**IMMORAL LIVING BRINGS SENTENCE OF SIX MONTHS**

L. Maki Also Fined \$500.00 for Selling Liquor. Other Police Court Cases.

The four operators from the Toronto detective agency who assisted in the recent clean-up in town, returned last week to Timmins to give evidence in the cases against Mr. L. Maki and Mrs. L. Maki, who have been living in Mrs. Mary Peterson's house in Moneta.

The evidence in the charge against L. Maki of living in part or wholly on the avails of prostitution resulted in Magistrate Atkinson imposing a sentence of six months in jail with hard labour on Maki. Crown Attorney J. M. Greer conducted the prosecution, and the evidence by the operators was so conclusive and unshakable that even the clever defence work of Mr. W. A. Gordon, of Haileybury, failed to make any material impression. The charge of selling liquor against Maki was equally well proven, and on this count Maki was fined \$500.00 and costs, or six months with hard labour. Maki was taken down to commence his term on Friday last. The terms will run concurrently, the fine not being paid.

A doctor's certificate was presented to show that Mrs. Maki was not able to be present for the court. A second doctor was sent over to examine the woman, and his report to the court was that she was not as seriously ill as she affected to be. As the man who had put up her bail did not wish to renew it and asked instead that she be brought to the court so that he might be released from the bail, Mrs. Maki was placed under arrest and conveyed to the cells. The charge of selling liquor preferred against her was proceeded with, and the evidence of the four operators was taken. Mrs. Maki expressed the desire to give evidence in her own behalf but claimed to be too ill to do so. Accordingly the case was remanded until this week. The charge against her of conducting a common bawdy house was also laid over for a week.

Mike Loima, who was "found in" was advised to be careful as to the places he frequented, and the charge against him was eventually withdrawn.

S. Jozefourich, on the charge of illegal purchase of liquor, pleaded guilty, and paid \$50.00 and costs.

There were five ordinary drunks each taxed \$10.00 and costs. Another who claimed that his inebriated condition must have been due to drinking 44 beer was fined \$20.00 and costs. Perhaps, he should be put on the Indian List," suggested the court.

On a charge of vagrancy, J. Lavalley was given a remand until this week. The police say that this young man has been sleeping in stables and has apparently no proper employment to keep him.

One boy charged with the theft of a bicycle was allowed to go on suspended sentence. Another lad, who had the bicycle in question, was charged with having stolen property in his possession, but this charge was later withdrawn, the first boy pleading guilty to stealing the wheel and leaving the second lad apparently cleared of illegality in the matter.

F. Fournier, who comes from the Ottawa district, pleaded guilty to the theft of two suitcases. He took the suitcases from the station here and had them less than 24 hours before Deputy Chief Salley had him in charge. He sold one of the suitcases for fifty cents to one of the town's second-hand stores. Within a few minutes of the receipt of the half-dollar Fournier was behind the bars. Fournier was sentenced to not less than six months nor more than two years. It is to be hoped that the sentence will be a warning to any who think they might be able to take grips from the station. Fournier told the police that he had his own grips stolen in similar fashion the day he arrived in town some months ago. There are other cases reported of similar thefts from the station. It is a specially mean type of theft and it is to be hoped that Fournier's fate will be a warning to all others inclined to tricks of the same kind. Fournier also cashed a Northern Ontario Light Co. cheque payable to the Union Coal Co. He received the cash from a new store in Schumacher. S. P. Wilson charged R. C. Culbert, a former employee, with theft. Culbert had been collecting for Wilson and retained his collections. He claimed that he only held back enough to pay himself wages overdue. He also said that he had been advised in regard to the procedure, a local lawyer suggesting the plan. After hearing the evidence, Magistrate Atkinson pointed out that if there was a case in the matter it was for a civil action and not for a criminal court. Accordingly, Culbert was dismissed.

E. Chenier faced a charge of having a vicious dog at large. The case was remanded for a week. It is claimed that the dog bit a boy alongside the eye, three stitches being necessary to close the wound made.

Work is in progress on the extension to the Baptist Church. On account of the steadily increasing attendance the church found an extension imperative, the demands for increased Sunday School accommodation being especially pressing.

**TWELVE TRAGEDIES ON FRONT PAGE ONE ISSUE**

Suicide, Drowning Accidents, Caught in Shafting, Woman Breaks Leg, Etc., Etc.

A year or two ago The Advance called attention to a tragic front page in an issue of The Northern News. Murder, suicide and accident were featured. It was not the fault of The Northern News but of the news of the North. Again, last week The Northern News has a front page with no less than a dozen items of tragic import. It is not the fault of The News, but of the news.

Here is a summary of the tragic items to the front in the news and on the front page of The News.

W. James, employed at Murphy's mill at Latchford, had his clothing caught in the shafting. He escaped death or serious injury, but his clothing was torn to shreds, his thighs were badly burned on the belting and he suffered a badly-twisted foot.

Mrs. Alex Filion, of Lang Street Cobalt, while hanging out a washing, was thrown heavily to the ground, when the line broke. She sustained a compound fracture of the right leg and a badly-sprained left leg.

A Cobalt lady sustained a bad shock when she opened the top of the refrigerator and seven cats jumped out. A mischievous son of the house (the little son of a gun) had deposited the cats in the ice box for a prank.

Two Haileybury men had a narrow escape from sudden death when the brakes on their car failed to hold at the Lang Street crossing, Cobalt. The car was turned onto the sidewalk to escape a passing train. The car was slightly damaged and the occupants jarred and scared.

David Leahy had his hand badly crushed while making repairs to machinery at the Keely Mine. Leahy is in the hospital. He was changing the boss head of a mill stamp when the stem slipped and came down on his hand, crushing it badly.

A Charlton man attempts suicide by shooting and finishes the attempt by cutting his throat from ear to ear with a knife.

A leaking carburetor and a carelessly-thrown match caused a Ford to take fire on Prospect Avenue, Cobalt. The fire brigade were able to extinguish the blaze before serious damage was done.

There is a story of a court case relative to the claim of a liveryman for \$475.15 damages for the loss of a team of horses. The horses were left outside a house and got away, one of them being drowned in a gravel pit near Haileybury and the other dying from the effects of the accident.

Angus Link, aged 30, a fire-ranger was drowned from a canoe in the Quinze District. The canoe was found floating in Lake Expance about three miles from the Quinze dam. The body was recovered after a prolonged search.

Two men were drowned near Hunta.

Mercer Bentley, aged 17, was drowned at Kirkland Lake June 15th, when his canoe upset. Another lad in the canoe was rescued. Bentley was a Lancashire lad and was only in Canada a few weeks.

Another Lancashire lad, James Harris Roberts, is mentioned on the front page, having been accidentally killed at the Hollinger Mine, as reported in the last week's issue of The Advance.

**SUGGEST GAME SANCTUARY FOR THE SUDBURY DISTRICT.**

A Game Sanctuary, covering an area of approximately forty square miles, with Ramsay Lake and vicinity enclosed therein and including parts of Neelon, McKimm Broder and Dill townships in the neighbourhood of Sudbury, is proposed to be set aside as the result of a move recently undertaken by the Sudbury Game and Fish Association. Property owners and occupants of the territory concerned are behind the project as a whole, a petition to this end having been signed by over ninety-five per cent of those whose lands are in the sanctuary.

According to the reference to the matter in The Sudbury Star last week, the reserve is to be placed under the supervision of District Game officers and property owners have pledged their whole-hearted co-operation in seeing that the restrictions are observed. Poachers will be prosecuted to the fullest extent of the law.

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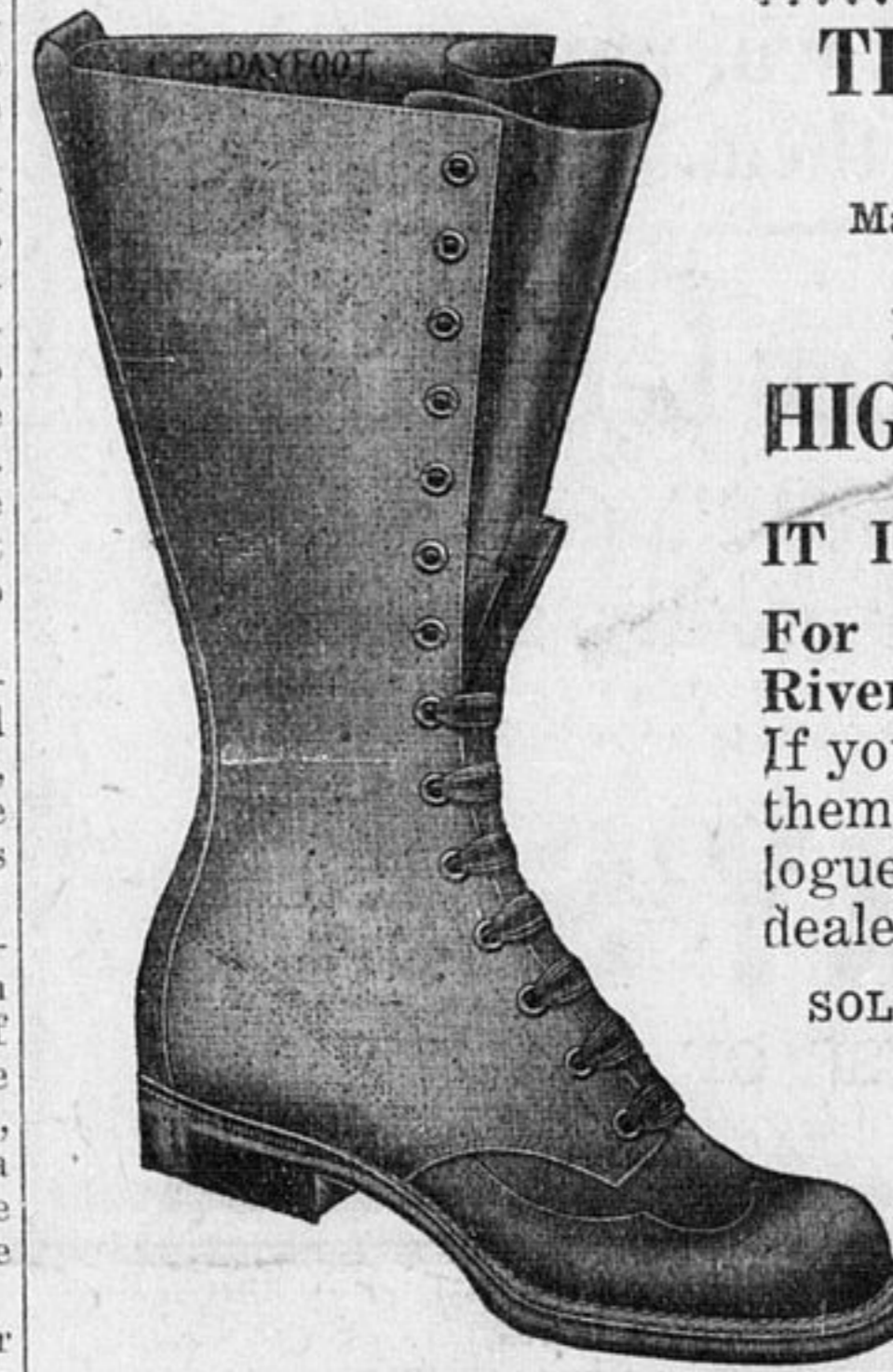
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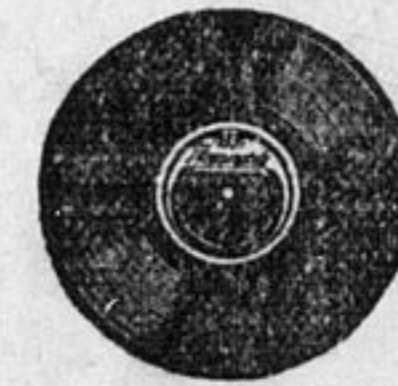
