

CONSERVATIVES COMING FOR SOUTH TEMISKAMING.

Until the present the riding of Temiskaming was in one big riding for the Dominion House. Now there are two ridings—North and South Temiskaming. North Temiskaming Liberals and Conservatives have each held conventions and candidates have been named. The Labour Party has not suggested a candidate to the present and it is not known whether they intend to have a man in the field or not in this riding. The sitting member in the House of Commons for Temiskaming as it has been in previous elections is Mr. Angus McDonald, a Labour Party representative.

In South Temiskaming the Liberals are to hold their convention on August 4th at New Liskeard.

The Conservative Convention is to be at Englehart on September 3rd. Among those mentioned as possible Liberal candidates are J. A. Legris, Haileybury; D. McEachren, Cobalt, and others. It is said that Mac Lang, M.P.P. for Cochrane Riding, has also been mentioned as a possible choice of the South Temiskaming Liberals for the coming Federal contest.

On the Conservative side Mr. John Clark, of Englehart, and Mr. W. A. Gordon, of Haileybury, are both prominently mentioned.

It is understood that on account of his health, Mr. Angus McDonald will not again be a candidate, and nothing has been heard as yet as to any other man favoured by the Labour Party for the seat.
