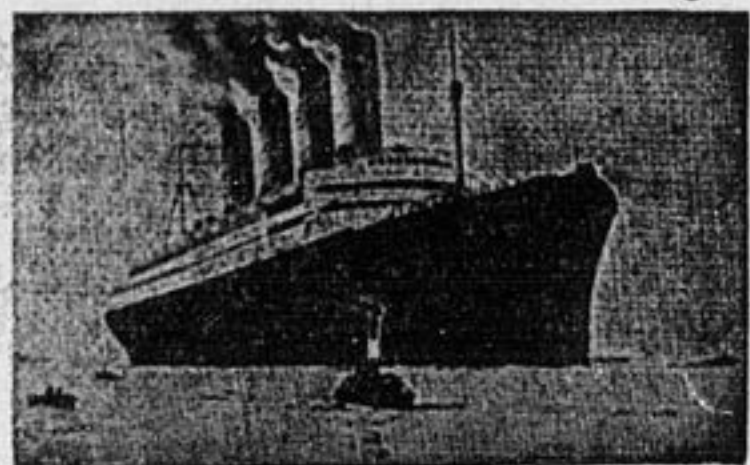

Timmings Takes Opening Ball Game from the Papermakers

Nottingham Made a Very Good Impression with the Local Fans. Scully Did Spectacular Fielding That Made the Crowd Cheer. McIntyre's Double in the Sixth Scored Two Runs.

Timmings got off to a good start on Wednesday last by walloping the champion Papermakers, 14 to 7. The Miners trotted out two new faces in Nottingham and McConnell who did the slab duty for the Miners.

Tate was transferred to 1st base and his good all-around work will in all probability make him a fixture there. With Murphy on 2nd, Dunc. McLean at short, and Johnny Monaghan at the hot corner, the Miners are well fixed defensively.

McIntyre, the Miners' old standby, was again at the receiving end, but was not as reliable as usual, due to a sore thumb which was hurt in practice the day before the game.

The out-fielding is being well taken care of by Scully, Abrams and McGrath, with Lewis, Smith and Thompson in reserve, while Lynch and Acton are on hand for relief duty on the infield.

Nottingham started on the mound for the Miners and got off to a good start by striking out the first two men to face him, and but for an error by one of his team mates he would have retired the side without being scored upon.

The Miners evened the count in their half of the 1st and proceeded to forge to the front in the game by scoring 5 counters in the 3rd and remained in the lead until the end.

Nottingham continued to work very smoothly and his style on the mound made a great hit with the fans, and he should turn in a good many this season. McConnell took up the mound duty in the 6th innings and began where Notty left off.

Scully supplied the fielding feature of the game by making two circus catches and came through with two singles besides being walked twice and by a pitched ball.

Although McIntyre's sore thumb kept him from playing his usual steady game behind the bat, he more than made up for it by grabbing off the batting honors of the day, getting two singles and a double. Abrams and McGrath followed him closely by grabbing a trio of singles apiece.

The Papermakers trotted out several new faces in their line-up. Evans, their port-side heaver, is just a little bit wilder than the average run of crooked arm hurlers, and the array of orthodox batters on the Miners line-up intend to give the young man from Ottawa a hot reception.
