## Mr. J. A. MacDonald Winner of Timmins Golf Club Trophy

Contest Between Messrs. Bacon and MacDonald Followed With Keenest Interest. Hard Battle in Semi-Finals Between Messrs. C. G. Williams and J. A. MacDonald.

The Timmins Golf classic is over for another season, and J. A. MacDonald, former player on the Beaconsfield links, and this year a member of the Timmins club is the winner of the oldest of the trophies for competition by local golfers. Over the week-end MacDonald defeated Mr. J. Bacon, one of the veterans of the Timmins Club in the 36-hole match play competition by a score of seven up and five to go. The first eighteen holes was as good a performance of golf as anyone could wish for. The weather was fine for the game, hardly any wind, and warm sunshine, both players turning in a score of 78, and leaving the results of the second match to decide the possession of the Golf Club Trophy. With the weather not so good for golf, and a cutting north-east wind, the second round was not so good, though when defeated at the end of the thirteenth green, Mr. Bacon's score by strokes stood at 58, with the last hole unfinished, while Mr. MacDonald had the same score, playing the thirteenth green.

On Thursday afternoon, in the semi-finals Mr. C. G. Williams and Mr. MacDonald met in a hard battle, a second round of eighteen holes played on Friday afternoon being necessary before Mr. Williams was eliminated thereby giving Mr. MacDonald the right to enter the finals. Mr. Williams has had to play three double rounds during the Golf Club Trophy matches to eliminate his opponents, keeping this record up to the very last.

Both the victor and vanquished alike are to be congratulated on their play during the final matches. Even when down six holes, Mr. Bacon played a steady game, and had it not been for the hard luck on the thirteenth fairway, when he sliced his ball out of bounds, the game may have gone on. But Mr. MacDonald's victory is a popular one; his playing during the finals deserved a win, and though it was spectacular work on the greens which finally assured him the possession of the Golf Club Trophy, careful approaches assisted him.

The following is the play by greens, for the first and second rounds of the Trophy matches.

1st Green—Bacon drove off 160 yards, sliced to right; MacDonald topped his drive half way to bunker, following up with a mashie unto the green. Bacon made a nice approach and sunk his ball for a birdie Bacon won.

2nd Green—Bacon drove straight up course 175 yards, MacDonald following with a 225-yard drive, past the second white flag. Bacon missed his second shot, and lay on the green with his third. MacDonald mashed into the green and holed in for a par 4. MacDonald won.

3rd Green—MacDonald hooked drive to right, landing in rough. Bacon topped his off the tee but got good distance, playing his second shot to the road. MacDonald was in difficulties in the rough and played his third stroke before getting out. Bacon put his ball to the edge of the green in the rough with his third stroke, MacDonald following to the same place, Bacon made a nice approach and sunk his ball for a bogey. Bacon won.

4th Green—Bacon drove half way down fairway, MacDonald improving on this by over twenty yards. Both players approached unto the green, Bacon to the left, MacDonald lying on the green near the centre, putting in for a par four. MacDonald won.

5th Green—MacDonald hit mat behind ball, but got 150 yards. Bacon got about the same distance, only was in the rough, failing to get out with his second stroke. MacDonald drove across the fairway alongside the creek, following up with a mashie unto the edge of the green. Bacon lay up with MacDonald on his third stroke, getting unto green with his fourth. Both players holed in with a six-all.

6th Green—MacDonald did not get a very long drive, Bacon getting about forty yards farther down the fairway, using his brassie to get unto the green. MacDonald lay up near the green with his second stroke, putting his ball about thirty feet from the pin with his third stroke, Bacon sunk his ball for a par four, winning the hole.

7th Green—Bacon drove into bunker on far side of green, MacDonald landing near the pin. Bacon was strong with his second stroke, taking two puts. MacDonald took two puts making the score four all.

8th Green—Bacon hooked his drive across bunker to the left of the poplars. MacDonald drove unto the green. Bacon made a nice approach, taking two puts, MacDonald needed three to hole in. Hole halved.

9th Green—Bacon hooked slightly into rough to right of fairway. MacDonald drove to left side of green, playing a nice approach and sinking his ball for a birdie. MacDonald won.

10th Green—MacDonald drove straight down between bunkers, Bacon following with a long drive ten

feet from green, approaching within ten feet of the cup. MacDonald made a nice approach up near cup. Both players taking two to hole in. Halved.

11th Green—MacDonald sliced his drive. Bacon getting on a little to the right, both players getting well over the hill. Both players mashed into the green, both taking two puts to halve the hole for a par four.

12th Green—Both contestants got well over 200 yards, Bacon getting a nice brassie, but landing in the rough to the right of the green. MacDonald spoiled his second stroke, but mashed to green with his third. Both players had two puts halving with a par five.

13th Green—Both players drove down to within three feet of each other, Bacon getting in the rough with his second, MacDonald landing on the green. MacDonald holed in with two puts, Bacon halving the hole with one. Both players had a par four.

14th Green—MacDonald got 220 yards but was in the rough, Bacon playing shorter, but having a better lie. Bacon brassied into the hill across the creek, MacDonald using the iron got within ten feet of the green Bacon pitched his ball on green 20 feet from the cup. MacDonald approaching to within four feet, sinking for a par four. MacDonald won.

15th Green—MacDonald had a fine drive three quarters of distance to bunker. Bacon sliced his into the rough, the ball striking a stone on the second shot and bouncing behind the bunker on the 17th Fairway, where he got a nice one with the brassie out to the green. MacDonald was four feet off green with his second shot, approaching to cup and sinking his ball for a par four. MacDonald won.

16th Green—Both drove unto the green, Bacon sinking his ball with two puts, and winning the hole.

17th Green—Both players drove to trees on the far side of the green; Bacon getting the better approach, and holing in for a par three, and winning the hole. This tied the round again.

18th Green—Both players had fine drives, Bacon getting the better approach, but MacDonald had a better put, both holing out for a par four.

9th Green—MacDonald drove the full 255 yards to the green, and his ball rolled across to No. 3 fairway. Bacon got 175 and lay to right of fairway, lying within twenty feet of the pin on his long approach. MacDonald laid his ball 12 feet from the pin and sunk his ball for a birdie. Bacon got a par four MacDonald won.

10th Green—MacDonald drove and sliced to the left. Bacon drove into the bunker and over, his mashie shot falling short of the green. MacDonald made a splendid mashie onto the green, sinking his ball for a birdie. Bacon made a par four. MacDonald won. MacDonald now seven up and eight to go.

11th Green—MacDonald drove straight up the fairway. Bacon drove a long low one about 200 yards. MacDonald made a long mashie shot to the green. Bacon topped his ball, but got on with his third. MacDonald lay three feet from the cup with his third, Bacon getting close with his fourth, sinking his fifth. MacDonald missed his put and tied the hole.

12th Green—MacDonald drove two hundred yards to left. Bacon got slight slice but the ball rolled fair, getting a brassie over the road, and on the green with his third. MacDonald muffed two shots, getting in the bunker for his fourth, taking four to get out, Bacon getting a par five and winning the hole. MacDonald was now six up and six to go.

13th Green—Bacon got a nice drive down the fairway, MacDonald away to the left. Bacon brassied out of bounds. MacDonald got on the green for his second, and went down for a par four. MacDonald won. This hole being lost by Bacon ended the game, MacDonald winning seven up and five to go.
