COAL HUNTS RESULTS IN ZINC-LEAD DISCOVERY

Sudbury May Have Another Big Industry as Consequence of Big Finds.

Drilling operations in connection with the hunt for coal at Chelmsford, near Sudbury, have resulted in what is believed to be a very promising discovery of zinc and lead. Reports to the Ontario Department of Mines suggest that the discovery is a valuable one and may lead to the establishment of a big new industry at Sudbury.

For about 25 years there has been talk of coal near Sudbury, though geologists have persistently refused to believe in the possibility of any commercial coal field in this area. However, the Idaho Mining & Smelting Corporation, a very wealthy United States mining organization, are understood to have decided some months ago upon a campaign of exploration to include 20,000 feet of diamond drilling. During this diamond drilling work the discovery was made of unsuspected deposits of zinc of good quality. Already, the American syndicate has taken steps to determine the extent of the deposits, and it is understood a very extensive diamond drilling programme will be carried out. If the further results prove as encouraging as indicated by returns to date, Sudbury will have a new industry—the zinc-lead business—likely to prove as important as nickel. Quebec is the only province now producing zinc.
