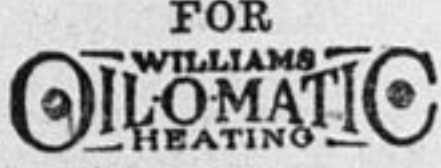

**Iroquois Falls Makes Easy  
Win Over the Timmins Team**

Score in Ball Game Wednesday Last Was 11 to 4 in Favour  
of Falls. Lefty Evans Held the Miners in Check, Allow-  
ing But Three Hits. Smith on the Mound for the  
Miners, is Accorded Ragged Support.

The gap between the Miners and the  
Papermakers is a little bit closer to-  
day, due to the Falls' easy victory  
on Wednesday last at the Timmins  
Athletic field.

Although the Falls are considered  
by many to be an also-ran outfit, in  
the pennant hunt for the Northern  
championship, they showed themselves  
to be real mud horses and they  
proved themselves the berries when  
they beat Timmins in a lake of mud,  
water and slime.

Lefty Evans, who was pounded un-  
mercifully on his first two appear-  
ances, proved to be a real stumbling  
block to the usually heavy-hitting  
Miners.

However the Falls may not be so  
good to-day. In any event, to-day's  
game will also be staged on the Miners  
home lot and it remains to be seen  
whether the Papermakers can outbit  
the heavy-slugging Miners and show  
the same form.

Lefty Evans looked just as bad in  
spots only, as he did in his first  
3 starts against Timmins when he was  
pounded unmercifully and on two oc-  
casions the Falls management allowed  
him to remain on the mound and take  
his medicine.

Barring the 1st and 6th innings  
Evans proved unbeatable and he was  
accorded brilliant support by his team  
mates.

Smith, also a South Paw, started

to serve them up for the Miners, and  
his retirement in the 5th innings with  
3 on and 2 down was not of his own  
cause, but the ragged support accord-  
ed him necessitated such a move.

**TIMMINS PUBLIC LIBRARY  
NOW OVER A YEAR OLD**

Membership for Year Was 1248.  
There Were 30,491 Books in  
Circulation.

On July 14th, 1925, the Timmins  
Public Library ended the first year  
of its very useful existence. Dur-  
ing the first year of its existence the  
Library has had a very creditable  
record. The number of members for  
the year was 1248, showing that the  
Library is serving a wide circle of the  
people of the town. The number of  
books in circulation for the year was  
30,491. The number of books at present  
in the Library (including, of course,  
those in circulation) is 1894. This is  
a larger number than was in the  
Library until some months ago when  
a big purchase of new books was  
made. But taking the present  
number of books as a basis, the cir-  
culation could be figured out to the  
effect that each book in the Library  
has been out 16 times during the year.  
As a matter of fact the most of the  
books have been out more frequently  
than this. Some of the books, particu-  
larly those for juveniles, have been  
in circulation as much as 70  
times during the year.

The past year—the first year for  
Timmins Public Library has been a  
very successful one. The member-  
ship and circulation alike are proofs  
of the interest taken in the Library  
and the benefits of the Library to the  
town.

The reading room of the Library  
has been another very helpful feature.  
The reading room has been very  
popular and is always well patron-  
ized. During the year it has given  
very helpful service to the Town.

The time and attention given to the  
Library by the thoughtful and effi-  
cient Library Board has undoubtedly  
contributed greatly to the striking  
success and usefulness achieved by the  
Timmins Public Library. The  
Librarian, Mrs. D. Grinston, has also  
conducted the Library with a skill  
and an efficiency that have assured  
the best success and the greatest  
measure of service to the community.  
Appreciation may well be expressed  
at this time to the Library Board and  
to the Librarian for their generous  
services. And to the Timmins  
Public Library all will sincerely wish  
"Many Happy Returns of the  
Day."

**GOVERNMENT ASSISTING  
SETTLERS IN BUYING STOCK**

one for the settlers, and one likely to  
result in advantage to the settlers and  
credit to the Government.
