T. & N. O. NOT TO BUILD SUBWAY TILL THE SPRING

Haven't Money for the Work Just at Present, 'Tis Said.

Some weeks ago announcement was made that the T. & N.O. had at last decided to build a subway of modern type over the end of Fourth Avenue, at the crossing on the road to the Hollinger. For years the T. & N.O. has been urged to construct this subway, but the old structure still remains. Some weeks ago there was a T. & N.O. engineer here to view the subway, and former plans were revised to meet the new needs. It was expected that the T. & N.O. would go on with the work at once and that the new subway would be completed at the same time as the South Porcupine-Timmings road. Last week, however, it was learned that while the T. & N.O. has decided to build the new subway, the work will not be done this year. It will be next spring before the subway is constructed. It is understood that the T. & N.O. says it has not the money available for the work this year, but that next spring it will surely be attended to all right.

There will be general disappointment that this necessary work is not to be done this year, so as to be completed at the same time as the new roadway. Of course, if it can not be done this year, next Spring will be better than leaving it to the dim indefinite future as has been the case in the past. The new subway is badly needed all right, and next Spring can not come to soon in this particular case.

New Express Delivery Limits To Go Into Force on July 17

Town Authorities Formally Notified of New Limits for Delivery of Express. Practically All the Town Taken in by new Limits for Delivery. Will be of Great Advantage and Convenience to Public Generally.

For a considerable time past the Town Council and the Board of Trade have been working to secure an extension of the limits for express delivery in town. Both set as the mark, the extension that would include all within the municipal limits. This mark has not been exactly attained, but to all practical purposes it has been reached. Last week The Advance referred to a very careful review of the town made by the local agent of the express companies with the Secretary of the Board of Trade, and the recommendations made to the companies as a result of this review. It was recommended that, with the exception of two or three new streets where the roads were practically impassable, the limits be extended to take in all the town. The companies have agreed to follow these recommendations and formal notice to this effect was given last week by the following letter received by the Town Clerk:—

Montreal, Que., July 15, 1925.
H. E. Montgomery, Town Clerk,

Dear Sir: Your application for an extension of the express cartage limits has received consideration, and I have pleasure in informing you that, commencing August 17th, we will arrange to extend the cartage limits at Timmings to the territory within the following boundaries:

"Commencing at the intersection of Railway Street and Kirby Avenue by Kirby Avenue, the T. & N.O. Railway, Lake Shore Road, to the city boundary, thence following the corporation limits to Toke Street, southwest on Toke Street to the northern city boundary, thence west by city boundary to Rea Street, south on Rea Street, Hollinger Avenue, Gillies Street, Commercial Avenue, Rea Street, Kirby Avenue, Preston Street, Montgomery Avenue, Mountjoy Street, Kirby Avenue, Balsam Street, Kimberly Avenue, Cedar Street, Ogden Avenue, the T. & N.O. Railway,

Tisdale Avenue, and thence Railway Street to point of commencement."

It is my understanding that this will be satisfactory to the municipal authorities.

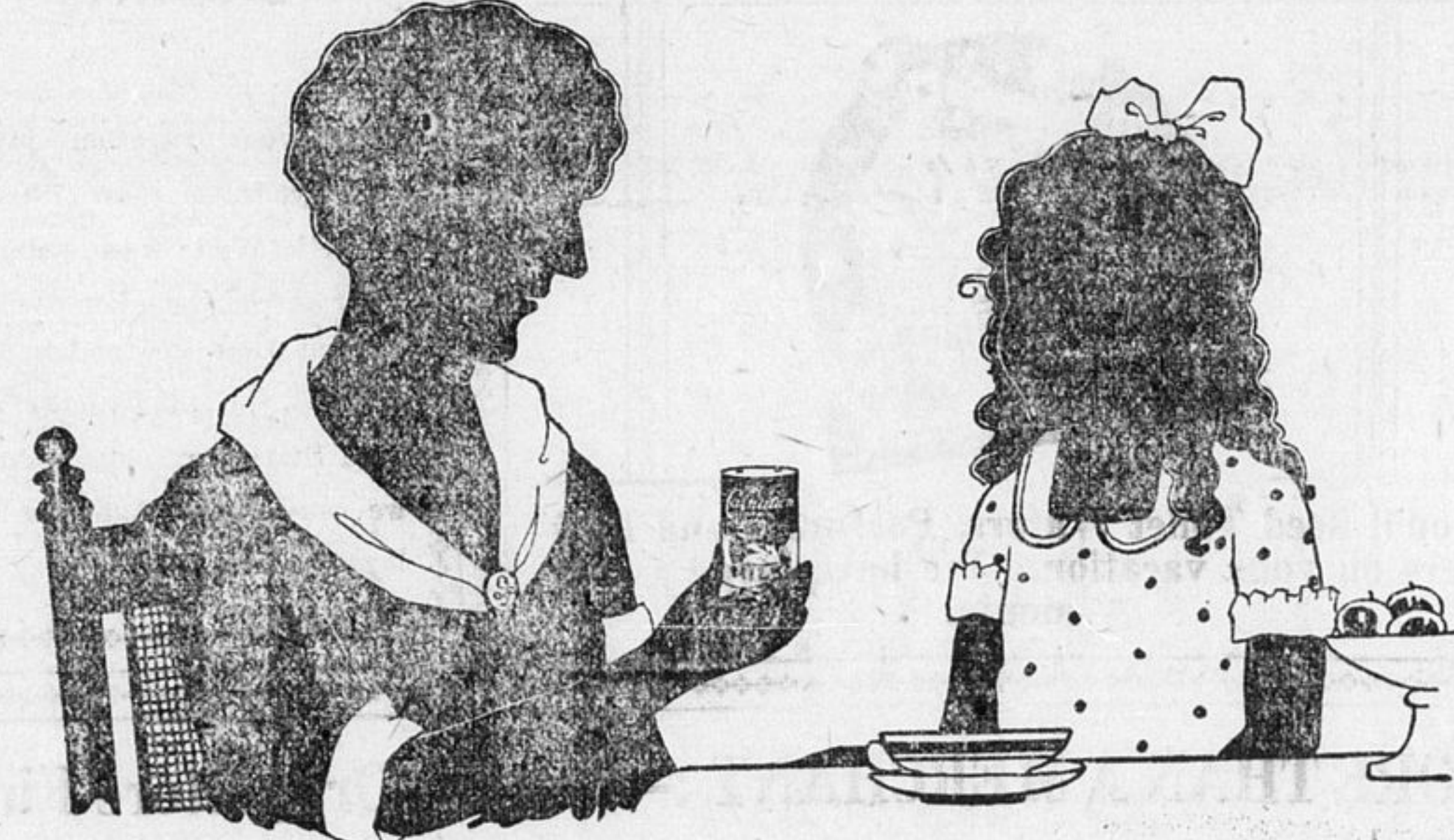

MUFFINS
1½ cups flour, 4 teaspoons baking powder, 1 tablespoon sugar, ½ teaspoon salt, 1 egg, ½ cup water, ¼ cup Carnation Milk, 2 tablespoons fat. Mix and sift dry ingredients. Add milk and water to well beaten egg, and add to first mixture, then add melted shortening. Bake in greased muffin tins fifteen to twenty-five minutes. This makes ten muffins.

CINNAMON BUNS
¾ cup water, ½ cup Carnation Milk, 3 tablespoons sugar, 1 egg, 1 teaspoon salt, 1 cake compressed yeast, 4 ½ cups flour, ½ tablespoon cinnamon, ¼ cup sugar, ½ cup raisins, 2 tablespoons shortening. Soak yeast in a little warm water. Mix lukewarm water, Carnation Milk, sugar, salt, beaten egg and melted shortening. Add two cups flour and beat well. Allow to rise in a warm place until spongy. Allow to rise to double its size and bake in a hot oven fifteen or twenty minutes. This makes thirty-two rather small cinnamon rolls.
