First Annual Horticultural Society Show Here, Sept. 7th

All Urged to Assist to Make Event the Finest Display of Flowers, Plants, Vegetables and Fruits Ever Shown in the North Land. Interesting Event for Labour Day.

The first annual horticultural show under the auspices of the Timmins Horticultural Society will be held in the Curling Rink on Labour Day, Monday, Sept. 7th. Flowers, vegetables, plants, fruits, etc., will be shown. There will be a good list of prizes for the occasion.

Entries may be made up to 10.30 a.m. Sept. 7th, when entries will close. Judging will take place at 11 a.m. At 1 p.m. the Show will be opened to the public. All interested—and everybody should be interested—should watch for handbills giving details of the classes and prizes. It is not necessary to send in for entry forms but any wishing to compete may enter their exhibits when they come to the Show. They should, however, have all exhibits at the hall before 10.30 a.m., entries closing at that time.

Mr. R. Whorley, pioneer florist of the North Land, who has done so much for horticulture in this country, will be up from Haileybury to act as Judge, and he will have a capable assistant in the work of judging.

Mr. H. Hatton, President of the Timmins Horticultural Society, offers

a kindly hint to those who have dahlias, gladioli, zinnias, asters, and other flowers affected by light frosts. "Watch for rapid drop in temperature in the evenings," he says, "and if there is danger of frost, cover the plants lightly, taking care that cover does not touch the flowers. A little precaution and you have the pleasing sight of your garden much longer. It is much better to be careful than sorry."

In this connection it may be repeated that the Horticultural Society is ready to give any advice on plants, trees, shrubs, bulbs, etc. This advice will be free, and it may save citizens both money and loss. The Horticultural Society has arranged to distribute plants, etc., and can offer the very best at the lowest possible price. In addition, the Society is ready to advise when, how and what to plant.

In concluding a note to The Advance on the Show to be held on Labour Day, President Hatton concludes with these words to the average citizen:—"Have you a garden? If not you are missing half the joy of life. Join our Society and help to beautify the town you live in."

EXPERT EXPLAINS NEW DOMINION ELECTION ACT

Returning Officers Now Appointed Permanently.

A special despatch from Ottawa gives much interesting information regarding the workings of the new Dominion Elections Act. The despatch says:—

"Owing to several changes in the Provincial laws and Dominion Elections Act in recent years, much confusion exists as to voters' lists for the next Dominion elections. In response to enquiries, Alexander Smith, Ottawa, who has made a special study of the law, furnishes the following outline:

"Any male or female who is a British subject, 21 years of age, and who has ordinarily resided in Canada for 12 months, and in the electoral district two months before the issue of the writs, is qualified to vote.

"In June, when amendments to the Dominion Elections Act were under discussion, Sir James Loughheed, leader of the Conservatives in the Senate, suggested that the returning officers be appointed by the Governor-General-in-Council upon the recommendation of the Secretary of State, not for a stated period of time, but "during pleasure." This amendment makes the position of returning officer one of considerable dignity, and in keeping with the responsibilities of the office. The duties of this official can only be terminated by personal resignation, death, or by an order of the Governor-General-in-Council.

"The returning officers may now be appointed before Parliament is dissolved, and the necessary documents, except the writs for the holding of an election forwarded to them. This will expedite the carrying out of election proceedings, and give the chief official for each constituency an opportunity to prepare for his work. Indications are that returning officers will be appointed weeks before dissolution.

"The returning officer appoints his own clerk, and, in addition to this, appoints a registrar for each polling sub-division in the rural municipalities and in villages and in towns having a population of 5,000 or less. These registrars compile the voters' lists for the election, making use, as a basis, of existing Provincial voters' lists or municipal lists containing the names of persons entitled to vote at Provincial elections. From these lists the registrar strikes off names of persons who are not qualified and adds the names of persons who are qualified to vote in Federal elections. There is no appeal from this, except that any elector who is qualified may

appear on election day in the division in which he resides and make oath to that effect. He will then be allowed to vote, providing he is vouched for under oath by an elector in the same polling division.

"In towns and cities of over 5,000 population, a different method is adopted for the preparation of the lists. No persons are allowed to vote in these towns and cities unless their names are on the list as finally revised by the judge. A number of registrars are appointed, and persons who desire their names enrolled or inserted in existing lists have to appear personally before such registrar, who subsequently adds the additional names to any list which he is entitled to make use of, but he cannot strike off any names, as appeals from his lists, both to add to and strike off, are provided for before the district or county judge."

Each member of the Club is entitled to ask some guest for the evening, and it has been decided for the first night to waive the ruling that none but non-eligibles for Club membership can be invited. The schedule for the month of September will be published later. All lady members of the Club who wish to renew their membership are requested to do so before the end of this month. September dues from the gentlemen members are due this evening. The dance this evening starts at nine o'clock sharp.

HAILEYBURY MAN TAKING POSITION IN ENGLAND.

Cyril, who was born in Haileybury, has the best wishes of a host of friends here for success in his new position."

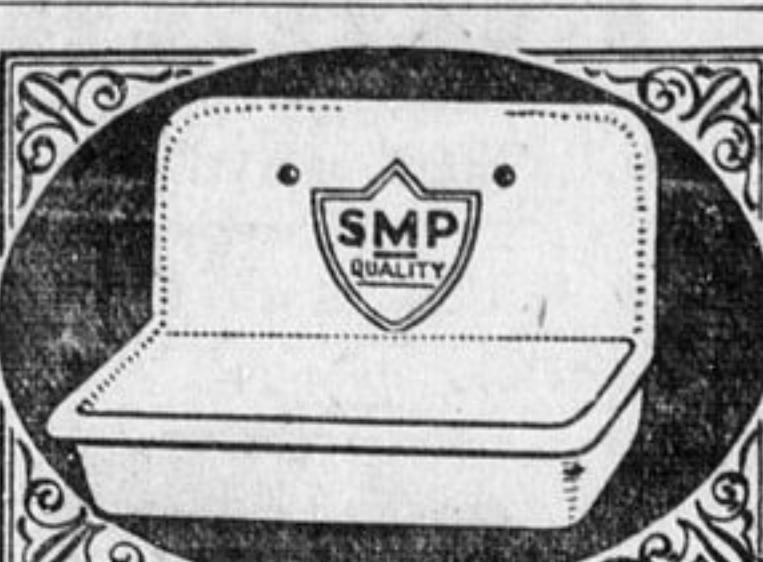
FIRE IN PRESSING PARLOUR WEDNESDAY OF LAST WEEK.

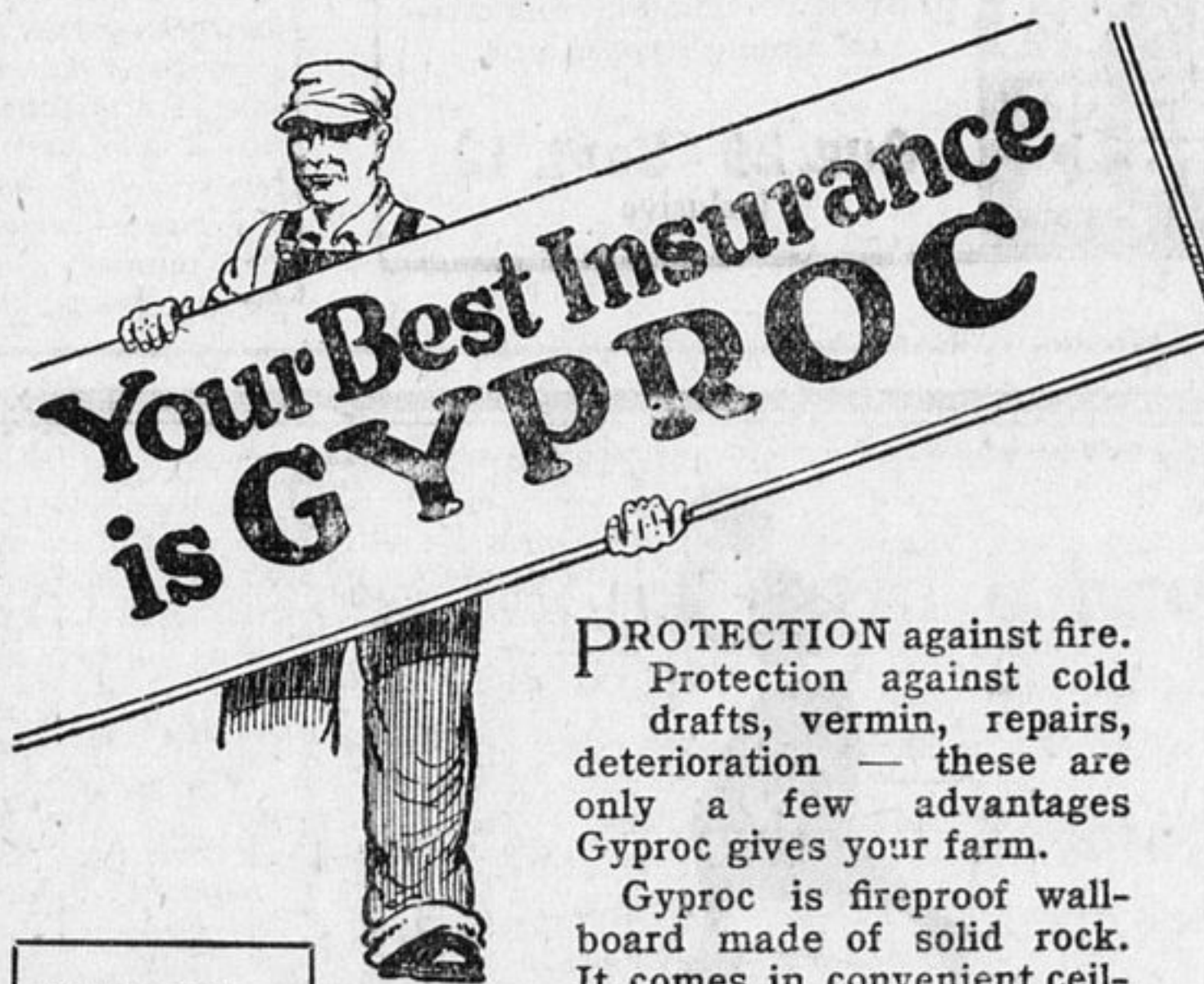
