

PRESENTATION KEYS OF NEW CANADA BUILDING.

"Canada" the attractive London, England, publication in a recent issue carries a very comprehensive and interesting report of the formal opening of the new Dominion of Canada building in London. There are numerous illustrations showing the beauties of the new building. The formal opening was by the King and Queen. The High Commissioner for Canada, Hon. Peter C. Larkin, read an address to the King, to which His Majesty made gracious reply. A message from Canadian Children to Their Majesties was also received. The formal opening keys are referred to as follows by "Canada":—

"The four presentation sets of keys—by a happy idea of Mr. Larkin—are made of Canadian metals. They are identical in design, but in each case one is made of gold, another of silver, and another nickel. They have been provided by the mining interests indicated below, all of which operate in the Province of Ontario.

"The design on the handle comprises the Cockspur street elevation of the new Canadian building, surmounted by a crown and flanked by oak-leaves, roses and the Canadian symbols—maple leaf and the beaver.

"The King's gold key was presented by the Hollinger Consolidated Gold Mines; the silver key by the Nipissing Mining Co., Ltd.; and the nickel key by the Mond Nickel Co., Ltd.

"The Queen's gold key was presented by the McIntyre Porecupine Mines Ltd.; the silver key by the Keeley Silver Mines, Ltd.; and the nickel key by the Mond Nickel Co., Ltd.

"Another set is being given to Mr. MacKenzie King, the Canadian Prime Minister. In this the gold key is presented by the Dome Mines, Ltd.; the silver key by the Keeley Silver Mines, Ltd.; and the nickel key by the Mond Nickel Co., Ltd.

"Mr. Larkin is also receiving a set, in which the gold key is presented by the McIntyre Porecupine Mines, Ltd.; the silver key by the Keeley Silver Mines, Ltd.; and the nickel key by the Mond Nickel Co., Ltd.

"The keys were made by Messrs. Ryrie-Birks, Ltd., of Toronto, and were hand-chased by Messrs. Henry Birks and Sons, Ltd., of Montreal."

OVER \$119,500,000 IN GOLD HELD BY FINANCE DEPT.

Gold held on the 30th of last month by the Department of Finance amounted to \$119,539,579, according to the circulation and specific statement issued recently. The amount of gold held against notes in circulation on that date was \$116,263,993, and the total circulation was \$208,391,477. Dominion notes outstanding against deposits of approved securities amounted to \$77,200,000.

FINDS HEALTH OF WHOLE NORTH LAND VERY GOOD

Reference was made in The Advance last week to a visit here from Dr. George, Provincial Medical Health Officer. Dr. George also visited other centres in the North Land, and on his return to North Bay was interviewed by The North Bay Nugget. The Nugget says:—

"Dr. W. E. George, Provincial Medical Officer of Health, has just returned from a trip through the northern districts and states, that the health of the northern part of the province is unusually good. With the exception of a few mild cases of scarlet fever in South Lorraine, Dr. George says he found no serious illness and conditions were very favorable. The fever is of the mild type which was prevalent in North Bay during the past winter. The baby clinics and clinics for school children which were held during the spring and early summer months have been discontinued for the summer months but will be resumed in September. The health officer believes these clinics have accomplished much good in the district and that the parents are taking advantage of the health suggestions offered by the doctors and nurses."

RECORD STILL HELD BY SOUTH END BARRED ROCK

Last week The New Liskeard Speaker told of a record-size egg by a Thornloe hen. The Speaker said:—"A peach of a Barred Rock egg was brought us Saturday, from the poultry yards of Mr. W. D. Bradley, Thornloe. It measured eight and one-eighth of an inch one way and six and one-half the other and weighed four ounces. It made a delicious omelet."

A Barred Rock hen owned by Mr. H. Sullivan, South Porcupine, still holds the record so far as known in this North Land as regards big eggs. The Advance had in the office here in May an egg laid by this hen. The egg was 8 1/4 inches the one way (an eighth of an inch bigger than the Thornloe sample) and 6 1/2 inches the other way. It tipped the scales at a shade over four ounces.
