**COMPLAINT ABOUT HOUR
SCAVENGER WORK DONE.**

Household holders found the heat too great for comfort anywhere around the house except on the verandahs and porches, but the odors raised by the passing wagons made outdoor life about impossible. One householder pointed out to The Advance the danger to the public health from the early hour collection of garbage and nightsoil, also the annoyance to ratepayers generally, and urged that a plan be adopted for scavenger work in the opening morning hours when the work would create the minimum amount of inconvenience and annoyance to the public.

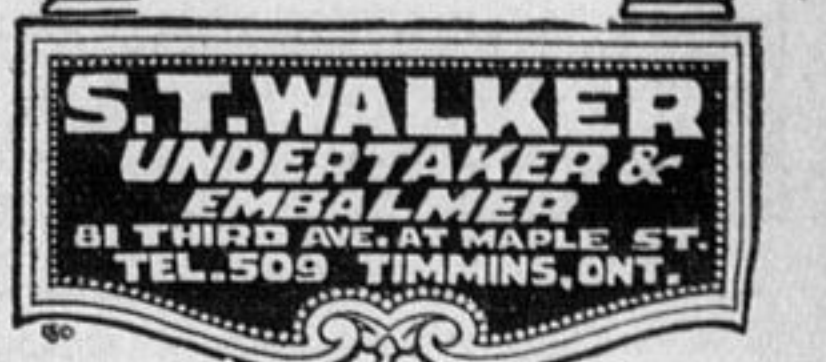
**TIMMINS GOLFERS PAY

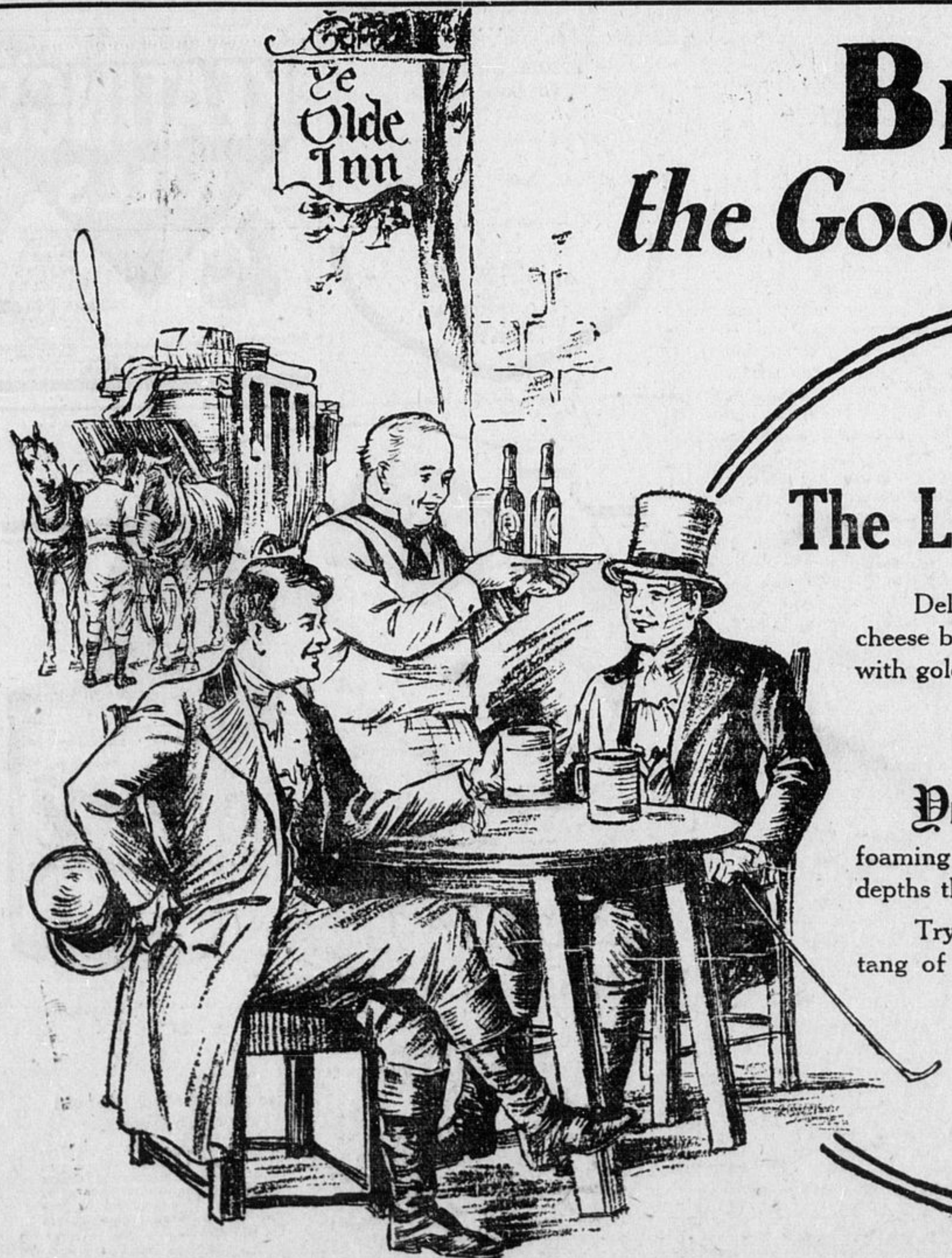
