Another assault case was the charge against J. Allaire who was accused of striking a boy. The fine and costs totalled \$14.25.

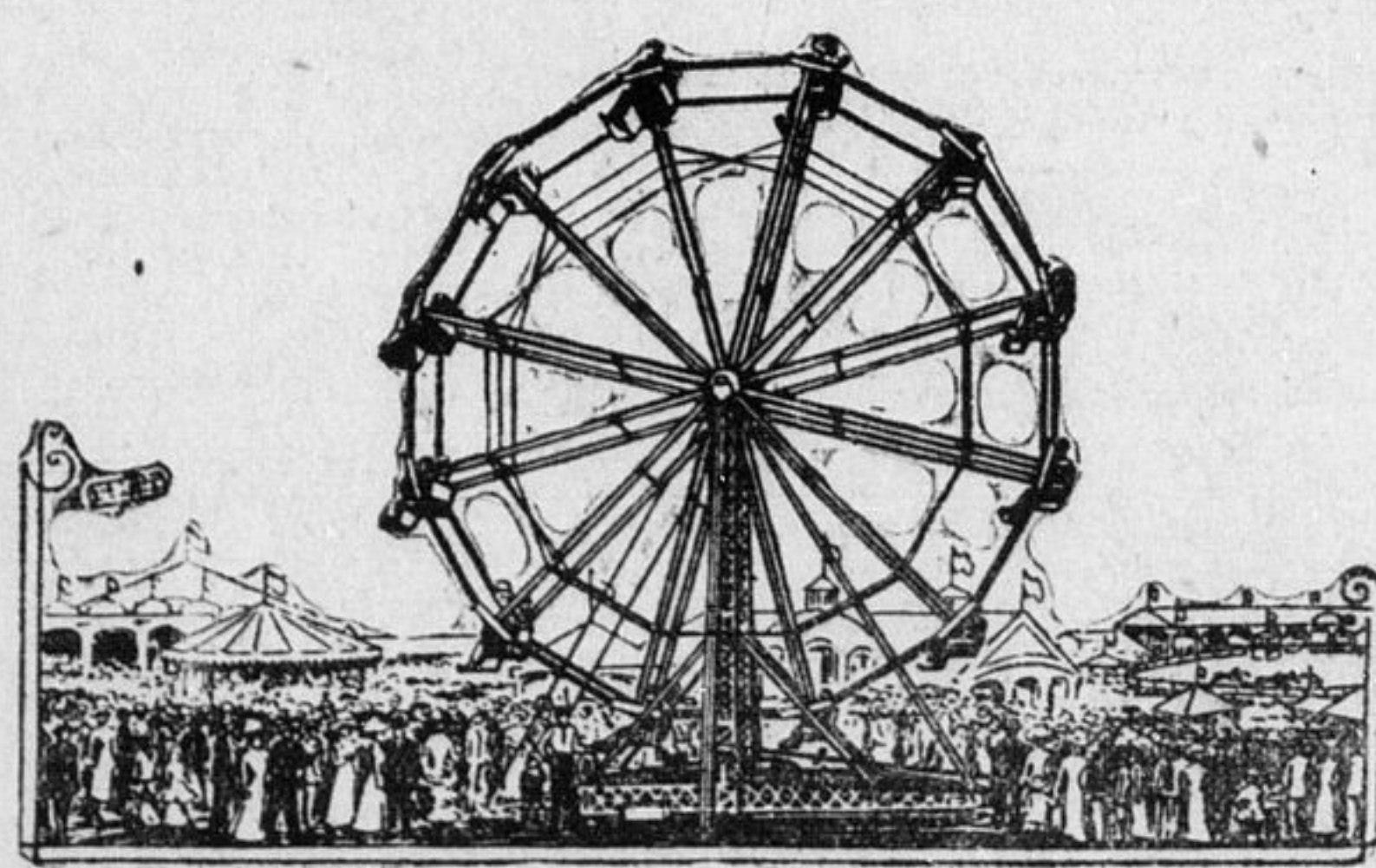
