**First Town Market to be Held Here on Saturday This Week**

**Curling Rink, Opposite the Station, to be Used for Market This Season. Market to be Held Once a Week—On Saturdays—This Summer.**

As noted last week the Timmins Market will open for the season on Saturday of this week, July 25th. The market this year is to be held in the Curling Rink, across from the station. Accordingly, it will be very convenient for any market gardeners or farmers bringing in their produce by train. Last year it was proven conclusively that Timmins offers an excellent market for all kinds of farm and garden produce. The public last year gave excellent patronage to the market and seldom did anyone bring in produce of good quality without selling it all at good price. With a population around 15,000, and with good standards of living, there is naturally a very good opportunity here for a market. Market gardeners and farmers will find ready sale in Timmins for all they can produce and they can always be assured of the best prevailing prices.

The market in past years not only proved of great advantage to the market gardeners and farmers of the district but it also was of decided benefit to the general public. The market gives opportunity for the buying of fresh vegetables, fruit and produce under the best conditions. People have the advantage of purchasing direct from the producer and they can see what they are buying as well as having choice of the produce of different farmers and gardeners.

Last year the quality of produce offered at the market was of the

very best. The attendance at the market was large each market day, and this meant a ready sale for everything offered. This year the market should be an even greater success. More of the public should take advantage of it, and more of the farmers and market gardeners should use its benefits.

This year the market will be held on one day only—Saturday, of each week. Last year there were two market days—Tuesday and Saturday each week—but the Tuesday Market was not a big one. Indeed, it appeared to be of so little advantage to either producer or consumer that this year it was decided to centre on the one day, Saturday. It is hoped that there will be general co-operation this season to make the Timmins market the most successful possible for all concerned.

The Timmins Market comes under the department of the Town Council directed by Councillor J. H. Bacon, and Mr. Bacon has arranged this year, as in past years, that there will be every accommodation practical for producers and the public. There will be a man in charge each market day and the plans that proved so satisfactory last year will be followed again this season.

All interested should remember that the Timmins Market opens in the Curling Rink, across from the station, on Saturday, July 25th, and will be held every Saturday at the same place for the season.

**VIEWED MOOSE FACTORY DISTRICT BY AIRSHIP**

China Clay Deposits Inspected. Hon. Mr. Lyons on the Trip.

Some days ago Toronto papers made reference to the airship trip made through the Moose Factory country by Mr. Wm. Douglas, Hon. Mr. Lyons and others. One newspaper made the following reference to the visit:

"Mr. William Douglas, who with C. McCarthy owns the china clay deposits on the Mattagami river 24 miles beyond the end of the steel north of Cochrane, has returned from an airplane tour to Rupert House and East Maine, Hudson Bay posts in the eastern coast of the James Bay. This trip was made with a party among whom was Hon. James Lyons, Ontario minister of forests and lands, the object being to inspect the whole area from the china clay deposits to the far north.

In view of probable statement from Mr. Lyons, Mr. Douglas did not care to go into details in talking of the trip, but he outlined briefly the wonderful trip he had just completed, and appeared bubbling with enthusiasm over all he had seen.

"Ontario people have no conception of what they have in the north," he said. "I was a missionary for that country before I went on this trip, but I am ten times more one now."

Mr. Douglas and party first went by train to Moonbeam, 100 miles west of Cochrane, where they were met by the men of the Ontario Air Forestry Service, with whom they went in to Remi Lake, about 10 miles from Moonbeam. Remi Lake is the headquarters of the service, and was Mr. Douglas' jumping off place for the trip. There were 3 planes there on his arrival, but Mr. Maxwell, director of the air service, came shortly with a Loening machine—a monoplane.

After a day's stay at Remi Lake a trip was made to the china clay deposits. These are 100 miles distant, and the journey was accomplished in 55 minutes. Here the deposits were inspected and drill holes examined. "This deposit," says Mr. Douglas, "has a mile of river frontage. At the foot of Long Rapids is a splendid deposit of fire clay about quarter of a mile by 150 feet." Joseph Keele, late director of ceramics at Ottawa, describes this clay in his 1924 report as the finest fire clay in the world.

Next the party flew to Moose Factory, 150 miles north. This took an hour and 15 minutes. They followed the Groundhog River to its junction with the Mattagami, then chased the Mattagami to its destination.

After a stay here of a day and a half they flew to Rupert House on the Quebec side of James Bay, 150 miles from Moose Factory, and from East Maine, 55 miles farther north. It was the first time a plane had ever landed at this spot and the Indians and dogs were frightened at the big bumble-bee. At Rupert House the Hudson Bay factor has a tractor with which he can haul 6 tons of food on 3 sleighs in the winter to various factors.

The trip back was made from Moose Factory to Remi, 225 miles, down the Mattagami to the Kapuskasing river. "We saw millions of acres of spruce," said Mr. Douglas, "all the way from Remi and up to

**DEPT. HAS BETTER PLANS THAN EMBARGO WOULD BE**

Minister of Lands and Forests Showing Talent in Making the Most Out of Forest Wealth.

Recent announcements from Toronto indicate some of the ways adopted by Hon. Mr. Lyons to see that the Province benefits more substantially than in the past from the forest wealth here. The plans of the Dept. seem to be more practical and effective than the proposed pulpwood embargo. In offering for sale by tender certain limits, the Department, in addition specifying a new rate of \$1.40 per cord for spruce pulp dues and 70 cents per cord for balsam pulp dues, the terms also specify bonuses of 50 and 40 cents per cord, respectively, for these two classes of pulp. Another clause in the terms states that, except by the special approval of the Minister of Lands and Forests, the pulp must be completely manufactured into paper within the Province of Ontario. Still another condition imposed upon the bidders is that they must agree at the order of the Minister of Lands and Forests to supply Canadian publishers first with any newsprint which they may desire. The timber tract which is being auctioned is one of the best pulp limits in Ontario, and this clause is inserted in order to reserve to Canadian industry the first claim upon the country's resources in the event of any situation arising which should make such a legal claim desirable.

Substantial increases in the Crown dues payable by timber and pulpwood operators in the Province are under contemplation by the Ontario Government says The Mail & Empire. The matter has already been up for discussion in Cabinet Council, without, however, any definite order having been passed to fix a new schedule. Tentative figures proposed for pulpwood dues are said to be \$1.40 per cord for spruce pulp and 70 cents per cord for balsam pulp, these dues to be in place of existing ones of 80 cents and 40 cents per cord respectively.
