### FIRE WEDNESDAY NIGHT AT 66 LAKE SHORE ROAD.

An alarm was sent in Wednesday evening just before ten o'clock from the Gillies Lake district box. A few seconds delay occurred in turning the new motor truck at the hall, the first ringing of the alarm not being rightly received. But this slight delay was more than made up by the advantage of motor speed in getting to the fire. The distance was one that showed the superiority of motor equipment over horse-drawn trucks. Just as there was dissatisfaction at the Firemen's Tournament in South Porcupine over the use of the motor truck in place of horses so Wednesday night many missed the dash of the horses from the hall. So accustomed are people to the spectacular promptness with which the big greys used to come tearing out of the hall and be well out of sight before the alarm quit ringing, that the motor equipment actually seems slower. Of course, from the point of speed and effectiveness the motor truck has much the advantage over the horses, and this is particularly true on a long run like that of Wednesday night. Not only is the motor truck able to make the run in much speedier time, but it is also easy to see that such runs are regular horse-killers, while motor trucks come through unaffected.

Wednesday night's fire was at the residence of Mr. Angus Coules, 66 Lake Shore Road, Tisdale Township. A long line of hose had to be run from the nearest town hydrant and good work was done. The main part of the house was saved, but the upstairs part was badly burned, the fire having a good start. The fire appeared to have been caused by sparks from the chimney. Several hundred dollars loss was caused, the loss being covered by insurance.
