JEWELRY STOCK BEING SOLD HERE BY AUCTION

Mr. Stock, of Toronto, is in town this week in connection with the sale of the jewelry stock in the stand formerly occupied by J. E. Garrett, opposite the post office. FLYING SQUIRREL SHUTS OFF ELECTRIC POWER.

(From Broke Hustler). The flying squirrels have been getting in their work again.

On Saturday night the power went off completely and investigation showed that a flying squirrel at the first tower had caused a short circuit and cut Twin Falls power house off altogether. The body of a squirrel, badly burned, was picked up at the foot of the tower.

This is the second time that a flying squirrel has shut down the plant by short circuiting the power line.

Ten days previous the power was cut off but this time by a bird, one of the purple grackles commonly called "black bird" for short. The bird had apparently been sitting on the tower and when it went to fly its wings touched the wire and standard causing a short circuit.

NEW ISSUE OF 15-YEAR GOVERNMENT BONDS NOW

Announcement has just been made that the Dominion Government has concluded its financial plans for the year by disposing of a new issue of \$75,000,000 fifteen year 4 1/2% bonds through a strong Canadian syndicate consisting of Wood, Gundy & Company, Dominion Securities Corporation, A. E. Ames & Company Limited and the National City Company Limited. The bonds are being offered to the public through practically every bond dealer and stock broker in Canada, and through the chartered banks.

In arranging for its long term financing in Canada, rather than in another market, the Government has followed the policy that has been almost rigidly adhered to during the last several years, the Victory Loans of 1917, 1918 and 1919 having been planned entirely for the Canadian market and the Refunding Loans of 1923 and 1924 having been offered in the same manner. Short term financing—such as one year note issues—have been placed in United States, where the demand for such bonds is so strong that such borrowing is abnormally cheap. These short term notes, however, are of interest only to the large financial institutions.

It is understood that the proceeds of the new issue will be used for refunding purposes, including the retirement of \$42,000,000 of tax-free bonds, which fall due on December 1st next. In this matter also, the strict policy of retiring tax-free bonds by the usual issues is being followed.

The new issue should prove exceedingly attractive to Canadian investors. The maturity is fifteen years—in other words these bonds run for the same number of years as did the 1934 maturity Victory bonds which were issued in 1919 and which have become so popular. At the price of 97 1/4% and interest, the bonds will yield the investor an interest return of over 4 1/4% which is considered attractive.

Because of the success of the 1923 and 1924 Refunding Loans, it is felt in financial circles that the present issue will be quickly snapped up.
