 SHOULD PAY MUNICIPAL  
 TAXES ON RESIDENCES.

**TOWN SHOULD RECEIVE  
 FULL HALF OF ROYALTY.**

The announcement of the tax rate for the year has prompted some to heap curses upon the Town Council. The majority of the people, however, are inclined to take the matter in a philosophical manner, like good sports, consoling themselves with the thought that it is impossible to make expenditures without spending money. Two years ago at the annual banquet of the Timmins Board of Trade one speaker urged the Town Council to "loosen up" in the matter of expenditures. This citizen pointed out the Town had to have improvements and conveniences and that the Council had shown a tendency to curb expenditures rather than to provide all modern conveniences. Practically every speaker following took a similar attitude. "Loosen up" was the message to the Town Council. Since that time there has not been a single meeting of the Council but has been approached by some citizen or group of citizens and urged to do some public work—necessary and desirable, perhaps, but always costing money. If the Council had listened to all the requests the tax rate would be 100 mills on the dollar. The Council has tried to keep the town progressive and up-to-date, and at the same time curb expenditures as much as possible. In a word the situation simply amounts to this: that if the town is to have paved streets, cement walks, sewers, street lights, water extensions, etc., etc., on a generous scale, then the tax rate must be high. If the town is to live like a modern city the ratepayers will have to pay like modern citizens.

Unless thought of modern improvements is discarded, little can be done about the tax rate, except to pay it. There is one way, however, that the municipality may be able to assist itself in the future. That is by securing a full half of the royalty from the mines. At present the municipality receives one half of this royalty, the other half going to the Province. But there was a "joker" inserted by the Drury Government in regard to the half of the royalty coming to the town. According to this "joker," the town's half is not to exceed \$35,000.00 in any year, no matter what the actual amount may be. With this joker removed, every material growth in the production of the mines would mean an increase in revenue to the Town. The Town's growth is bound up in the growth of the mines, and it is only fair that there should not be undue restrictions on the revenue following mine expansion. The removal of the joker clause in the royalty distribution would mean much for Timmins. The matter has been taken up in the past by the Board of Trade and other bodies. It would appear to be good policy and good work for the Town to again impress upon the Government the necessity for letting the Town's revenue from the royalty keep pace with the expansion at the mines.

**French Canada Celebrates Its History**

June 24th of every year is the great day of the French-Canadian. In every city and every hamlet of Quebec Province and in the cities and centres of the New England States and in those parts of Ontario and the West where he has migrated St. Jean Baptiste Day is never overlooked. It is well that it should be so and it introduces into Canada an Old-World seventeenth century atmosphere that Canadians as a whole could ill afford to lose, either artistically or historically. Our pictures show some interesting features taken from floats exhibited on this occasion. There is the heroic 17th century farmer defending his land from his crops which his father and women folk are reaping. The children on their way to school watch the housewife baking her bread in the old-fashioned oven which is still in extensive use in Quebec Province. The making of maple sugar, an industry developed from the researches of Dr. Sarrasin in 1685, is yet another popular float which always thrives in the celebration.
