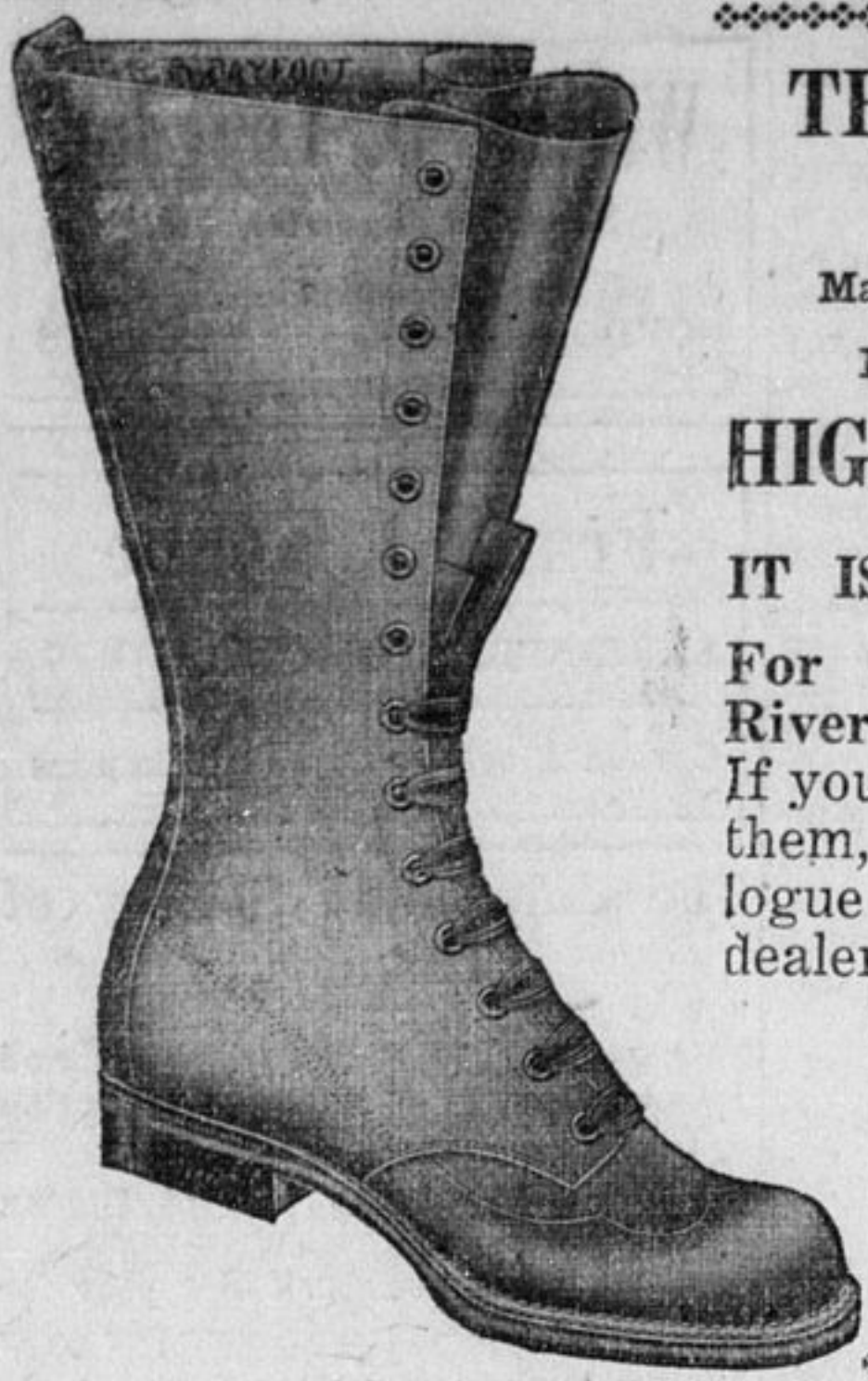

Extended Express Limits In Force on Monday, Aug. 17

**Most of the Town to be Included in New Limits. Public
Should Assist in Success of New Limits by Seeing That
Proper Address is Given on Parcels Being Sent Here.**

Monday next, Aug. 17th, the new, extended limits for the delivery of express parcels will go into force and effect. The new limits include practically all of the town and will prove of very material benefit to the citizens generally. The public can assist in making the new limits of the greatest convenience and accommodation. As The Advance has pointed out the public will help the plan very materially if all will make a point of seeing that all express parcels are properly and fully addressed. In ordering goods from outside points it would be well to instruct the shipper to make the address as complete as possible. In addition to your name, be sure to give your correct street address. Be particular to state the number of the street or avenue, and in the case of a street, whether north or south. By this form of co-operation the public will be assisting in securing the best service in the new express delivery system. In the new postal district plan in the city of Toronto, it is recognized that the public have a material part in making any such plan a success. This is equally true of express delivery. The express companies are doing their part by extending the limits for free express delivery, and also by providing the necessary extra horses and delivery rigs. The public should help on the good work by seeing that as full address as possible is given in every case.

"TWINKLE TOES" MAKES BIG HIT AT BAND CONCERT

There was an unusually large crowd again at the open air band concert given by the Timmins Citizens Band on Thursday evening last at the new band stand near the station. The number of autos stopped for the concert was again noteworthy. It is also worthy of note that auto drivers would confer a benefit on others and show a more thoughtful spirit if they would avoid as much as possible the disturbances of the band concerts by horn tooting and driving by in a cloud of dust, the said cloud of dust having a tendency to drift to the band stand to the discomfort of the musicians. There were about 30 members of the band present and the full instrumentation added to the effectiveness of the selections given. Among the new instruments used Thursday were side-drum, triangle and cymbals, which have not been used recently in the regular concerts of the band. Probably the most popular number Thursday night was the new fox trot, "Twinkle Toes." This cleverly-rendered number set the feet going and the crowd swaying. There were also classical numbers very effectively given and much appreciated by the crowds. The next band concert will be on Sunday evening after the church services.

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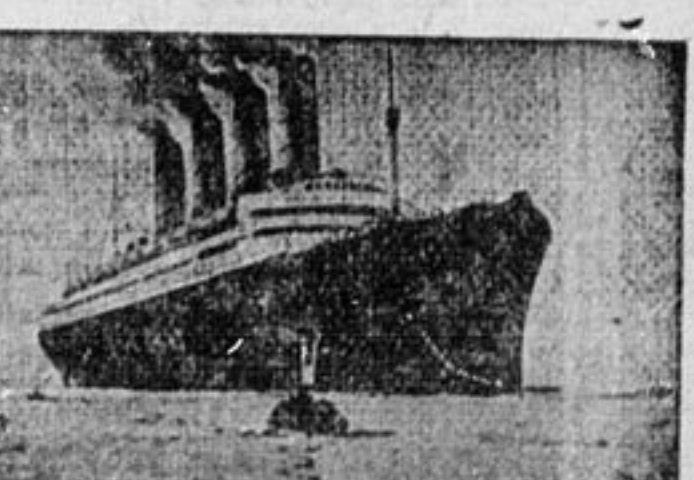
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
