

Teachers From All Parts of Ontario on Tour of North

About 180 Left Toronto on Sunday Evening for Trip Through North Land. Will be at Timmins To-morrow (Thursday). Fifth Annual Tour. Committee in Charge.

To-morrow (Thursday) the party of Ontario School Teachers on tour of the North will visit Timmins. Over 180 registered for the trip North when the train left Toronto on Sunday evening last. Of the 186 registered, 159 were women.

The committee in charge of the trip comprises eight public school principals, with A. E. Bryson of Silverthorn as Chairman, and Charles G. Fraser of Manning Avenue School as Secretary, the other members being Principals W. J. Thomson and R. M. Speirs of Toronto, and Principals W. F. Moor of Dundas, C. E. Kelly, John Munro, B.A., and Martin Kerr, B.A., of Hamilton.

Most of the committee are well-known in this part of the North Land, either because of the friends made on previous visits of the teachers here, or for other reason. Mr. Bryson, for instance, was formerly principal of the public school Cobalt, and so was known to many here. The genial secretary of the committee, Mr. Chas. G. Fraser, has been here on every trip made by the teachers, and as he makes new friends on every trip and cements old friendships, he has quite a line-up of admirers here now. Mr. Kelly is famous here as an old-time schoolmaster of the bright lad that later became the Church-like Mayor of Timmins. So it goes. Mr. Moore has been here on previous occasions and has made friends here. As a matter of fact all the visiting teachers make friends here from year to year, and in case it were the same ones coming here year after year they would have hosts of old friends before this, their fifth, annual trip. However, the rule is that no teacher takes the trip twice. The idea is that the tour of the North gives the teachers the opportunity to learn of the natural resources, the industrial activities and the physical features of the North Land so that they may teach intelligently and accurately, from first-hand knowledge, and explain to their pupils in the South the wonders and the possibilities of this great North. Each teacher has to give a detailed report of the trip to the Teachers' Institute sending him or her, and so the facts about the North are being spread. A great number of different teachers have now visited the North on these annual trips, and there is no doubt but that much good has resulted to the North, to the teachers, from these tours.

These tours of the North are conducted under the auspices of the Ontario Educational Association and the Ontario Department of Education. The teachers going on the trip are selected by the Teachers' Institutes in the various inspectorates. Elsewhere in this issue will be found the complete itinerary of the tour. The party travel by special train, and every comfort and convenience is provided. The party have their own doctor, nurse etc. On the present trip the Ontario Legislature, which provided a grant toward the expense of the trip, is represented by A. C. Lewis, M.P.P. Miss Hannah M. Gwyn of Dundas is the official nurse, and Dr. A. E. Broughton of Toronto the physician. G. Roy Fenwick, Director of Music for the Hamilton public schools, will organize and direct the community singing. Inspector J. E. Benson, M.A., of Windsor and W. C. Mitchell, B.A., of Tor-

onto represent the inspectoral and supervising branches of education.

As was the case in years past, this year's party has representatives from practically every section of the Province. Within the week which the trip occupies the teachers will visit Sudbury, Creighton, Coniston, Sault Ste. Marie, the Agawa Canyon, Hearst, Kapuskasing, Cochrane, Timmins, Iroquois Falls, New Liskeard, Haileybury, Cobalt, Temagami and North Bay.

The people of Timmins generally will give very hearty welcome to the teachers, and all will trust that their visit here will prove pleasant and interesting.
