COCHRANE HAS MORE BAD LUCK IN THE LINE OF FIRE

Some of the towns of this North Land have poor luck in the way of fires. Perhaps two of the worst of these are Cochrane and Haileybury. Cochrane had another sample last week. On Dominion Day, July 1st, fire broke out in Cameron's Furniture Store and Undertaking Parlours and destroyed the better part of the contents before it could be extinguished. July 1st is always considered as the Temiskaming Firemen's Day and it is not looked upon as good form for a fire to occur on this day. On July 1st the firemen from all over the North Land gather at some chosen town to have their tournament and day of sports. While the firemen are thus away from their home town it is considered poor form and hard luck for any fire to start. It is the one day in the year when the firemen leave it to a certain extent to the good sense of the fires to watch their step. Of course, the firemen do not even on this one day trust the fires. A volunteer force is left to cope with any blaze that may occur, but any fire that starts must know it is taking an unfair advantage. The Cochrane fire last Wednesday had no proper regard for decency or luck. The Cochrane Brigade was at South Porcupine for the Firemen's Tournament, but the volunteer force left behind put up a lively and successful fight against the fire. The building itself was saved, but the contents were practically close to a total loss, water, fire and smoke doing much damage.

LITTLE PROGRESS APPARENT ON ROAD TO SOUTH END.

During the past month of two many have expressed curiosity or wonder as to why the complete stretch of road from Timmins to South Porcupine has been closed to traffic. Some who went over this roadway on July 1st, 2nd, or 3rd, when it was re-opened for traffic for those three days, believe now they know the reason why this strip of roadway has been so completely shut off from traffic. It looks as if the reason might be that it was not desired to allow the travelling public to see how little work is being done on the road this year. In any event, the condition of the roadway is very disappointing. It was hoped that, with traffic all shut off, progress on the construction of the roadway would be very rapid, and that by this time the work would be well along to completion. Instead, progress seems to be most disgustingly slow. Indeed, only an optimist would believe that anything at all was being done on the road now. From present indications it would seem probable that the highway from North Bay will be completed before this seven-mile strip is finished. It may be that the intention is to put a big gang of men on and a lot of machinery one of these bright days and rush the work to completion. In the meantime, however, it would appear to be a good move on the part of the municipal and Provincial authorities to take notice and see that this work is carried through with reasonable despatch.



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DEATH OF PATRICIA KEMSLEY AT COBALT.

Brief reference was made last week in The Advance to the sad death of the only daughter of Mr. and Mrs. C. G. Kemsley, the sad event taking place on Monday, June 29th, at Cobalt. The Cobalt Northern News last week makes the following further reference to this sad death:—
"Patricia Kemsley, only child of Mr. and Mrs. Charles G. Kemsley, Timmins, died in the Mines Hospital here at an early hour on Monday from acidosis. The little girl, with her mother, had had her tonsils removed on Wednesday of last week, and had made a good recovery from that operation. On Saturday afternoon her condition gave cause for alarm and she was taken back to hospital and a specialist, Dr. Hart, summoned from Toronto. She gradually sank and died at six o'clock Monday morning.
"Mrs. Kemsley and her daughter were on a visit to her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Robert Holmes, Nickel St., and before returning to Timmins it was arranged they would undergo the operations. When his daughter's condition became serious Mr. Kemsley was summoned from Timmins and he arrived here Sunday evening, to be with his child when she died. The little girl would have been five years old in September.
"The funeral was held from the United Church on Tuesday afternoon, Rev. Norman Rawson, pastor of the church, officiating. A large number of friends of the family attended at the church to pay their last respects and many of them were present at the graveside in Haileybury cemetery where the remains were interred. Mr. and Mrs. H. G. Laidlaw and their family, of Timmins came down for the funeral. Mrs. Laidlaw is a sister of Mrs. Kemsley. Friends from South Porcupine present were Mrs. J. P. Michaud and Mrs. W. Phillips.

SIX HUNDRED MILLIONS INVESTED IN MINING

Mining Industry Next to Agriculture and Railways in Canada in Capital Invested.

According to a bulletin recently issued by the Dominion Bureau of Statistics, over \$600,000,000.00 of cash is invested in the mining industry of Canada. The bulletin also shows that in point of capital investment mining exceeds all Canadian industries, with the exception of agriculture and railway transportation. In 1921 the mining industry was credited with a total investment of \$559,514,000.00, and with par valuation of securities amounting to \$774,749,000. Since 1921 many further millions have been invested in the mining industry of Canada, while the valuation of mines and equipment has very greatly increased. The proportion of capital provided is apportioned as follows:—Canadians, 54 per cent.; United States, 31 per cent.; British, 13 per cent.; residents of other countries, 2 per cent.
As in practically all government reports and records published, the figures are more or less out of date before they are formally made public in the printed reports.

ONE MAN KILLED AND TWO OTHERS HURT BY MANIAC

Apparently turning maniac, Andrew Antoniuk, a foreigner at Fort William, last week attacked William Morgan, a signal operator, and killed him with an iron bar. Another operator, Robt. McManus, went to Mr. Morgan's assistance and he, too, was battered up considerably. John Gall, a C.N.R. policeman, heard the cries for assistance of the two railway employees and hurried to their assistance. He, also, was attacked, but pluckily held on to the apparent madman until help arrived. It took six men and the liberal use of a club to subdue Antoniuk. Messrs. McManus and Gall are both in the hospital at Fort William, but is expected that both of them will recover. Antoniuk is held on a murder charge.

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
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
