## Middle School Examinations At the Timmins High School

**S**tanding of the Various Pupils in the Various Subjects on Which They Were Successful. Were Successful in 87 per cent. of the Subjects on Which They Were Recommended.

The results of the Middle School Departmental Examination have been issued. The subjects of the examination are as follows:—English Composition, English Literature, British History, Ancient History, Algebra, Geometry, Physics, Chemistry, Latin Composition, Latin Authors, French Composition and French Authors. The Middle School is a two years' course and pupils can write on any number of subjects and are credited with each subject in which they are successful. C. indicates pass standing, from 50 to 59%; II indicates third-class proficiency, from 60 to 65%; II 66 to 74%; and I first-class proficiency, 75% or over.

A FINE STATEMENT OF THE FAITH OF AN IMPERIALIST

Among the papers of Lord Milner found after his death was a statement of his position on politics. It gives his creed, his faith, and the reason that prompted that faith and creed.


It might well be adopted as the apologia for all Imperialists. The cosmopolitan idea is too extended for practical application in this world of sin.

It must be remembered that few men can do much in the broader world sphere. Every man can do something in his own little village or town or city. Good citizenship is like the effect of a stone thrown into a pool; from the circumscribed central point the eddying rings go out until the effect is felt in a circle of great size. The best citizen of the world is the best citizen of some circumscribed community. Lord Milner voices his ideas in the following words from the statement referred to:—

"A Nationalist is not a man who necessarily thinks his nation better than the others, or is unwilling to learn from others. He does think that his duty is to his own nation and its development. He believes that

this is the law of human progress; that the competition between nations, each seeking its maximum development, is the Divine order of the world, the Law of Life and Progress. I am a British (indeed primarily an English) Nationalist. If I am also an Imperialist it is because the destiny

of the English race, owing to its insular position and long supremacy at sea, has been to strike fresh roots in distant parts of the world. My patriotism knows no geographical but only racial limits. I am an Imperialist and not a Little Englander, because I am a British Race Patriot. It seems unnatural to me—I think it is impossible from my point of view—to lose interest in and attachment to my fellow-countrymen because they settle across the seas. It is not the soil of England, dear as it is to me, which is essential to arouse my patriotism, but the speech, the tradition, the spiritual heritage, the principals, the aspirations of the British race. They do not cease to be mine because they are transplanted. My horizon must widen; that is all."
