SOME IMPRESSIONS OF TIMMINS, BY A VISITOR

St. Mary's Argus-Journal Rambler Makes Interesting References to the Big Town of the North.

Mr. John W. Eedy, Publisher of the St. Mary's Argus-Journal, who was recently a visitor to his daughter, Mrs. Arch. Gillies, Timmins, has some interesting references to make to people and places in this district in writing for his newspaper under the heading of "The Journal Rambler."

"Sitting with Mrs. A. Gillies, one afternoon on James Avenue in Timmins, watching the antics of a 'husky' across the street, a young man with a dinner pail in hand came over and said 'I heard yesterday you were in the city.' It was Elmer Johnston of Toronto University, son of Wilbert Johnston, St. Mary's, who with a number of other mining students from Varsity, were putting in their summer holidays at the Hollinger and other mines."

"As Mrs. Gillies and I entered the dining room of the New Empire Hotel one evening in Timmins, a gentleman at one of the tables whom I could not place at the time spoke to us. He came to us afterwards in the rotunda, and proved to be Frank Sparling of Toronto, an old St. Mary's boy who for the past 26 years has been travelling representative of a wholesale house in that city. Speaking of business conditions he said he found the northern towns which were in the last to feel the general depression in trade to be suffering possibly in a greater degree now than the towns and cities in the older parts of the province."

"I am frequently asked since coming home 'What is the weather like up in Timmins?' Well they have weather in Timmins all right and it is one of the distinctive features of that part of the country. A clear summer day in Timmins is delightful. There is so much sunshine and such dry invigorating air in comparison with that in a country with such an abundance of vegetable growth as in Old Ontario. The pine and spruce and the fir and other resinous woods give a medicinal tang to the atmosphere. But there are so many damp days, and all damp days are cold days up there for the sun is the heat and life of the day in that latitude. The fine day, to my mind was brighter, more cheerful, more exhilarating than the average fine day with us, but the damp days in summer resemble fall days here, with this advantage that after an hour's sunshine all dampness is dissipated. On a couple of days while I was in Timmins it was far above 80 in the shade, but in at least three days out of every six it was as wet and cold and disagreeable as an October day with us. This is the second successive cold, wet summer they have had."

"I have been asked about the mosquitoes up there. There are few, if any, in Timmins, but all that northern country is infested with black flies. They are not in the towns, however, but no man dare venture into the bush without carrying with him a preventative in the shape of an oil for protection, or he would return covered with a mass of sores. In the early days of Timmins when the little town was nestled in the bush it is told that when a baby having reached nine months old made no attempt to creep, the parents opened the screen for a moment some night after eight o'clock. The black flies did the rest. One dose was sufficient. The second night as soon as the door was opened the baby took to his heels."

"I was out for an auto drive one Sunday afternoon some two or three miles west of Timmins and was surprised to find a fairly good country road with farms on both sides—the crop was hay. There was an odd patch here and there of wheat and oats. In no case was the grain more than three or four inches long. This was on the 23rd of July. There was no possibility of it maturing before the frosts began. I have mentioned it was Sunday. In one field was a young man driving a hay rake. On the next farm was a bee hauling in hay. One of our party suggested we drive in and announce we were the Lord's Day Alliance and watch the stampee. There would be a stampee all right, said our host, but the Lord's Day Alliance would be in the lead. Every man is a law unto himself in this far north country, 500 miles north of Toronto where 'up' is the south, and all rivers run north into Hudson's Bay, and a man while splitting his kindling wood hangs up his coat on the north pole."

HAS SPENT MILLIONS TO SELL 5c CHEWING GUM

Wrigley, the chewing gum man, has explained how he built up a business of millions of packages a day. He has done it by sticking to his one line and advertising it. He spends over a million dollars a year in buying newspaper space to tell the world about 5 cent chewing gum and to chew Wrigley's. He did not stop shouting as soon as he attracted attention. JUDGEMENT GIVEN IN TAX APPEAL CASES

Judge Caron Gives Decision In Cases re Power Lines.

A despatch from Cochrane last week says:—
Judgement has just been given by His Honor, Judge Caron, of Cochrane, dismissing the appeal of the Northern Canada Power Company and the Hollinger Gold Mines against the amount of the Township of Tisdale's assessment, on certain portions of their power transmission lines and equipment, located within the township. In the case of the Hollinger's appeal against the \$5,000 assessment on their pipe line for slime disposal purposes, the appeal was upheld on the grounds that the pipe line was a part of the mine's mill equipment. At the hearing, which was held two weeks ago, the Northern Canada Power Company sought reduction of the \$350,000 assessment on their power transmission line and transformer station in Tisdale township, claiming that they were entitled to at least a 50 per cent reduction, as they are not now nor have they been using the line or station to the full capacity. The Hollinger claimed a reduction on its power transmission line, on the ground of non-use and because it is now being dismantled as a result of the purchase of the Island Falls development by the Abitibi Power and Paper Company of Iroquois Falls. The assessment on the line was \$48,000. Taxes to the total of \$20,000 were involved.

Representing the companies were J. Y. Murdoch, of Toronto, F. L. Smiley, of Haileybury, and D. W. O'Sullivan, Timmins. G. H. Gauthier appeared for the municipality.

A KIND MAN WILL NOT EVEN SUFFOCATE A FLY

A local merchant last week entered a bakeshop conducted by a gentleman of foreign extraction. The shop was swarming with flies and had a most depressing odor of baked buns, burned bread and stale sweat, as well as other stinging smells not definable. "For goodness sake," said the merchant, "you should get rid of all these flies."

Hunters, be sportsmen!
Don't shoot before sunrise or after sunset.
Don't buy or sell wild game of any kind.
Don't allow the flesh of any game to spoil.
Don't shoot game unless you can use it or give it away before it spoils.
Don't take more game than you are legally entitled to.
Don't shoot out of season.
If you will do this, you will always have game and generations to come will always have it.

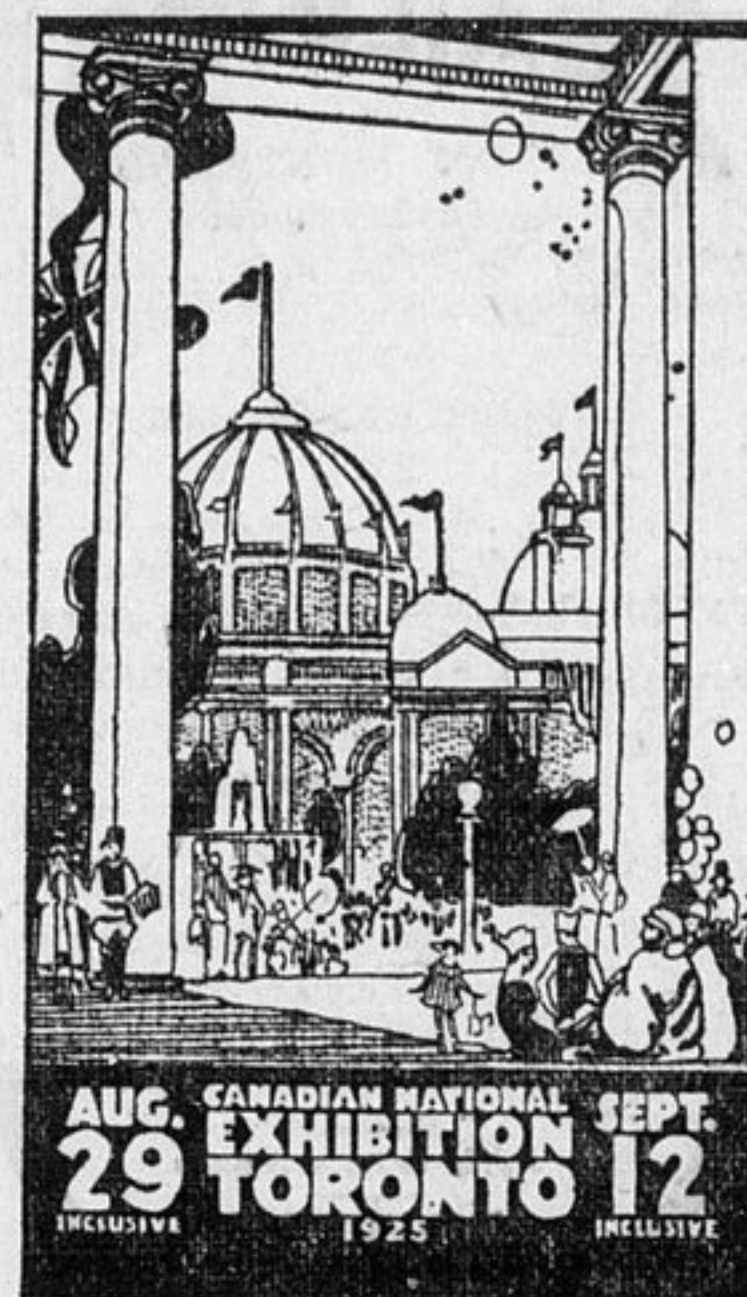
