EDUCATIONAL FACILITIES
FOR SETTLERS' FAMILIES.

One of the questions taken up by the deputation from the Northern Ontario Associated Boards of Trade to the Government at Toronto last week was the matter of educational facilities for the children of settlers in the sparsely-settled districts of the North Land. This question was discussed very fully with the Deputy Minister of Education, Mr. A. H. U. Colquhoun. For some time past the Northern Ontario Associated Boards of Trade has been seeking a remedy for the conditions in regard to educational facilities in many sections of the North Land. There are many sparsely-settled districts where the settlers are too far away from existing schools and two poor to establish and maintain schools of their own. The result is that there are literally thousands of children who are deprived of the advantages of education.

In considering the situation the Associated Boards thought that the difficulty might in part be solved by the use of a Correspondence Course system similar to the ones in successful use in British Columbia and Alberta. This was brought to the attention of the Department of Education, and the delegates last week were very pleased to learn that the Department has been studying the matter very closely. Mr. Colquhoun informed the delegates from the North that he had then at work studying the question and also studying whether the perambulating teaching scheme as used in Norway, Sweden and Switzerland might not be better than the correspondence course, or that the combination of the two schemes might not be the best for the north country. He promised that something would be done to relieve the situation, and as soon as his men had reported their findings, the Northern Associated Boards would be notified.

The Advance believes that the Department of Education is working along lines that are likely to bring a better solution than the Associated Boards had hoped for. A combination of the Correspondence Course plan and the travelling idea would appear to be the ideal solution. In any event it is indeed gratifying to know that the Department of Education is so sympathetic and so interested and that practical provision is to be made at an early date for providing educational facilities for the children of settlers in the sparsely-settled districts.

GOVERNMENT WATCHING INTERESTS OF THE SETTLERS

Recent newspaper reports have suggested that the settlers who have money due them from the Mattagami Pulp & Paper Co. for pulpwood sold in 1921 were likely to receive nothing on account and that reorganization or sale of the company was under way that would dispose of the question finally with the settlers remaining unpaid. The newspaper reports indicated one of those high finance plans that would mean a good proposition for the advantage of a new company and a bad thing for the payment of old debts. These reports of re-organization or sale of the Mattagami Company always are discouraging to the settlers who still wait for their money.

In a statement issued by the Receiver, the chief item in the way of assets of the Mattagami Co. is given as plant, machinery, equipment, etc., rated at \$3,875,329.61. The ordinary man, however, will be more inclined to believe that the chief item of assets of the company is really the extent of timber limits held. The Mattagami Co. hold approximately 125 square miles of freehold land, and a concession of about 848 square miles of timber limits, not to mention certain water power rights. These holdings are generally believed to be worth enough to cover all the liabilities of the company. In the case of a sale or re-organization of the company, it would be necessary to have these limits and concessions transferred, and by resolution the Northern Ontario Associated Boards of Trade has asked the Government to refuse to allow any transfer until the settlers are paid what is due them.

The deputation at Toronto last week from the Northern Ontario Associated Boards of Trade took up the question of the Mattagami Co. and the settlers in an interview with Hon. Mr. Lyons. Hon. Mr. Lyons pointed out that at present the Government could do nothing, the Mattagami Co. being under a legal receivership, but he assured the delegates that the Government would do everything possible to protect the settlers if opportunity arose where action could be taken. The deputation came away with the decided opinion that the Government

would not sanction any transfer of limits or concessions unless provision were made for the paying of the settlers.

It would appear that in any future plans for the re-organization or sale of the Mattagami Pulp & Paper Co., the first thing to be arranged should be the matter of paying the settlers. With this provided for, the company would find re-organization or sale assisted and supported by many who now put obstacles in the way. When the settlers are paid, everyone will wish the Mattagami Co. a happy issue out of all its troubles.

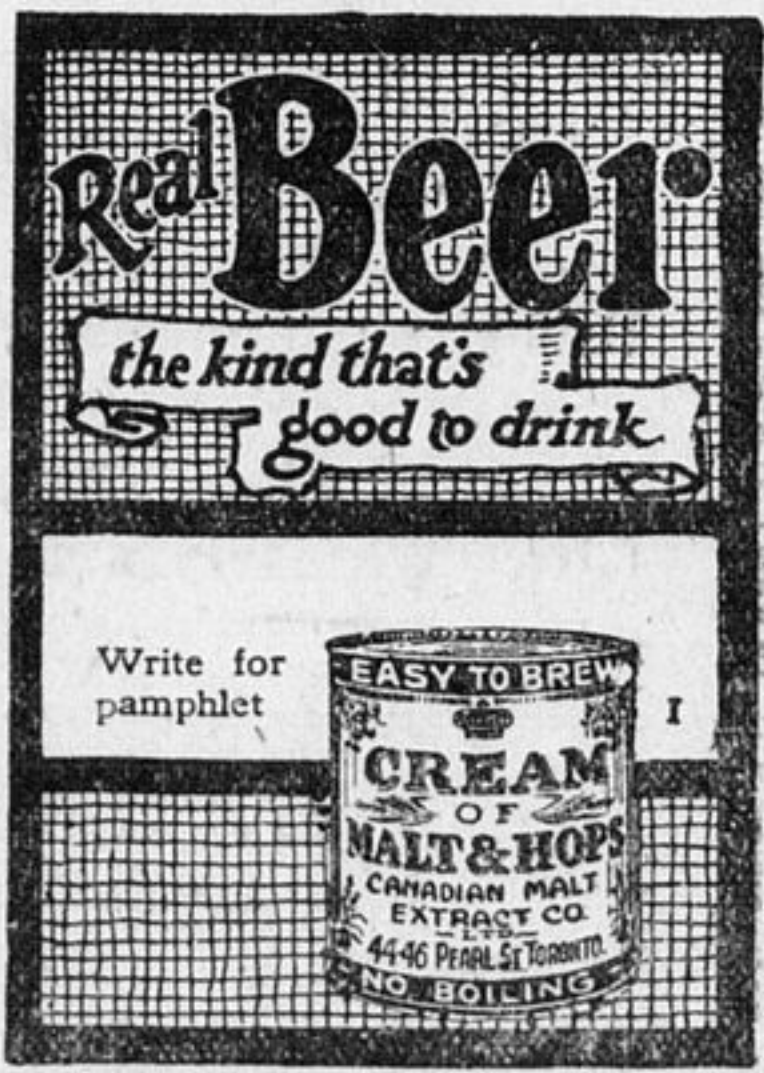
