MIDNIGHT FIRE NEAR HIGH SCHOOL ON FRIDAY

Good Time Made by Motor Truck and Good Work of Brigades Save House.

On Friday evening, or rather on Saturday morning, at 1 a.m., an alarm of fire was turned in and the motor truck made a run to Mr. Paul Kelly's, across from the Timmins High School. When the firemen reached the house the flames were breaking through the roof and there seemed to be great headway reached by the fire. Hose lines were promptly laid and water was soon playing on the burning building. The fire seemed to be confined to the attic of the house and to the cellar, the rooms between not being damaged by the fire. The fact that the house was finished inside with gyproc prevented the destruction of the building. As it was, the firemen were able to save the building without very serious damage. There was a hole burned in the roof, some damage by fire done in the attic and in the cellar, the rest of the harm done being due to injury caused by smoke and water. Before the arrival of the fire brigade Officers Cushing and Moore, assisted by some neighbours were able to get a piano and other valuable furniture from the building. When the fire was discovered there didn't seem to be anybody around the place, and the family occupying the house were all said to be away. The cause of the fire is not known, but an investigation will no doubt be made as the Fire Chief says that certain peculiarities in regard to the blaze suggests the possibility of incendiarism. The worth of motor equipment was again demonstrated, the early arrival of the brigade undoubtedly preventing a much more serious fire. The amount of insurance reported on the building and contents is \$3800.00.

"STRONGEST MAN IN THE WORLD" HERE SATURDAY

Gave Thrilling Exhibition at Schumacher Last Week.

Marijan Matijevic, a Croatian, said to be the very strongest man in the world, put on an unusually interesting exhibition at the Maple Leaf Theatre, Schumacher, on Friday evening last. Mr. J. K. Moore acted as chairman and gave effective introduction to the athlete and hero. Marijan Matijevic, who is a strikingly fine figure of a man, with unusual muscular development, performed what seemed to be about impossible feats of strength. He lifted 2500 lbs. and held this weight on his shoulders. He carried 950 lbs. by his teeth. He tore 80 playing cards through easily as they were in the pack. With his chest he burst an iron chain guaranteed to hold 4-horse power. Ropes were placed around his arms, and with eight men pulling on each side they were unable to pull his arms from the position in which he held them. He bent iron bars across

his muscles and twists iron rods with his teeth, and did other wonderful feats of strength that amazed all. There was a good crowd to see the show, and all were well pleased with the entertainment provided by the strong man, and ready to agree that he was "the strongest man in the world." Marijan Matijevic, who has medals and trophies from all over the world for his prowess, is also a wrestler of superior ability and in this line is ready to meet all comers. He gave another show at Schumacher last night; Thursday of this week he is booked for South Porcupine; and on Saturday of this week is to show at Timmins. Those who have seen him say that he is all and more than claimed for strength and power.

THREE-YEAR PRISON TERM FOR SERIOUS OFFENCE

Man From Sandy Falls Pleads Guilty and is Sent to Kingston.

There was a special session of police court on Thursday evening last when a man named Fred Daniels faced a charge of having carnal knowledge of a girl under 14 years of age. Daniels asked for a speedy trial before the Magistrate. He pleaded guilty, and did not wish to have a lawyer. He was arrested and brought to Timmins in the afternoon and the next afternoon he was well on his way to North Bay, from which city he will be taken to Kingston to serve his term.

There was a number of other cases at police court, but none of them very important. Ten drunks each paid ten and costs. B. Bukola for illegally having liquor in a public place was charged \$50.00, and costs.

The assault charge against D. Martin, who was accused by Louis Riopelle of beating the latter, was remanded for a week.

Remand was also given in the case

of Jas. Shubb, against whom Isadore Tkatch preferred a charge of obtaining money by false pretences. Shubb is out on bail to this week.

A remand was given also in the charge against Veronia Panchuk, accused of libel by G. Panchuk.

John Gregoris, charged by L. Le-maire with assault, was another to be given a remand.

Mrs. G. Boychuk was found guilty of assaulting Mrs. P. Bosak, and fined \$20.00 and costs.

Mrs. St. Onche, on a drunkenness charge, was found guilty and was taken to North Bay on Friday morning to start a term of 30 days.

A. Bernadine, on the charge of disorderly conduct, was fined \$10.00 and costs.

Another remand in the charge against H. A. Proctor was granted, the case to come up at this week's court.

Last week a baby was born in Sud-bury district jail for the first time in the history of the officials there. The mother of the child is Irene Smith, held on remand on a charge of being found in a disorderly house. Mother and child were removed to the hospital where they are doing well. An effort is being made to locate the parents or friends of the woman whose home is thought to be in Toronto.
